## **Cooking Fire Safety** Stay in the Kitchen: Remind everyone in the household to never leave the kitchen unattended while cooking. **Keep Flammable Items Away:** Inspect the kitchen for items like towels and curtains that may be too close to hot surfaces like the stove, toaster, or convection oven. **Use a Timer:** Practice using a timer to remind you when food is cooking. **Watch Your Cooking:** Fires start when the heat is too high. If you see any smoke or the grease starts to boil, turn the burner off. **Electrical Fire Safety Inspect Electrical Cords:** Check all electrical cords for damage and replace any frayed or cracked cords. **Avoid Overloading Outlets:** Check electrical outlets or power strips for having too many devices plugged in at once (limit single outlets to only one high voltage appliance like a toaster, microwave, or space heaters). **Use Surge Protectors:** Identify devices and appliances that could be damaged by power surges and use surge protectors for these items. **Unplug Unused Devices:** Inspect the homes for appliances and

devices that stay plugged in; make the plugs easy to reach and practice unplugging when

they are not in use.
