Coordinated Care Organization (CCO) Metrics

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2019 CCO Incentive Metrics

- Each CCO is being paid for reaching benchmarks or making improvements on incentive measures from a “Quality Pool”*.
 - 19 metrics
 - 3 dental metrics
 - Children ages 6-9 and 10-14 who received a sealant on a permanent molar tooth.
 - Mental, physical, and dental health assessments within 60 days for children in DHS custody.
 - Oral evaluation for adults with diabetes

*Quality Pool: CCOs place into the pool a percentage of the aggregate payments they are contracted to receive. Only if they meet their metrics, do they receive it back. In 2018, it was 4.25%.

COVID-19 CCO Quality Funds Release

- All CCOs received 60% of their allowable 2019 quality pool funds by March 31, 2020.
- Remaining 40% of the 2019 quality pool funds were paid out in June 2020 based on the regular 2019 calculation, less quality pool funds already received in March.
 - For 2019 quality pool, all CCOs were eligible to receive a maximum of 3.5%.

2019 CCO Incentive Metrics Data Report


- OHA Metrics Annual Report for 2019 would normally be released in July.
 - It undergoes extensive reviews before being approved for public release.
- Due to constraints related to the COVID-19 pandemic, the annual report is delayed.
 - No estimated timeframe of publication yet.
- In the interim, OHA released data that compares overall CCO performance over time across the metrics that have been incentivized for the 2020 measurement year.

CCO Metrics High Level Performance 2020 Incentive Measures




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Assessments for children in DHS custody




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Immunizations for adolescents (combo 2)



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2020 CCO Incentive Metrics

- Metrics were reduced from 19 down to 13.
 - Dental sealants was taken off the list.
- Oregon Metrics & Scoring Committee decided on July 17, 2020 to have all measures in 2020 reporting only.
 - CCOs do not need to meet the benchmarks or improvement targets.

2020 CCO Incentive Metrics

- Kindergarten metric 1: Preventive dental visits for ages 1-5, 6-14
- Kindergarten metric 2: Well-child visits for ages 3-6
- Timeliness of postpartum care
- Disparity measure: ED utilization for members with mental illness
- Oral evaluation for adults with diabetes
- Cigarette smoking prevalence
- Depression screening and follow-up


2020 CCO Incentive Metrics

- Diabetes: HbA1c poor control
- Adolescent immunization
- Initiation, engagement and treatment for drug and alcohol use
- Alcohol & drug misuse: screening, brief intervention and referral to treatment (SBIRT)
- Childhood immunization status
- Mental, physical, and dental health assessments within 60 days for children in DHS custody

2021 CCO Incentive Metrics

- Oregon Metrics & Scoring Committee decided on July 17, 2020 to:
 - Roll over the 13 measures from 2020 into 2021.
 - Keep DHS Assessments measure the same.
 - Add new Meaningful Language Access measure:
Proportion of visits with spoken and sign language interpreter needs that were provided with OHA qualified or certified interpreter services.
- No decisions yet on improvement targets.
 - 2019 performance may potentially be used as baseline for setting 2021 improvement targets.

School Health and Safety Metrics



In-Person Instruction or Hybrid Instruction Model: All Grade Levels & School Districts

- Applies to both public and private schools; higher education institutions & youth correctional facilities have their own guidelines.
- Counties must meet the following requirements 3 weeks in a row:
 - 10 or fewer cases per 100,000 people over 7 days
 - Test positivity of 5% or less over 7 days
- Statewide, these must be met 3 weeks in a row:
 - Test positivity of 5% or less over 7 days

In-Person Instruction or Hybrid Instruction Model: K-3 Students & Remote & Rural School Districts

- In-person instruction can resume for K-3 students and remote and rural school districts with fewer than 100 students:
 - Fewer than 30 cases per 100,000 over 7 days
 - Test positivity of 5% or less over 7 days
 - COVID-19 is not actively spreading in the school community
 - School districts are in compliance with sections 1-3 of *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance

Transition Planning for Comprehensive Distance Learning

- For school districts where in-person instruction is occurring during the school year, planning for a switch to comprehensive distance learning should take place, including training for staff and notification of the community, if one or both conditions are met:
 - 20 cases or greater per 100,000 over 7 days
 - Test positivity of 7.5% or greater over 7 days



Comprehensive Distance Learning

- All school districts must implement comprehensive distance learning if the following conditions are met:
 - 30 or more cases per 100,000 over 7 days
 - Test positivity of 10% or greater over 7 days
