## DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

The NCOIC of the Electrical Systems Element leads, manages, and directs military personnel in the installation, operation, maintenance, and repair of high and low-voltage electrical distribution systems, and airfield lighting. As a critical Senior NCO within the Civil Engineer Operations Flight, the NCOIC is responsible for electrical safety program management, resource allocation, and the technical execution of utility grid maintenance. This position requires an expert leader who ensures Prime BEEF readiness, drives deliberate enlisted development, and maintains continuous, reliable power to support wing/installation mission-critical operations.

### Duties and Responsibilities:

- **Leadership & Personnel Management:** Directs the daily operations of the Electrical Systems element, providing mentorship, performance feedback, and professional development for assigned military and civilian personnel. Cultivates a high-trust, safety-first culture.

- Grid & Utility Management: Oversees the maintenance, troubleshooting, and repair of overhead and underground electrical distribution systems (up to 34.5 kV), substations, transformers, and street/area lighting.
- Airfield Lighting & Emergency Power: Superintends the operational reliability of critical airfield lighting systems (visual air navigation aids), ensuring uninterrupted flight line operations and power redundancy for command and control facilities.
- Electrical Safety Program Authority: Serves as the primary authority and enforcer of the Air Force Electrical Safety Program, National Electrical Code (NEC), National Electrical Safety Code (NESC), and NFPA 70E standards. Enforces strict arc flash safety protocols and lockout/tag-out (LOTO) procedures.
- Resource & Material Stewardship: Manages element budget, coordinates utility service outages, and oversees the procurement of high-voltage equipment, specialized diagnostic tools (e.g., thermal imagers and meters), and line-maintenance vehicles.
- Readiness & Contingency Operations: Ensures maximum operational readiness for Prime BEEF deployment requirements. Directs contingency training programs encompassing bare base electrical grid design, Mobile Aircraft Arresting System (MAAS) installation, and emergency power distribution.
- Other duties as required

The following items may result in disqualification:

- No record of disciplinary action resulting in an Article 15 for committing acts of misconduct or engaging in an unprofessional or inappropriate relationship as defined in AFI 36-2909, Professional and Unprofessional Relationships or documented failures to exercise sound leadership principles with respect to morale or welfare of subordinates and peers, leadership or customers.
- Never been convicted by a civilian court of Category 1, 2, or 3 offenses, nor exceeded the accepted number of Category 4 offenses. Category 3 and 4 minor traffic violations and similar infractions are not disqualifying.
  - NOTE: Categories of offenses are described and listed in AFI 36-2002, Regular Air Force and Special Category Accession, Uniform Guide List of Typical Offenses.
- No record of substance abuse, financial irresponsibility, domestic violence, or child abuse. Never been convicted by a general, special, or summary courts-martial.

Must maintain minimum grade of E-6.

Must maintain local network access IAW AFI 17-130, Cybersecurity Program Management and AFMAN 17-1
