- Don't use under 4 weeks of age unless directed by your child's doctor.

- Give every 6-8 hours as needed for the treatment of pain or fever. Shake liquids well before using.
- Don't use under 6 months of age unless directed by your child's doctor.

How to measure the dose:


- Use the oral syringe or dropper that comes with the medicine. If you do not have one you can get a medicine syringe at your local pharmacy.
- o Never use kitchen spoons as they can accidently lead to the wrong amount of medicine given to your child.
- Some tablets are scored (a line that runs across the surface of the tablet) and can be easily split in half; if the tablet is not scored
 you may need a pill cutter to cut the tablet in half more easily.

· How to give the dose:

- Acetaminophen: avoid combination products that contain additional acetaminophen to avoid accidentally giving your child too much
 of this medicine.
- Ibuprofen
 - Avoid combination products that contain additional ibuprofen to avoid accidentally giving your child too much of this
 medicine.
 - Can be given with food or milk if needed to avoid upset stomach.
 - Avoid using if your child has diarrhea or vomiting as dehydration can increase the risk for hurting your child's kidneys.

How the medicines are supplied:

- o Acetaminophen
 - Infant's liquid: has the same amount of medicine as children's liquid.
 - Chewable: tablets that can be chewed or swallowed whole.
 - Meltaway or rapid dissolve: tablets that melt in the mouth; they also can be chewed or swallowed whole.
 - Rectal suppositories (FeverAll): come in 80 mg, 120 mg, 325 mg and 650 mg. The rectal dose is the same as the dose given by mouth.
 - Extended-Release: **NOT** for use in children.
- Ibuprofen
 - Infant drops: MORE medicine in a smaller amount of liquid.
 - Chewable: tablets that can be chewed or swallowed whole.
