Objective: Update TRAC members on current 2025-2027 Measure 44 and Ballot Measure 108 revenue projections.	
Background: Biennial TPEP budget is based on tobacco tax revenue as identified by M44 and BM108. HPCDP tracks projected revenue estimates through quarterly Oregon Office of Economic Analysis forecast reports to support program planning.	

Discussion:

- See attached slides providing overview and context to budgeted revenues, and changes to TPEP RFA
- Gwyn Ashcom clarifying that there is a 20% reduction in overall OHA tobacco funding, not 20% reduction per county. Why is there a reduction at all, especially so quickly, after influx of Ballot Measure 108? When tier models are



reducing so much, not sure how to estimate what to apply for in next RFA. We don't understand why BM 108 doesn't supplement this loss.

- Tobacco tax revenue does not include 2021-2023 ballot measure 108 carryover. Revenue, including BM 108 and M44, totals \$50.5, about \$7 million less than we had originally budgeted. We had been anticipating a higher number when we budgeted, but because of the actual receipts coming in lower than what we expected, as well as the carryover not being available for next biennium, we're seeing this decrease. If we went back to original funding formula from the first and second biennia of the tiered model, when there was no BM 108, it would show more realistic numbers. HPCDP to provide these resources.
- TPEP RFA changes expanded retail strategies, added "Other" option for counties to opt into other innovative strategies that fit their community, please have a conversation with your community program liaison when selecting this option. Added environmental protection strategies. See attached slides for more details.
 - Courtni Dresser clarifying that the evaluation opt-in, does not mean that programs don't need to evaluate?
 - Correct, all programs still have evaluation requirements, this is just a more proactive approach to increase more diverse representation in evaluation programs, including smaller counties, rural and frontier counties. Asking programs to identify evaluation project/program that they'd like to participate in.

2) TPEP Council Updates – Lily Banning, OHA Objective: Provide update on TPEP Council, application period, recruitment and next steps. Background: The Oregon TPEP has historically had two bodies that provide external perspectives on how tobacco tax revenues should be allocated for tobacco prevention and cessation. A TPEP Ambassador Group comprised of community-based organizations, Regional Health Equity Coalitions, national advocates and Local Public Health Authorities convened and provided recommendations for a single group that reflects all partners in the commercial tobacco prevention system.
