Fifty years - it is still the law

The National Historic Preservation Act of 1966

This year's Oregon Archaeology Celebration focuses on the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA), which turns 50 years old on October 15, 2016. This landmark legislation is a cornerstone of historic preservation in the United States. It was created in the knowledge that too many important historic places were being lost to post-World War II construction and development, and that the federal government should play an important role in protecting places that embody our country's cultural heritage. Over the past 50 years, the NHPA has been amended to serve historic preservation work more efficiently and inclusively.

Historic preservation is a discussion of our past relative to our future. It provides us opportunities to ask, "What is important in our history?" and "What parts of our past can we preserve for the future?" Through historic preservation, we look at history in different ways, ask different questions of the past, and learn new things about our history and ourselves. Historic preservation is an important way for us to transmit our understanding of the past to future generations.

Our nation's history has many facets, and historic preservation helps tell these stories. Sometimes historic preservation involves celebrating events, people, places, and ideas that we are proud of; other times it involves recognizing moments in our history that can be painful or uncomfortable to remember.

Oregon Archaeology Celebration events provide learning experiences for everyone. We invite you to join us in celebrating our heritage by participating in events that are offered this year. Please remember that archaeological sites are an important part of our heritage but they are also fragile. If you visit an archaeological or historical site, please treat the site with respect so that others may enjoy it as well. State and federal laws prohibit site damage or the removal of artifacts from sites.

Both within and outside the Federal government, many people work in historic preservation. Archaeologists, architects, curators, historians, landscape architects, and other cultural resource professionals provide advice, oversight, recommendations, and nominations to the National Register of Historic Places. From designation of historic sites (state, federally, and privately owned) to documentation (written, photographic, and technical reports, as well as oral histories), to physical preservation (stabilization, rehabilitation, restoration, and reconstruction) of significant cultural sites, the NHPA provides our citizens with diverse locations, environments, and stories to experience, enjoy, and protect for generations to come.
