Guidebook for Main Streets

The Vibrant Oregon Downtowns Resource Guidebook (the Guidebook) presents enduring best practices, success stories and additional resources for improving small downtowns, recognizing that change is inevitable, the future is uncertain, and adaptability is paramount. The Guidebook is made possible by Oregon's Transportation and Growth Management Program (TGM). How Community Engagement Improves Historic Preservation

Team Better Block – Overcoming Adoption Challenges for Revitalization Projects

One of the challenges Main Streets face is garnering widespread adoption for downtown revitalization projects, especially when they impact traffic patterns and built environment. Elected officials and government leaders are hesitant to invest in built environment projects without the confidence they'll be supported and effective. In this field session with Andrew Howard, one of the leading voices in community revitalization, and with the cooperation of the City of Klamath Falls, you'll learn how to make incremental changes that gradually build adoption for large scale, transformative projects. And you'll get your hands dirty (hopefully only figuratively) and participate in actually creating some of these incremental changes! Railroad's Coming - We Need a Trolley! (Historic Streetcar Tour) - limited to 10 participants

As Klamath prepared for the coming of the California Northeastern Railroad in the early 1900s, the city made plans for a streetcar system to facilitate travel up and down Main Street. On this tour, your'll trace the original trolley route on a replica streetcar similar to the one that operated in the early 1900s. Led by staff with the Klamath County Museum, the tour will focus on what the town looked like when the original trolley ran. At that time, there were few brick buildings in town, few cars on the road, and livery stables were common in the downtown area.

Leveraging Public Resources to Encourage Downtown Investment

A transformation is happening in downtown Klamath Falls in adapting, reusing, and restoring the historic character of the district's buildings. On this tour see how local and state funds are helping to leverage private dollars to create upper floor housing and other exciting development projects in previously vacant or underutilized space and to bring back the historic character of buildings to help new and existing businesses flourish.

Placemaking on Main

The Klamath Falls Downtown Association has continuously advocated for projects that activate certain components of its downtown and has leveraged partnerships with local stakeholders and community groups to make downtown more inviting and the district less prone to vandalism. On this tour see and hear about many of these projects including the award-winning utility box art and Klamath Piano projects. You will walk away inspired to create your own downtown projects!

More Than Just Open Space: Integrating Public Trails and Parks In Downtown

Unique to other communities its size, Downtown Klamath Falls is home to four City parks. On this tour you'll visit these parks — each with its own distinct character — and learn how the City of Klamath Falls, in collaboration with KFDA and other stakeholders, have leveraged vacant space, an up-and-coming trail system and the existing built environment to provide an urban parks system that serves and inspires its community.

Architecture of Klamath's Booming Era

In the 1910s and '20s, Klamath Falls was the fastest growing city in Oregon, fueled by income from timber and irrigated agriculture. This half-mile walking tour will focus on some of downtown's most beautiful buildings erected during that time.

What's Up Downtown: Resources for Upper Story Revitalization

Many of Oregon's historic downtowns have unused or underutilized space in their upper stories. At the same time, Oregon is experiencing housing shortages that make it difficult for residents to find affordable accommodations and for employers to attract and retain workers. Many communities also need lodging, co-office space, and other facilities. The use of existing buildings can provide a cost-effective solution for these needs. Oregon Heritage, the Oregon Main Street Program, and the UO's Institute for Policy Research & Engagement partnered on a project to investigate barriers to upper story revitalization and reuse. This session will feature an overview of the study findings and an introduction to the toolbox, including a step-by-step guide to inventory downtowns and will focus on practices that local downtown associations can use to encourage upper stories utilization.

Extraordinary Placemaking Projects in Oregon

Learn about three new amazing placemaking efforts: the 2022 Northwest Mural Fest which brought together hundreds of Walldogs volunteers who painted more than 14 murals in just five days in downtown The Dalles; the Freewater Square project which transformed a vacant gravel lot into a space to host live events, food trucks, and act as a public space where people can congregate as well as small, converted storage buildings for use by start-up businesses; and the Klamath Falls Alleyway Art project which was a recent recipient of an AARP grant to improve the overall appearance of the alleys and to make them more inviting and safe . Learn how these projects came together and how they are already making a positive impact in the communities.
