Partner Webinar Survey Results

Overview: A survey was conducted with people who attended one or more 2022 webinars to gather partner input on future topics, how often to hold webinars, and ensure we are meeting accessibility needs. 108 partners responded.

- A majority prefer monthly webinars
- Most attended 2 or more webinars
- 96% said we are meeting their accessibility needs
- 91% said the webinars have been a valuable resource for me/my organization
- Medical programs and communication and outreach to community partners are the most popular areas of interest

COVID-19 Federal PHE Unwinding Timeline and Updates

Through the Public Health Emergency (PHE), people have stayed covered on Medicaid

Family First Coronavirus Response Act:

- 1. Allowed individuals to stay on OHP during the federal public health emergency.
- 2. Made it easier for individuals to enroll.

What we know now:



President Biden recently announced that the Federal COVID-19 PHE will **end May 11**, **2023**.



Starting April 1, Oregon must begin medical renewals for more than 1.4 million individuals who are on OHP. Oregon will have 14 months to complete renewals.

Significant Changes Coming to Other Programs

Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP)

- End of SNAP Emergency Allotments
- Able bodied adults without dependents will have time limits again

Dental Coverage

New Veteran Dental coverage



Eligibility and Reporting

- People who turned 65 during the pandemic need to transition from OHP to Medicare to avoid penalty
- Changes to capture demographic information (e.g., race, ethnicity, language, disability, sexual orientation, and gender identity expression)
- Federal reporting requirements

Childcare

 Updates to child-care eligibility (HB3073)

The Goal: Preserve Benefits


Ensure all people and families eligible for benefits offered through the ONE system receive and continue to receive services in a timely manner without interruption

Give those **no longer eligible for benefits clear direction and coordination** of additional resources

Give those who assist people receiving benefits clear information about how they can help

Changes coming to OHP and SNAP

Changes to OHP

What is changing in 2023:

- We now know OHP renewals begin April 1, 2023, set by the federal funding bill passed December 2022
- Once kids are renewed for OHP:
 - Kids under age 6 will not need to renew each year
 - Kids ages 6 18 will only need to renew every two years
- Oregon will permanently cover postpartum individuals on OHP for 12 months, with the exception of those who are on CWM+ who will only have 60 days postpartum coverage.

Changes to OHP

What does this mean for people who rely on benefits?

- Oregonians will be informed what they need to do to keep or change their coverage.
 - OHP enrollees will have 90 days to submit information to redetermine their eligibility for OHP.
 - People who are no longer eligible for OHP benefits will receive a 60-day closure notice.
 - The Marketplace will contact individuals no longer eligible for OHP to advise of coverage options through the Marketplace.
- OHA and ODHS will be creating resources for OHP members and staff to be prepared for April 1st.

Changes to SNAP Emergency Allotments (EA)

- SNAP EA have been provided every month since April 2020. Households
 received a minimum EA benefit of \$95 each month, but the exact amount varied
 based on household size and recipient's regular SNAP amount.
- In December 2022, approximately 426,000 SNAP households received about \$70 million in EA food benefits in addition to their regular SNAP benefits.
- February 2023 will be the last month Oregon can distribute EA benefits to households.
- There are no hearing rights for loss of SNAP EA food benefits. The federal government decided to no longer make these payments for any SNAP household.

Important Change to SNAP Benefits

Starting: DATE

Background

Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, SNAP households have been receiving two payments every month from the SNAP program. The first payment is the regular SNAP benefit, and the second payment is the Emergency Allotment related to the COVID-19 emergency.

What is changing?

The COVID-19 emergency period is ending. Starting in June, the federal funding for additional SNAP benefits is going away. This means May will be the last month that Oregonians will receive the Emergency Allotment payment. Oregonians will continue to receive their regular SNAP allotment. That is not impacted by this change.

Additional Information

Emergency allotment amounts have been different based on the number of people in the household, but most households will have a significant decrease in SNAP when they no longer receive the Emergency Allotments. Oregonians with an Applicant Portal account can find the specific amount of SNAP benefits they will continue to receive on their My Dashboard. Steps to view this amount in the Applicant Portal are located on the back of this page.

Oregonians can also check their EBT Edge account at www.EBTedge.com to review their regular benefit amount. This is the amount received between the 1st and the 9th of the month listed in the transaction history section.

Because this is a federal decision, so the Oregon Department of Human Services (ODHS) will not be able to supplement the decrease in benefits. We encourage households to budget accordingly and reach out to their local resources.

Regular SNAP

Emergency Allotment

No changes to this payment. SNAP household will continue to see this payment ongoing.

Date Available Between the 1st and 9th of the month This allotment will end in May. In June, this benefit will be removed and cause a decrease in benefits.

Date Available Usually paid on the 11th or 12th of the month



Summer P-EBT

- Retroactive issuance of 2022 Summer P-EBT will happen in mid-March
- Households will receive a lump sum of \$391 for each eligible child
 - Children under age 6 who received SNAP at any time between June 1 and August 31, 2022
 - School-aged children eligible for free or reduced meals during the last month of the 2021-22 school year
- Eligible households will receive a notice in the mail in mid-March (one for each child)
- A webpage and Summer P-EBT call center will be in place beforehand

Need food right now?

Free meals are available over the summer. Children 18 years and younger may receive free meals and snacks through the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) and Seamless Summer Option (SSO). To find a summer meals site nearest to you visit www.summerfoodoregon.org, text "Food" or "Comida" to 304-304, or call 2-1-1.



SNAP (formerly food stamps) helps you buy groceries. Apply today. Find all the information you need at benefits.oregon.gov where you can apply for SNAP, cash, insurance, childcare and domestic violence assistance all in one place. Dial 211 or call your local ODHS office with questions. Receive food assistance while waiting for your unemployment insurance.



Food pantries, pick-up sites and delivery options: Oregon Food Bank's network of 1,400+ partner pantries and food assistance sites are open across Oregon and Southwest Washington. Many offer drive/walk-up or direct delivery options. Visit oregonfoodfinder.org for local locations,



WIC offers healthy food and nutrition and breastfeeding support for families with kids under age 5 and for pregnant women. Go to healthoregon.org/wic and click the WIC Interest Form button. You can also call 2-1-1 and ask to speak with a maternal and child health specialist. New participants are welcome!



Need meals if you're 60+ or live with a disability?

The Aging and Disability Resource Connection (ADRC) of Oregon's Older Adult Meals Program ("Meals on Wheels") provides meals for people across Oregon, Anyone 60+ can receive these meals, There are no income requirements and no charge for meals. Keep their mailing address, phone number, and email address current to ensure they receive vital information about their benefits.




Watch for letters about their benefits from the state.
