

Stewardship, Collaboration, and Outreach

The Dittman Biface Cache, the first recorded in the Willamette Valley, might have remained unknown had it not been for an Abiqua Academy teacher, David Dittman, who reported the find to the State Historic Preservation Office in 2015. Volunteer archaeologists, specialists, and tribes collaborated to document and study the site, adding to our knowledge of past trade networks.

Community outreach and media exposure have encouraged people to report archaeological sites on their property. The site continues to inspire research, showing that the true value of artifacts is what we can learn.
