2025: Year in Review

A Year of 303 Data

This year, OPS has published a new [2025 Year-End Data Summary](#) that provides annual totals of 2025 data presented on the [OPS Data Dashboard](#). The summary serves as an archive of data from 2025 and provides access to information for those outside the U.S. who cannot access the OPS Data Dashboard.

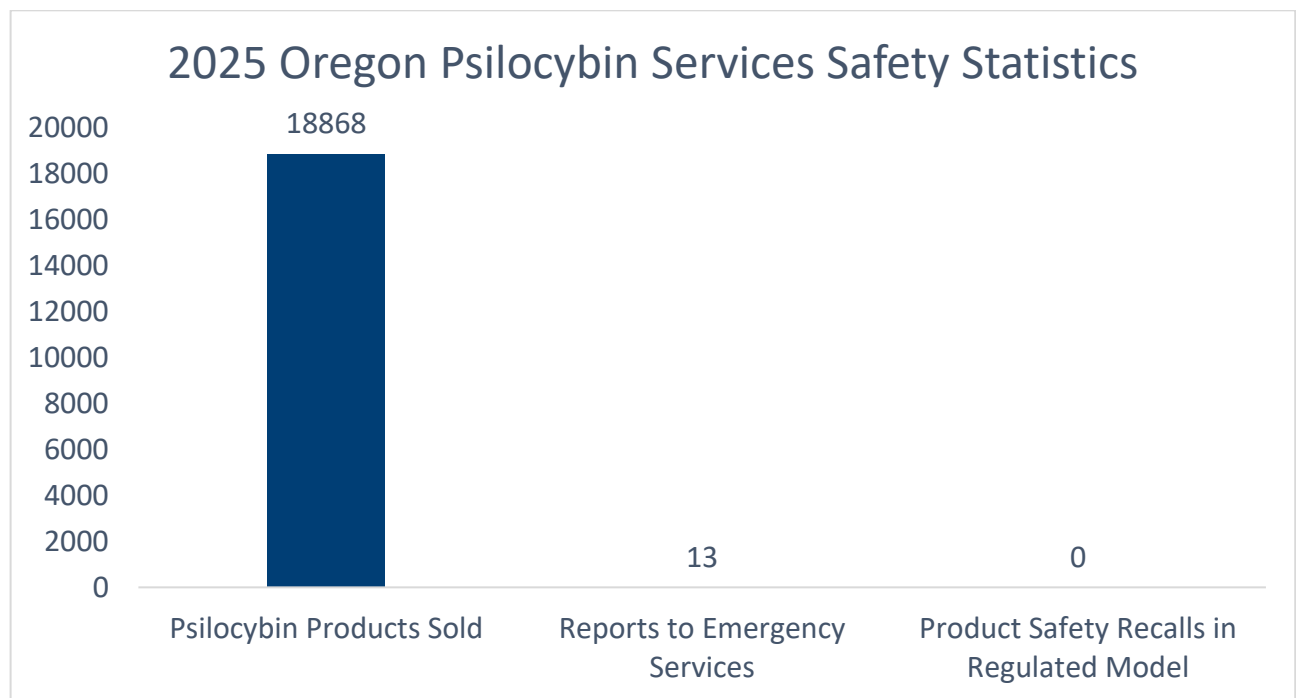

In 2025, between the dates of 1/1/2025 and 12/31/2025:

- **18,868 psilocybin products** were sold in the regulated model in 2025. This can include secondary doses, so the number of clients who have used psilocybin services is lower than the total products sold. All psilocybin products are tested by licensed laboratories that are

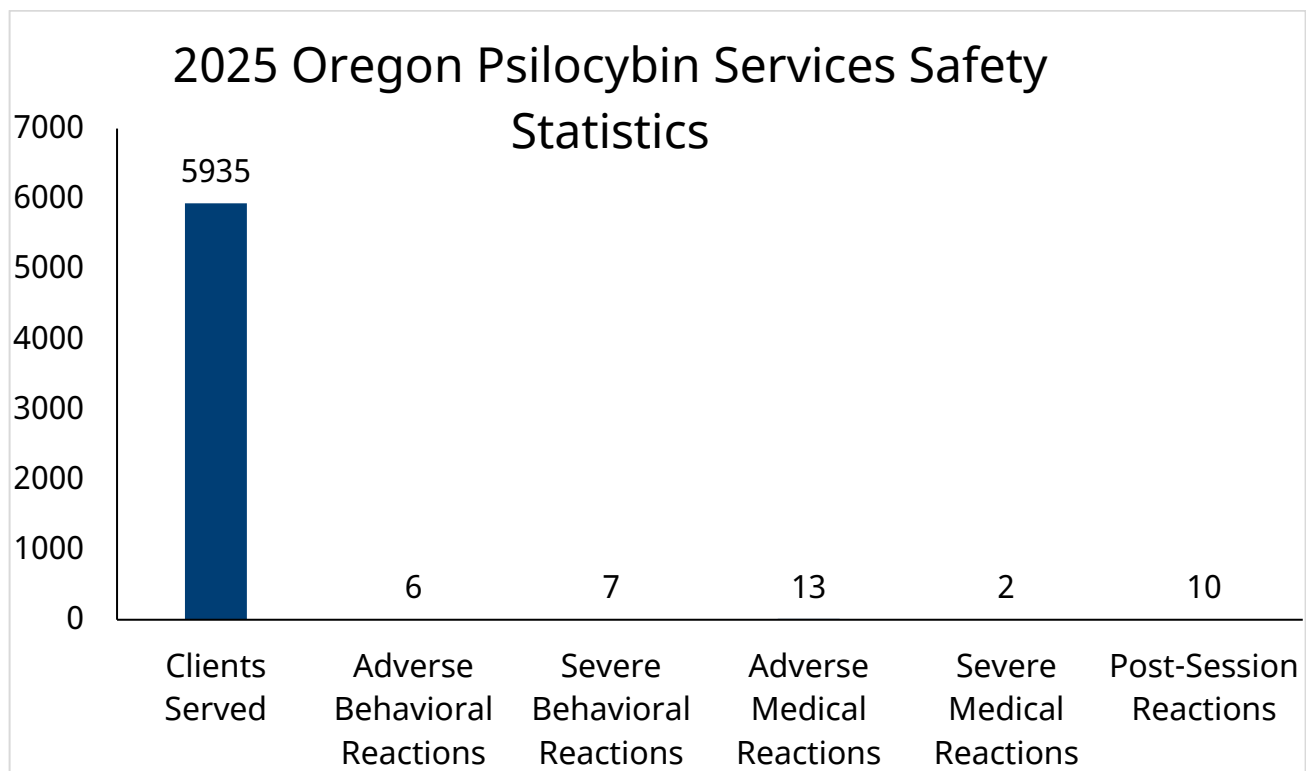
accredited by the Oregon Environmental Laboratory Accreditation Program (ORELAP).

- The percentage of clients who had administration sessions that resulted in contact with emergency services is very low (**0.2% of clients; 13 emergency services contacts** for 5,935 clients in 2025).
- For every 1,451 psilocybin products sold there was one call to emergency services (**0.07% of products** associated with an emergency services contact in 2025).
- There have been **no product safety recalls** under Oregon's regulated model. However, unregulated products have been recalled and raise significant public health and safety concerns. For example, in 2024 the U.S. Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and [OHA issued a warning](#) about unregulated recalled products.



Adverse reactions are reported to OPS by Service Centers on a quarterly basis beginning in 2025. Definitions for adverse reactions can be found at [OAR 333-333-1010](#). In 2025, between the dates of 1/1/2025 and 12/31/2025:

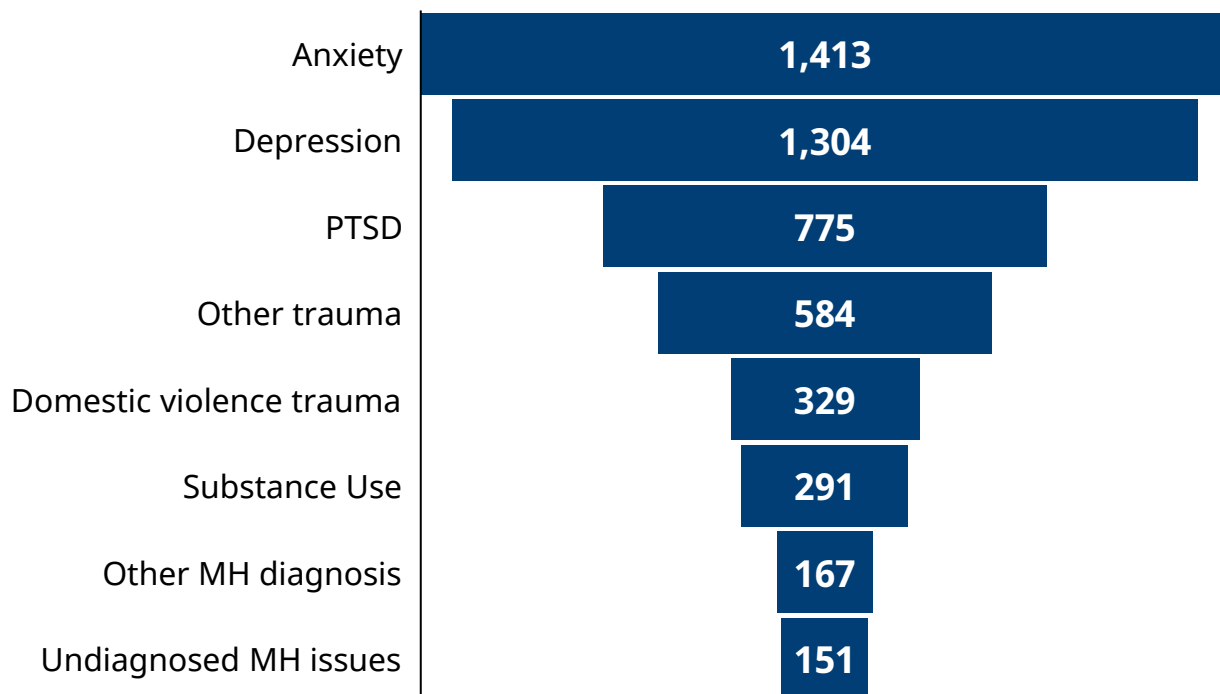
- Only **6 clients (0.1%)** experienced an adverse behavioral reaction and **7 clients (0.1%)** experienced a severe adverse behavioral reaction.
- **13 clients (0.2%)** experienced an adverse medical reaction and **2 clients (0.03%)** experienced a severe adverse medical reaction.



In 2025, between 1/1/2025 and 12/31/2025, clients who opted to have their data shared with OHA indicated that they accessed psilocybin services for the following behavioral health related reasons:

- Anxiety - **1,400 clients**
- Depression - **1,300 clients**
- Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) – **775 clients**
- Other Trauma – **584 clients**
- Domestic violence trauma – **329 clients**
- Tobacco, Alcohol or Substance Use – **291 clients**
- Other Mental Health Diagnoses – **167 clients**
- Other undiagnosed Mental Health Issues – **151 clients**

The Oregon Statewide Health Improvement Plan

The new 2025-29 Oregon State Health Improvement Plan (SHIP) includes a strategy to **Destigmatize psilocybin as a culturally responsive option for healing and wellness.**

The SHIP is a 5-year plan for improving the health of all people, of all ages, in all places in Oregon. It recognizes the diverse experiences of our population and strives to have inclusive strategies that benefit everyone. We have updated the [OPS Social Equity Plan Resources](#) document and the [OPS Social Equity Evaluation Report Guidance](#) to reflect the new priorities of the 2025-2029 State Health Improvement Plan. The documents now include examples of how OPS Licensees could align with new SHIP priorities.

In the coming years, OPS will continue to work with the Public Health Division’s SHIP team to measure progress on the SHIP strategy. We will use data in the [OPS Data Dashboard](#) to track who is accessing psilocybin services and who is providing psilocybin services. Below is a table that displays this data for 2025 (1/1/2025 – 12/31/2025).

Secure, Effective Data Systems

Successful implementation relies on adequate technological systems for support. In 2025, OPS continued to work with internal developers at the Office of Information Systems (OIS) on the development of our online, cloud-based licensing and case management system called the Training program, Licensing and Compliance (TLC) system.

TLC Releases in 2025

User Acceptance Testing (UAT) by OPS

- 8 hours a week x 17 sprints = 136 UAT hours of team testing

Web and Communications Statistics

- The [OPS e-mail distribution list](#) has had over 14,000 subscribers. In 2025, OPS sent **26 messages** to the email distribution list announcing updates and opportunities to engage.
- [The OPS website](#) has had over **80,000 visits**. From January 1, 2025 to December 31, 2025, the following 3 webpages had the most views among all OPS webpages:
 - The [OPS homepage](#) was viewed **34,612 times**

- The [Access Psilocybin Services page](#) was viewed **31,054 times**, about 3,000 more views than last year
 - The [OPS Licensee Directory](#) was viewed **11,738 times**, over 7,000 more views than the year before
 - The most popular PDF resources published on the OPS webpage this year were [the Facilitator License Fact Sheet](#) and the general [OPS Fact Sheet](#).
- In 2025, OPS updated [informational videos](#), which had over **500 views** in 2025.

2025 Rulemaking

In 2025, OPS conducted rulemaking for adjustments to administrative rules and for implementation of HB 2387, passed by the Oregon Legislature in 2025. Referred to as [Dual Licensure](#), the law bridges the continuum of health care for clients between psilocybin services and the health and behavioral health system in Oregon.

- OPS held **two** [Public Listening Sessions](#) in June 2025, with Spanish and American Sign Language (ASL) interpretation, as well as CART captioning, for **over four hours of public feedback**. Public Listening Sessions were recorded and are available online. OPS staff also compiled questions and published a [Summary of Themes, Questions and Answers](#) on the OPS website.
- OPS **convened two Rules Advisory Committees (RACs) in July** during 2025 regular rulemaking and **one RAC in November** during 2025 temporary rulemaking. In total there were **over 21 hours of RAC discussion**. RACs included a diversity of opinions and viewpoints and were **comprised of over 33 individuals** with subject matter expertise, lived experience, and who were likely to be affected by the proposed rules. All meetings were recorded and posted on [the OPS Administrative Rules webpage](#). Past rulemaking is also always available in our rulemaking archives.
- A public comment period was held from September 1-21, 2025, which included **two public hearings** and **three hours of public**

testimony during regular rulemaking. Another public comment period was held from December 2-21, 2025 to address temporary rulemaking, which included a public hearing with **one hour of public testimony**. Spanish and American Sign Language (ASL) interpretation and CART Captioning were provided. The hearings were recorded and are available on [the OPS Administrative Rules webpage](#).

Support to Regulated Community

- OPS strives to ensure all applicants and licensees have access to the same information and receive the technical assistance they need to successfully comply with all administrative rules. In 2025, the [OPS](#)

[Guidance on Administrative Rules](#) document was **updated 12 times** with expanded guidance for OPS licensees (and prospective licensees) on how to comply with administrative rules.

- In 2025, OPS hosted **3 Lunch Forums** with OPS Licensees. These virtual lunch forums continue to provide an opportunity for licensees to share concerns, ask for guidance, and provide updates about what they are experiencing as a regulated community.
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Oregon Psilocybin Advisory Board

- Over the past year, OPS has continued to support the [Oregon Psilocybin Advisory Board \(OPAB\)](#). In 2025, OPAB members established [priorities and subcommittees](#) and established two subcommittees, including [Accessibility](#) and [Training, Safety, and Efficacy](#). All full board and subcommittee meetings are public meetings and include a public comment period at the end of each meeting.
