Lawmakers reviewed several proposals to expand the geographic coverage of bottle bill redemption centers statewide. <u>SB 992 Enrolled</u>, led by Senator Sollman, was introduced as a legislative package addressing multiple objectives. The bill included provisions such as OLCC's requirement for small retail dealers to accept container returns between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. SB 992 aims to update the container return system with a focus on public safety and accessibility.
