

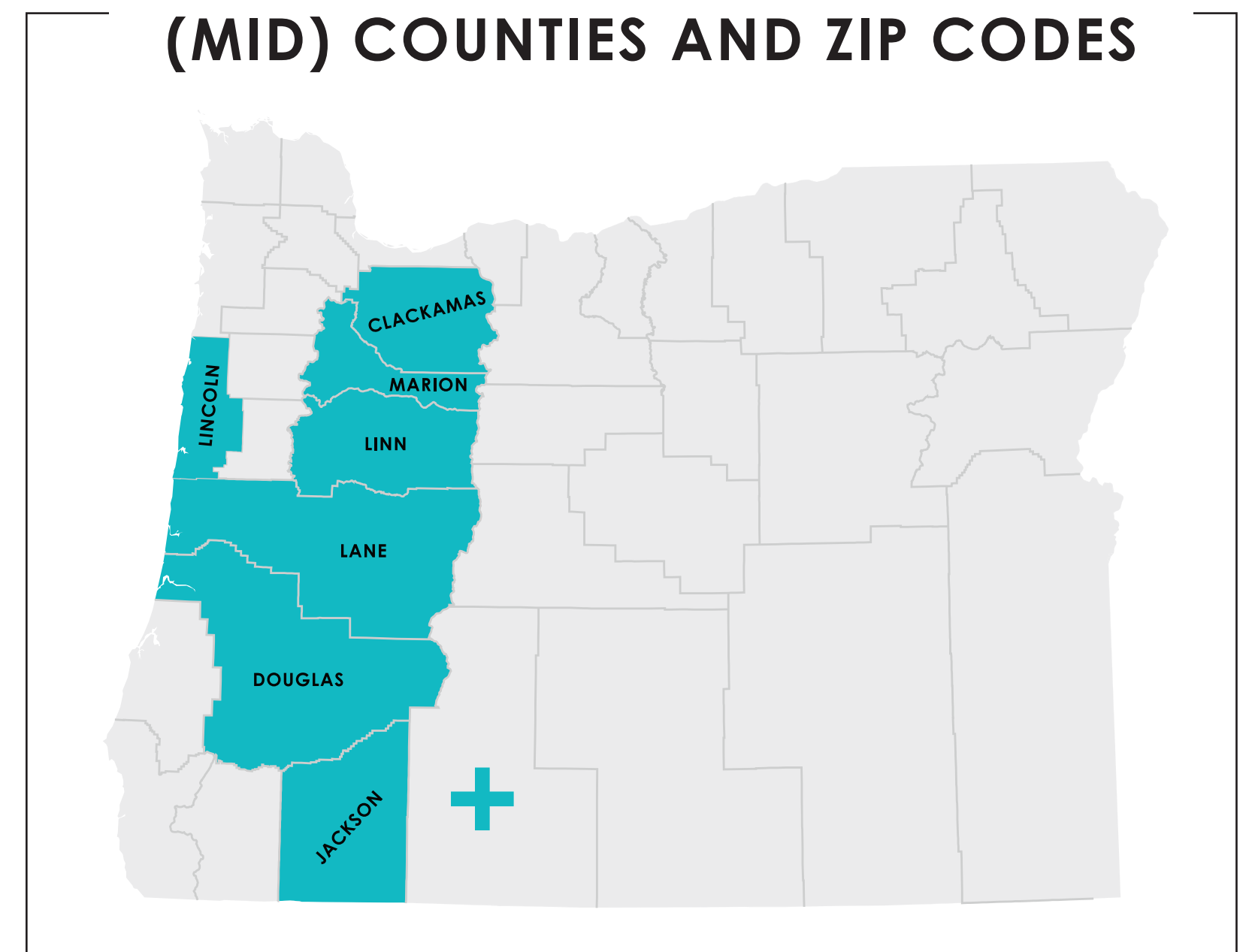
REOREGON PROGRAMS FUNDED THROUGH

Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR)

The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) gives CDBG-DR (Disaster Recovery) funding after major disasters to help with recovery. CDBG-DR can help pay for housing, infrastructure, economic revitalization, and mitigation (efforts to reduce the damage of future disasters). The funds help households and communities in the “most-impacted and distressed” areas recover. HUD requires:

- At least **70%** of Disaster Recovery funding must be used for projects that will directly benefit low- and moderate-income residents. (This can include infrastructure that mostly serves low- and moderate-income residents.)
- At least **15%** of funds must be used to mitigate future disasters. Mitigating means reducing risks to life and property.
- At least **80%** of the funds must be spent in Clackamas, Douglas, Jackson, Lane, Lincoln, Linn, and Marion counties. The state also has chosen to include Klamath County.

ACTION PLAN

To receive Disaster Recovery funds, the state must complete an Action Plan for HUD to review. The first step was a “Needs Assessment.” HUD requires some specific data to be included in a needs assessment. In addition, the OHCS team heard from many survivors about large gaps in insurance coverage, in part due to rising building costs. Based on both, we concluded that the greatest need is clearly housing recovery.

- ✓ Programs will likely begin accepting applications in 2023.
- ✓ The Action Plan can and will be changed. Amendments or changes to the plan can include any part of the plan, including re-allocating budgets and adding new programs.
