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Licensed child care	The services are provided by licensed child care center, licensed child care home, and registered child care home regulated by the state. These services include care and supervision provided to an individual's child(ren), less than 14 years of age and for less than 24 hours per day, while the individual is participating in treatment and/or recovery support activities. These services must be provided in a manner that complies with State law regarding child care facilities. 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Parenting education/child development	Services that facilitate quality parenting provided to individuals and/or their families and facilitate the instruction of evidence based parenting skills, provide information and advocacy on child development, age appropriate needs and expectations, teaching, modeling and monitoring , successful parenting techniques, demonstration of appropriate discipline strategies, and provision of parenting support groups. 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Parenting support group	Supportive group work led by a trained parenting professional and/or trained peer to facilitate meetings focused on strengthening parenting skills. Group work allows individuals to share feedback and suggestions regarding parenting with a focus on those who are specifically parenting in recovery.	Comply with state laws. 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Peer-to-Peer Support	Build a mutual relationship with people with substance use challenges in order to do the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Support peers in identifying their strengths, values, dreams, and goals; • Support peers to become socially involved with others and the community of their choosing ; • Share problem-solving skills; • Facilitate the development of resources the peer identifies as needing to meet their goals ; • Share “lived experience” that promotes resiliency and recovery; and • Model a healthy recovery. 	Peer Delivered Services (PDS) means an array of agency or community-based services and supports provided by peers, peer support specialists, and recovery mentors to individuals with addictions disorders Peer means any person supporting an individual, who has similar life experience, they may be: (a) A self-identified person currently or formerly receiving addiction services and in in recovery from a substance use disorder, who meets the abstinence requirements for recovering staff in alcohol and other drug treatment programs; or (b) A self-identified person in recovery from a substance use	15 minutes (individual) 15 minutes (group)	\$16.00 \$3.00

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Peer-to-Peer Support (Continued)		Certification requirements include the following; <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • You must be over 18 • You must Not be listed on the Medicaid provider exclusion list • You must identify as a peer as indicated above. 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Peer-to-Peer Support (Continued)		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Pass a criminal history background check administered by the OHA background check unit (BCU) or if certified by ACCBO their criminal background check • They must be under the supervision of a qualified clinical supervisor. 		

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Recovery Housing	Recovery housing is a direct service that provides supervised, short-term housing to individuals with substance use disorders. Consumer must have access to the housing facility 24 hours per day. These services include transitional housing, recovery living centers or homes, supported independent living, sober housing, short-term and emergency or temporary housing. These services provide a safe, clean, and sober environment for adults with substance use disorders. This service is paid for on a weekly basis not to exceed 4 weeks.	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. To be eligible for recovery housing, the consumer shall be participating in a department certified and contracted alcohol or drug treatment and rehabilitation program or a recovery support program. 2. Recovery housing levels of support and supervision of consumers shall include one (1) of the following: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Peer-run: At least weekly house meetings facilitated by staff; or b. Monitored: At least a daily monitoring visit by staff; or c. Supervised: 24-hour supervision of consumers by staff, with a minimum of three (3) different staff members providing supervision per 24-hour period. 	1 unit= 1 week	1 unit =\$125 Maximum of 4 units per individual

Each recovery housing provider shall have a written consumer rental agreement policy that includes, at a minimum, the following requirements: a. An explanation of the housing arrangements shall be posted in all housing units; b. The grounds for termination of the rental agreement; c. The terms of the agreement shall be established and explained to each consumer at admission to housing services; and d. If a consumer enters into a rental agreement for housing with the recovery support organization, a signed copy of that rental agreement shall be kept in the

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Spiritual & faith-based support	Faith-based framework may include spiritually based recovery support as well as formal religious instructions. Spiritual-based instruction and/or support in the use of faith to promote recovery may include curriculum such as The Genesis Project, Living Free, and Celebrate Recovery, etc. Recovery support options may include programs such as Stephens Ministry who may act as recovery mentors from a spiritual perspective. Native American spiritual practices may include talking circles and sweat lodges. 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Telephonic/ Email engagement and recovery check-up	<p>Telephone communication provides encouragement, motivation, and support through collaborative problem solving and personal relationships. Must connect with individual, brief encounter less than 15 minutes.</p> <p>Email engagement, recovery check-up and coordination. Once an individual responds to a providers email they can bill for the brief encounter.</p>	At a minimum possess a high school diploma (degree preferred). Ability to engage and facilitate recovery services through oral and written communication. Ability to advocate, collaborate, coordinate recovery services with community stakeholders.	1 unit= less than 15 minutes	\$5.00
