




HIV Program Services

With early testing and treatment, people who are HIV-infected are leading longer, healthier lives. HIV positive people who maintain an undetectable viral load have effectively no risk of sexually transmitting HIV to others. The HIV Program funds services that prevent the spread of HIV through foundational prevention programs like community-based HIV testing, syringe exchange, prevention education, and condom distribution. In addition, the HIV Program supports access to HIV prophylaxis and provides services to help persons living with HIV achieve undetectable viral loads. www.healthoregon.org/hiv

Data Summary

HIV remains an important population health related problem in Oregon. From 1981 through 2017, 10,373 HIV infections were diagnosed among Oregon residents; approximately 42% (4,329/10,373) of them died. From 2013 to 2017, approximately 224 new diagnoses were reported annually in Oregon.



State & Local Roles

The State is responsible for:

- Monitoring the incidence and prevalence of HIV infection and co-morbidity through surveillance.
- Funding services to support community-based outreach, testing, linkage to care, case management and adherence related wrap-around supports.
- Providing training, consultation, technical assistance. Establishing rules and standards. Evaluating systems and monitoring contracts.
- Administering the AIDS Drug Assistance and the Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS Programs.
- Convening the statewide planning group.
- Coordinating the End HIV Oregon initiative.

Local partners are responsible for:

- HIV disease investigation and partner services.
- HIV outreach, testing and linkage to care services.
- Provision of HIV case management and adherence supports.
- Partnering in the End HIV Oregon initiative.

End HIV Oregon Initiative

Oregon's plan to end new HIV infections builds on decades of work by community members. Strong foundational programs like prevention education, syringe exchange, condom distribution, and quality care and treatment have kept us at a steady, low level of new transmissions- but we have new tools that can help us eliminate new HIV transmissions.

Challenges & Opportunities

- We estimate about 1100 Oregonians are infected with HIV, but don't know it. If most or all of these persons were tested for HIV and entered HIV medical care, we could prevent 150 new infections over the next three years.
- We estimate that if 1000 Oregonians at the highest risk of HIV infection started taking HIV Pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP), we could prevent about 8 new HIV infections each year.
- We estimate that if all Oregonians who know they are HIV infected were virally suppressed (e.g., achieved and maintained undetectable viral loads), we could prevent over two-thirds of new HIV infections.
