Alcohol and Other Drug Prevention and Education Program (ADPEP)

[ADPEP](#) programs implement evidence-based interventions focused on shared risk and protective factors to prevent and reduce the use and associated effects of alcohol, commercial tobacco, and other drugs across the lifespan.

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Substance Use & Overdose Prevention Funding

[Overdose prevention funded local public health agencies](#), whose eleven regions cover 23 of 36 counties, are awarded \$1.4 million annually to improve local systems for preventing and responding to opioid and other drug overdoses. This section details the funded agencies and the regional partnerships receiving substance use and overdose prevention funding.

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Syringe Service Programs (SSPs)

[SSPs](#) provide free syringes, sharps collection and safe disposal, wound care supplies, naloxone, and education on overdose recognition and response. SSPs often provide rapid point-of-care HIV and hepatitis C (HCV) testing, basic wound care, and linkage to essential services including housing support, daily living resources, physical and behavioral health care, substance use disorder treatment, medications for opioid use disorder (MOUD), withdrawal management, and recovery support services. Peer Recovery Initiated in Medical Establishments / + Infectious Disease Testing and Linkage to Care (PRIME+)

The [PRIME+ Peer Program](#) connects peer support specialists in 20 of 36 Oregon counties with people who are at risk of or receiving treatment for overdose, infection, or other health issues related to substance use. This section details the counties, agencies, and site administrators involved in the PRIME+ program.

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Peer Assisted Telemedicine for Health in Substance Users (PATHS)

[PATHS](#) is an evidence-based intervention that works with peer support specialists to engage people who use drugs or are in early recovery in accessing infectious disease testing, HCV pretreatment screening, and same-day linkage to telemedicine HCV treatment clinicians, and support participants in medication initiation and completion. This section details the counties, agencies, and site administrators involved in the PATHS program.

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Nurture Oregon

[Nurture Oregon](#) is an integrated care model providing pregnant people who use substances with peer support services, prenatal and postpartum care, substance use and mental health treatment, and service coordination. This section details the counties, agencies, and site administrators involved in the Nurture Oregon program.

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Opioid Treatment Program (OTP)

[OTPs](#) provide MOUD and offer services and counseling, which can include different forms of behavioral therapy. This section details the counties, agencies, and contact information of certified OTPs in Oregon.

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Statewide Programs & Investments

Behavioral Health Resource Networks



In November 2020, Oregon voters passed by referendum the [Drug Addiction Treatment and Recovery Act. Senate Bill 755](#) (2021) established **BHRNs** and [House Bill 2513](#) (2023) further clarified the role of BHRNs. A BHRN is an entity or group of entities working together to provide comprehensive, community-based services and supports people with SUD or harmful substance use. Each Oregon county and Tribal area has at least one BHRN. Each BHRN must provide trauma-informed, culturally specific and linguistically responsive services. Services include but are not limited to screening for health and social service needs, behavioral health screening and referral for SUD, individualized intervention planning, low-barrier SUD treatment, harm reduction services, peer-supported services, employment services, housing supports, and referral to appropriate outside services.

Opioid Settlements



Since July 2021, Oregon has reached agreements with several pharmaceutical manufacturers, distributors, and retailers for their role in fueling the opioid crisis. These settlements will provide over \$700 million to Oregon in multiple payments through 2039. Funds are divided between the State of Oregon (45%) and local jurisdictions (55%). The [Opioid Settlement Prevention, Treatment, and Recovery \(OSPTR\) Board](#) established by [House Bill 4098](#) (2022) is responsible for allocating the state portion of the settlement funds through OHA. The OSPTR Board allocated 30% of the state's portion to the Nine Federally Recognized Tribes in Oregon throughout the life of the fund as additional payments are received. After establishing the Tribal set-aside, the Board is [distributing funds](#) across the SUD continuum of care. The OSPTR Board meets virtually once a month; all meetings are open to the public.

Save Lives Oregon

[Save Lives Oregon](#) began in 2020 as fentanyl entered Oregon's illicit drug supply and the COVID-19 pandemic intensified overdose risk and placed significant strain on communities statewide.

The initiative was established by the OHA in partnership with a statewide leadership team representing community-based organizations and Tribal communities with experience working to build healthier communities. Since its inception, Save Lives Oregon has grown to a network of over 400 community organizations working together across state and Tribal communities to save lives and reduce overdose deaths. Through trusted, respectful engagement with people who use drugs, participating organizations are preventing fatal overdoses, reducing disease transmission, facilitating safe syringe disposal and linking individuals to housing, primary care, behavioral health services, SUD treatment and recovery supports and advancing Oregon's comprehensive community-centered response to the state's substance use crisis.

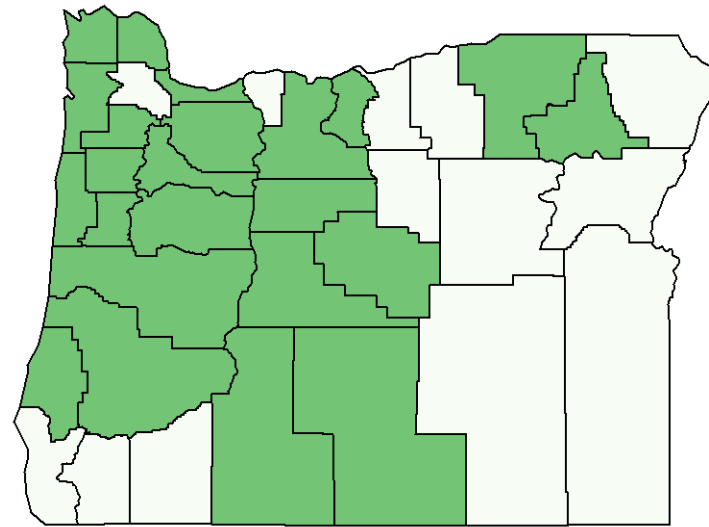
The OHA Health Promotion and Chronic Disease Prevention (HPCDP) Section administers funding for ADPEP programs across the state to implement primary prevention services. For the 2025-2027 biennium, most ADPEP programs are funded through the SAMHSA's Substance Use Prevention, Treatment, and Recovery Services Block Grant (SUPTRS BG) and Opioid Settlement Funds allocated by the OSPTR Board. ADPEP programs implement evidence-based interventions focused on shared risk and protective factors to prevent and reduce the use and associated effects of alcohol, commercial tobacco and other drugs across the lifespan. Substance Use & Overdose Prevention Funded Regions

As part of Oregon's CDC Overdose Data to Action (OD2A) in States grant, the OHA Injury and Violence Prevention Program (IVPP) [funds local public health authorities \(LPHAs\) in 11 regions](#) to support substance use and overdose prevention. Eleven regional partnerships, covering 23 of Oregon's 36 counties, receive \$1.4 million annually to support local overdose prevention and expand programs and collaborations. Substance Use & Overdose Prevention Coordinators serve as key resources for local substance use and overdose prevention, treatment, recovery, harm reduction, and response planning. Funding for this work began in September 2020 and continues through September 2026.

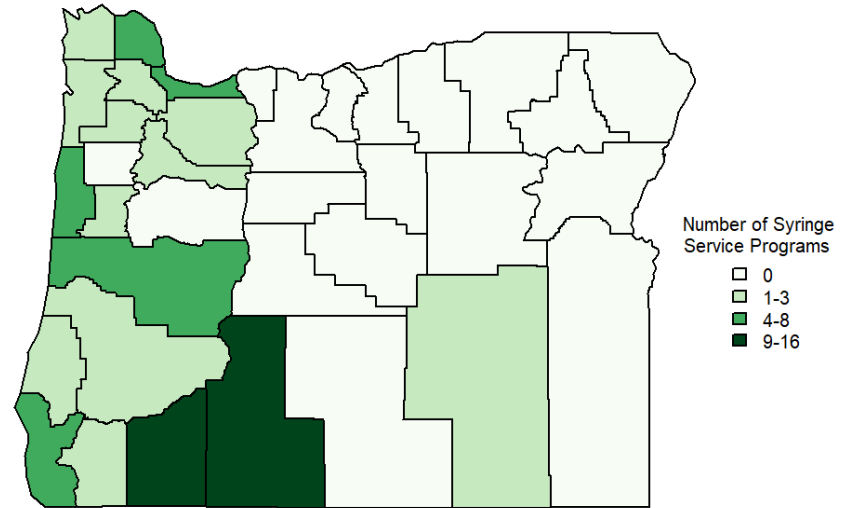

Peer Recovery Initiated in Medical Establishments + HCV/HIV Testing and Linkage to Care (PRIME+)

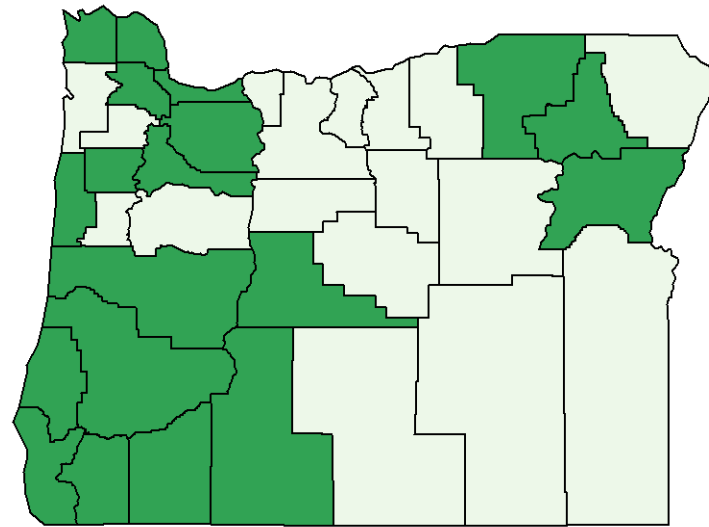

[The Peer Recovery Initiated in Medical Establishments Plus \(PRIME+\) program](#) model evolved from the Oregon HOPE Study and was initially piloted in three Oregon counties with funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Beginning in Fall 2020, PRIME+ expanded to incorporate emergency department–based peer recovery support services originally funded through Oregon House Bill 4143 (2018). The program is currently implemented in 19 of Oregon’s 36 counties and is supported by the SAMHSA State Opioid Response (SOR) grant.

The PRIME+ Program’s peer recovery support specialists engage individuals at risk of, or receiving treatment for, overdose, substance use–related infections, or other substance use–associated health conditions. PRIME+ peers provide substance use disorder Stages of Change responsive engagement, including distribution of overdose prevention supplies; linkage to substance use disorder (SUD) treatment, recovery services, and primary care; facilitation of infectious disease testing and treatment (particularly hepatitis C); navigation to community-based resources addressing housing, food, and other basic needs; and crisis and emotional support.

Participants access PRIME+ through three primary pathways: (1) referrals from community partners, including emergency departments and health and social service providers; (2) proactive peer outreach in community settings (e.g., street-based and encampment outreach); and (3) self-referral or referral by family and friends.

PRIME+ implementation is supported by a structured statewide infrastructure designed to promote fidelity, quality improvement, and peer workforce sustainability. Core components include monthly peer learning collaboratives offering continuing education credits; implementation toolkits and guidance documents; a cross-site message board and shared resource repository; weekly peer huddles; monthly supervisor meetings; a centralized data system for service documentation and performance monitoring; standardized outreach and promotional materials; enhanced supervision supports for selected sites; and an annual in-person statewide convening.

Peer Assisted Telemedicine for Health in Substance Users (PATHS)

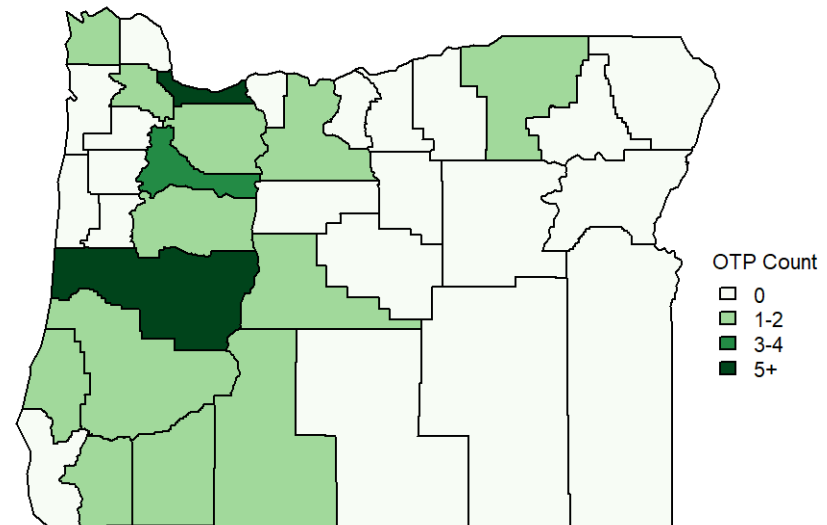

[PATHS](#) is an expansion of an evidence-based intervention developed and tested by the [Oregon HOPE study](#), and is led by Oregon Health and Science University (OHSU). OHA provides implementation funding through the SAMHSA SOR grant to scale the PATHS model statewide.

Peer support specialists help people who use drugs or are in early recovery in accessing infectious disease testing, HCV pretreatment screening, and same-day linkage to telemedicine HCV treatment clinicians, and support participants in medication initiation and completion.

OHSU clinicians with experience serving people who use drugs provide streamlined, rapid access to care through telemedicine and coordinated workflows. PATHS implementation occurs through PRIME+ sites and other peer-led teams and community partners across Oregon. The PATHS implementation team delivers structured training, technical assistance, clinical coordination, and workflow support to participating in peer teams to ensure fidelity to the evidence-based model and alignment with state and federal grant requirements.

Through a 2025–2028 SAMHSA award to OHSU, PATHS will expand to support same-day infectious disease testing at six locations and introduce peer-assisted, same-day telemedicine for HIV prevention and care, MOUD, and mental health services, with structured bridge-to-local-care pathways to ensure continuity beyond initial stabilization.



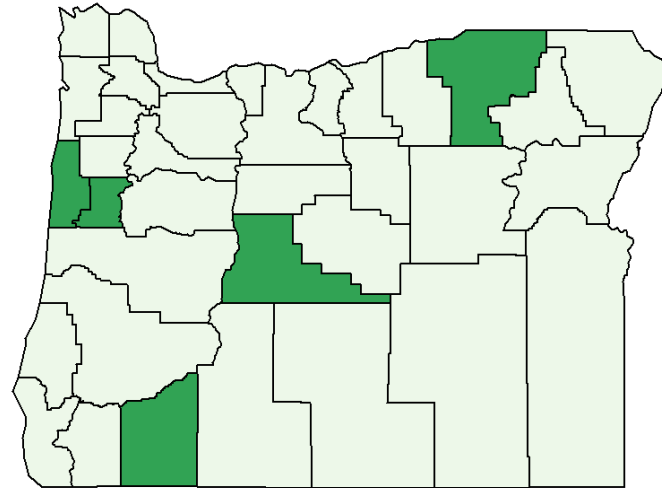

Nurture Oregon

[Nurture Oregon](#) is a low-barrier care model providing pregnant people who use substances with peer recovery support services, prenatal, postpartum, and doula care; substance use and mental health treatment; and social service coordination. The original model (Project Nurture) was piloted in three sites in Portland, Oregon beginning in 2015 and was associated with reductions in child maltreatment, fewer placements of children in foster care, and an increase in prenatal care visits. In 2019, Oregon legislation (HB 2257) enabled the OHA Behavioral Health Division to implement similar services in rural communities. The OHA-led initiative, known as Nurture Oregon, currently operates in five rural counties (Benton, Deschutes, Jackson, Lincoln, and Umatilla). Enhanced elements have been incorporated into the model such as regular peer fellowship meetings, and site-level technical assistance. Nurture Oregon includes a collaboration with Oregon Department of Health Services (ODHS) Child Welfare in developing training sessions and materials for coordinating Comprehensive Addiction Recovery Act Family Care Plans. OHA is collaborating with Comagine Health to support sites in creating low-barrier and sustainable care models to best fit available resources in rural communities and to implement data collection and monitoring systems.

Opioid Treatment Program (OTP)

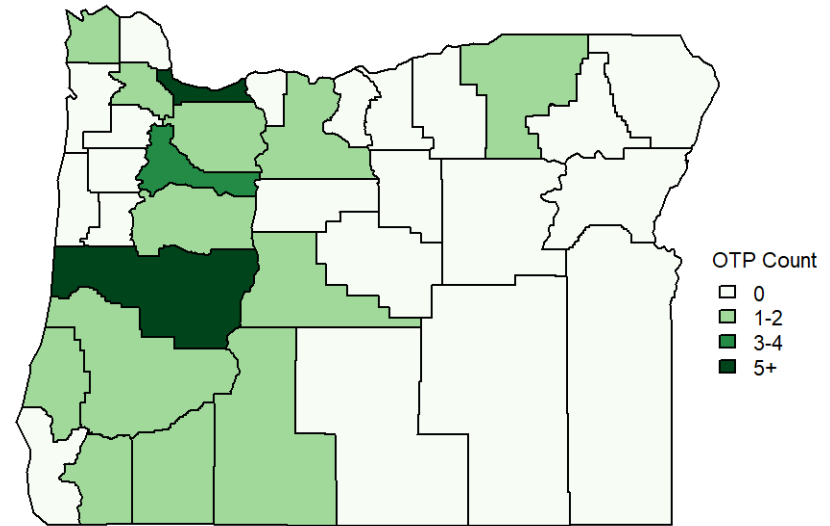
OTPs provide medications for the treatment of OUD, including methadone, buprenorphine, and naltrexone. Methadone for the treatment of OUD can only be dispensed through a SAMHSA-certified OTP; however, buprenorphine and naltrexone can be provided by qualified providers; see [Oregon Substance Use Disorders Services Directory](#) for providers in your community.

[SAMHSA's Division of Pharmacologic Therapies \(DPT\)](#), part of the SAMHSA Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT), oversees the certification of OTPs. OTPs must be certified by SAMHSA and accredited by an independent, SAMHSA-approved accrediting body to dispense opioid treatment medications. All OTPs also must be licensed by the state in which they operate and must register with the DEA.

As a part of the opioid settlement funding, Oregon is expanding OTP services through mobile and non-mobile [Medication Units \(MUs\)](#); a medication unit is a component of an OTP that is geographically separated from the OTP. Required services not provided in medication units must be conducted at the OTP, including medical, vocational, educational, and other assessment and treatment services. Counseling is available as part of the OTP services and, while recommended, is not required.
