

# Land & Water Conservation Fund **Grant Program**

- LWCF Act was passed by Congress in 1964
  - To create parks and open spaces
  - Protect wilderness, wetlands, and refuges
  - Preserve wildlife habitat; and
  - Enhance recreational opportunities









# One Fund, Two Programs

### Federal Side

Land acquisition for the natural, cultural, wildlife, and recreation management objectives of federal land management agencies


# State Matching Grant Program

Matching grants to States and through States to local governments for the acquisition and development of public outdoor recreation areas and facilities

# Ownership / Control of Property

Facilities may be developed on land and water that is:

- Owned in fee simple by the sponsoring agency (Deed)
- Leased land or Easements that provide permanent control of the property.
  - Leased from Federal Government with no less than 25 years remaining on the lease and is not revocable at will; **OR**
  - Leased from one public agency to another for 25 years or more, provided that safeguards are included to adequately ensure the perpetual use requirement contained in the LWCF Act.





### Eligible Project Types

- Acquisition
- Development
- Major Rehabilitation and/or Renovation
- Acquisition & Development (Combination)

### **Grant Limits**

- Min: \$50,000
- Max: No fixed amount (max. grant request for a single project shall not exceed the total funds available)











Acquisition of lands and waters, or interests therein may be accomplished through purchase, transfer or by gift.









- Willing seller/donor/tenants/relocation
- Waiver of retroactivity (requires NPS and OPRD approval <u>before</u> closing)
- Three-year future development requirement
- Plan for structures
- Environmental screening
- Preliminary title report
- UASFLA/Yellow book appraisal and appraisal review (12-month shelf life)

  Waiver valuation may be used instead of an appraisal if the property is valued under \$25,000





### Eligible acquisitions:

- New areas
- Additions to existing parks, forests, wildlife areas, beaches or other similar areas dedicated to public outdoor recreation
- Natural areas and preserves may be acquired but must be open to the general public for outdoor recreation use to the extent that natural attributes of the areas will not be seriously impaired or lost
- LWCF assistance may be used to acquire only modest structures which are to be used primarily for outdoor recreation or outdoor recreation support activities.





### Ineligible acquisitions:

- Historic sites and structures
- Museums and sites to be used for museums or archeological excavations
- Areas and facilities to meet a public school's minimum site size requirements
- Areas and facilities designed to be used primarily for semiprofessional and professional arts and athletics
- Lands, areas, and facilities to be used solely for preservation or production of wildlife; other wildlife areas that exclude the public; and fish hatcheries (such areas may be eligible if they will be open to the public for compatible recreation uses and development)





### Ineligible acquisitions:

- Areas for indoor facilities
- Areas with railroad "hardware," trestles, stations, yards
- Site containing luxury lodges, motels, restaurants
- Agricultural land primarily for preservation in agricultural purposes
- Federal surplus property

# Development/Rehab Projects

- Control and Tenure: fee simple
- Proposed design/site plan
- Environmental screening
- Federal permitting







- May consist of one improvement or a group of related improvements designed to provide <u>basic</u> facilities for outdoor recreation including:
  - Facilities for access, safety, health and protection of the area;
  - Required for the outdoor recreation use of the area.
- Construction, renovation, site planning, demolition, site preparation, and architectural services





## Eligible projects include but are not limited to:

- Sports and playfields
- Picnic facilities
- Trails
- Swimming facilities
- Boating facilities
- Fishing/hunting facilities
- Camping
- Community gardens
- Support facilities, and more...







### Ineligible:

- Indoor facilities such as community centers, historic buildings, meeting rooms, maintenance buildings and equipment.
- Routine maintenance / repair includes work such as cleanup, painting, and minor repairs of buildings, structures, equipment and utilities for maintaining facilities.
- Professional facilities and areas designed for semi-professional arts or athletics.
- Exhibit areas for academic, historic, economic, entertainment or nonrecreational purposes.
- Exclusive use areas only open to one particular group / organization
- Acquisition of historic sites, archaeological sites, historic structures and museums.
- Acquisition of land to help meet public schools minimum site size requirement.
- Equipment to be used for the maintenance of outdoor recreation areas and facilities, including automotive equipment, tractors, mowers, other machinery, and tools.





Ineligible projects: Support facilities or portions of support facilities which contribute primarily to public indoor activities such as:

- Meeting rooms
- Auditoriums
- Libraries
- Study areas
- Restaurants
- Lodges

- Motels
- Luxury cabins
- Furnishings
- Food preparation equipment
- Kitchens
- Equipment sales areas





### Rehabilitation

- Major rehabilitation means the repair, restoration, or reconstruction of facilities
  - Facility is beyond its normal life expectancy or obsolete
  - Destroyed by fire, natural disaster or vandalism
  - Does not meet health and safety code / requirements (building code changes)
  - Requires rehabilitation to ensure critical natural resource protection
  - Does not meet access requirements of the American with Disabilities Act
  - Changing recreational needs dictate a change in the type of recreation area or facility required





### Rehabilitation

- Major rehabilitation projects do not involve routine maintenance or repair work.
- Routine maintenance/repair includes work such as cleanup, painting, and minor repairs of buildings, structures, equipment and utilities merely maintaining portions of such facilities in a sound and useful state.





# Readiness Requirements

- LWCF is a "shovel-ready" program
- Land use compatibility
- Cultural resources review
- Environmental review
- Federal permits





## Section 106: Cultural Resources

National Historic Preservation Act, Section 106:

Consider the effects of actions on historic properties and ensure reasonable action is taken to avoid, minimize or mitigate harm to resources.





## Section 106: Cultural Resources

- Required for all LWCF projects
- A complete application and developed design will assist the Section 106 process
- OPRD will initiate consultation with the SHPO/THPO
- NPS will initiate tribal consultation
- Depending on the results of consultation, additional work may be required to complete the Section 106 process
- Final determinations are made by NPS
- Costs of compliance = eligible match costs (if project is awarded)





The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process requires all federal agencies to consider the environmental impacts of proposed federal actions and alternatives on the human environment.

The goal of NEPA is to ensure public participation and informed decision making. NEPA requires all federal agencies to:


- 1) analyze the impacts of and alternatives to proposed major federal actions
- 2) use the analysis in deciding whether to proceed with the proposed actions
- 3) involve the interested and affected public before any decision affecting the human environment is made.





### **Intergovernmental Consultation:**

- Highly recommended to start this right away!







- OPRD will consult with USFWS about projects selected for funding



- Required for all LWCF projects
- Well-informed Environmental Resources Survey (A&R Form, Section 3.0) will assist the NEPA process
- Expertise: ensure form authors are qualified to assess data and respond to questions
- Documentation: cite existing studies and reports
- Most projects will qualify for Categorical Exclusion from further environmental review
- NPS may concur with another federal agency's NEPA determination (e.g., USACE)

### CATEGORICAL EXCLUSIONS FOR WHICH DOCUMENTATION IS

A variety of CEs exist for actions that generally result in some level of environmental impact but that do not have the potential to cause significant adverse impacts under normal circumstances. For such actions, documentation is required indicating that the action fits within a CE and that no extraordinary circumstances exist. Documenting the use of a CE provides the NPS an opportunity to demonstrate why

- Changes or amendments to an approved action when such changes would cause no or only minimal environmental impact.
- Minor boundary changes.

Guidance: This CE applies to boundary changes that are accomplished through existing statutory authorities, such as including an area within a park boundary and maintaining the area as open space, or including a historic structure within the boundaries of a park unit and retaining tha


- 3. Reissuance/renewal of permits, rights-of-way, or easements not in new environmental impacts.
- 4. Conversion of existing permits to rights-of-way when such conversions not continue or initiate unsatisfactory environmental conditio
- 5. Issuances, extensions, renewals, reissuances, or minor modifications of concession contracts or permits not entailing new construction.
- 6. Commercial use licenses involving no construction.





# LWCF Boundary Map

- Places <u>entire park</u> (not just funded area or improvements) under LWCF conversion policy in perpetuity in order to assure the protection of a viable recreation area
- The entire LWCF boundary area gets committed to public outdoor recreation use in perpetuity.
- Early coordination is strongly recommended!
- Disclose existing third-party rights and infrastructure serving outside the park
- OPRD and NPS pre-approval to consider exceptions for a lesser area. Reviewed on a caseby-cases basis prior to award of a grant.







# LWCF Conversion Policy - Legal Protection for LWCF-Assisted Sites

Section 6(f)(3) of the LWCF Act (now codified at 54 U.S.C. § 200305(f)(3)) and its implementing regulations at 36 C.F.R. Part 59 requires that:

no property acquired or developed with LWCF assistance shall be converted to other than public outdoor recreation uses without the approval of the Secretary of the Interior, and only if the Secretary finds it to be in accordance with the then existing SCORP

and only upon such conditions as the Secretary deems necessary to assure the substitution of other recreation properties of at least equal fair market value and of reasonably equivalent usefulness and location.






# LWCF Conversion Policy

Situations that trigger a conversion include:

- Property interests are conveyed for private use or non-public outdoor recreation uses.
- Non-outdoor recreation uses (public or private) are made of the project area or a portion thereof, including those occurring on pre-existing rights-of-way and easements, or by a lessor.
- Unallowable indoor facilities are developed within the project area without NPS concurrence, such as unauthorized public facilities and sheltering of an outdoor facility.
- Public outdoor recreation use of property acquired or developed with LWCF assistance is terminated.





- Overlay of known critical habitat of Threatened and Endangered Species (if present)
- Overlay of known Easements and/or Leases (if present)

- Endangered Species Act (ESA)



# **Build America, Buy America Act**

- 1. All iron and steel used in the project are produced in the United States-this means all manufacturing processes, from the initial melting stage through the application of coatings, occurred in the United States;
- 2. All manufactured products used in the project are produced in the United States this means the manufactured product was manufactured in the United States; and the cost of the components of the manufactured product that are mined, produced, or manufactured in the United States is greater than 55 percent of the total cost of all components of the manufactured product, unless another standard for determining the minimum amount of domestic content of the manufactured product has been established under applicable law or regulation; and
- 3. All construction materials are manufactured in the United States this means that all manufacturing processes for the construction material occurred in the United States.





# **Build America, Buy America Act**

- Exemption projects that are not considered infrastructure
  - Past projects exempted include playgrounds, parking areas, pedestrian bridge, campground, visitor center, trails, and more
- General Applicability Waivers may be available:
  - Projects under \$250,000
  - Waiver for up to 5% of total applicable project costs, up to \$1M

- Detailed budget
- Include sufficient line items to show all major work elements
- Identify all sources of match (e.g. labor, cash, donations, etc.)
- Do not include "Contingency" as a line item.
- Identify pre-agreement costs and the earliest date the costs were incurred



### **Allowable Sources of Match**

- Other OPRD grant programs (RTP, LGGP, and COG)
- Grants
- Local budgeted funds
- Agency force account & equipment use







 Pre-agreement costs are allowable as match if incurred within three years prior to application submission to the NPS

Architectural & Engineering / Design, cultural resources, environmental review, site planning, feasibility studies, preparation of construction drawings and specifications

- Must be described in the application and identified in the budget
- Consider application/award/construction start timeline and estimate costs accordingly
- Professional costs (whether pre-agreement or not) can only be a maximum of 15% of total project cost





Volunteer labor: must be documented with a volunteer labor timesheet.

- Consistent with those regular rates paid for similar work in other activities of the state
- Valued at the rate paid as a general laborer unless the person is professionally skilled in the work being performed (i.e., plumber doing work on pipes, mason doing work on a brick building).
- Laborer's wages may be charged in the amount of that which the city or cities in the immediate area pay their city employees for performing similar duties.





- Donated materials: Should be reasonable and should not exceed current market prices at the time they are charged to the project. Records of in-kind contributions of material shall indicate the fair market value by listing the comparable prices and vendors.
- Donated equipment: Hourly rate shall not exceed its fairrental value. Hourly rates in the annual edition of Rental Compilation or Rental Rate Guide or similar publications that provide the national or regional average rates for construction equipment may be used.






- Donated property: The value of donated real property shall be established by an independent appraiser in accord with the Uniform Appraisal Standards for Federal Land Acquisitions, or "Yellow Book".
- Donated property must occur within the project period (after Notice to Proceed has been issued by OPRD)





### **Application Tips**

- Get started early: some attachments require an outside entity to reply (State Natural Agency review)
- Start with the <u>Pre-Application worksheets</u>, then copy/paste responses into online application
- Read and follow application instructions carefully
- Save the online application often!

## **Application Tips**

- Aim to submit early in case of technical issues
- Don't bury key elements
- Be concise use plain language
- Use pictures, diagrams, plans and maps instead of long confusing descriptions
- Avoid voluminous attachments
- Please be patient the LWCF program tends to take longer than our other OPRD recreation grant programs







# What makes a good project?

- Public involvement
- Partnering with external sources for match, donations, contributions
- Local match available and secured
- Enough information to commit to an LWCF boundary required for perpetual compliance

- Demonstrated financial need
- Good access, visibility
- Inclusive, accessible
- Planning
- Grass-roots community support
- Project readiness







### Be mindful of...

- Having a scope of work not well-defined and subject to significant changes
- Compliance issues with previous LWCF projects
- No public access
- Inaccurate maps or documents
- Failing to disclose all pertinent information
- Reminder: Do not begin ground disturbance (or acquire property) before receiving Notice to Proceed!





### **Common Pitfalls**

- Not proofreading before submitting
- Inaccurate or unrealistic budget
- Not requesting enough money
- Ineligible match
- Timing
- No communication







# What to Expect if Your Project is Recommended for Funding

- Pre-award inspection
- Finalize all required documents
- Go over timing
- Respond quickly to requests for additional information





## **Grantee Responsibilities**

- Progress reports quarterly
- Accurate record keeping
- Request for reimbursements
- Complete project within project period, usually 2 years
- Amendments/extensions are possible but not guaranteed
- Project area and/or facility must meet ADA requirements
- Plan for staff transitions





## **Long-Term Compliance**

- Retention and use LWCF boundary in tact and property being used for outdoor recreation purposes
- Property shall be maintained so it appears attractive and inviting to the public.
- Property shall be kept reasonably safe for public use.
- Property shall be kept in **reasonable repair** throughout their estimated lifetime to prevent undue deterioration.
- The facility shall be kept open for public use at reasonable hours and times of the year, according to the type of area or facility.





# **Long-Term Compliance**

- Signing. Is the area properly signed to allow for user information and safety, and proper acknowledgement of the federal Land and Water Conservation Fund?
- Interim use. Where lands have been acquired but not yet developed, the inspection should determine whether the interim uses of the property are in accordance with agreements with the NPS.
