COMMUNITY OUTREACH



Alsea River Clean Up

Trooper Butler assisted ODFW staff and members of the Alsea Sportsman's Association during the Alsea River clean up. The event was sponsored by SOLVE and Dahl Disposal Service. Over thirty participants cleaned up trash downstream from Campbell boat ramp in Benton County to Alsea Bay using motorized/non-motorized watercraft and on the shore. In total, participants filled a large dump trailer with assorted trash. The Alsea Sportsman's Association hosted an afternoon BBQ for the hungry participants. Newport Troopers are also planning to assist during the upcoming Siletz River Clean Up scheduled for May 11, 2019.



Hood River ODFW Hunters Education Field Day

Fish & Wildlife Troopers, along with OSP Volunteers from The Dalles Office, helped with the ODFW Hunters Education Field Day located in Hood River County. The event was held at the Hood River Sportsman's Club. Over 20 students, along with parents, attended the day class going through scenarios, live fire, and hands on activities. All participants and parents gave positive feedback to the Troopers and volunteers that they really enjoyed the class and the passion for hunter safety displayed by the Troopers and OSP volunteers.

White River Youth Turkey Clinic - Tygh Valley

Fish & Wildlife Troopers from The Dalles attended the White River Youth Turkey Clinic in Tygh Valley hosted by OHA and ODFW. The Troopers gave an enforcement talk and then one of the Troopers taught a break out session throughout the day while the other Trooper answered questions from the public. Despite the on and off weather, the clinic was a success and well attended.

ADMINISTRATION & ENFORCEMENT OF WILDLIFE LAWS



Illegal Bull Elk Skull - Lincoln County

A Newport area Fish & Wildlife Trooper saw a picture on social media of a subject with a large bull elk deadhead. The subject's name was mentioned earlier in a large deer and elk poaching ring in the Toledo area, and area troopers are familiar with him from past investigations. The subject was contacted at his residence and was cited for **Possession of Illegally Taken Wildlife Parts**. The elk skull and attached 6x7 antlers were seized as evidence.

Hunting Closed Season - Coos County

A Coos Bay area Fish & Wildlife Trooper was provided a tip that a subject had unlawfully shot a bull elk while he was turkey hunting. Several acquaintances of the suspected poacher were contacted and found to be in possession of fresh elk meat which was subsequently seized. Troopers contacted the poaching suspect who admitted to shooting a 3x4 bull elk while he was turkey hunting. The suspect consented to a search which revealed 61 pounds of elk meat and a rifle. The elk meat and rifle were seized. The subject was issued criminal citations for **Hunting Closed Season, No Big Game Tag, and Take/Possession of Bull Elk**.

Three Cited in Illegal Take of Antlerless Elk

A Fish & Wildlife Trooper was driving down Willamina Creek Road when he observed a tuft of elk hair lying in a pull out along the road. Stopping to investigate, he found a freshly cut roadblock log with ATV tracks and drag marks leading into a privately owned clear-cut. The tracks led to three separate elk gut piles, and the evidence indicated all three elk had been killed and pulled out to the road via ATV by multiple subjects. Estimating where the elk were likely shot from, the Trooper walked to that location on the other side of the creek and found two separate high powered rifle shell casings, indicating at least two shooters. Two Troopers returned to the kill site to look for additional evidence. On the way, one of the Troopers received a message from a farmer out of Carlton stating that he had found three elk hides dumped on his property a day or two prior. The Troopers went to the dump site later in the day and the evidence found clearly linked the hides at the dump site to the three elk at the kill site on Willamina Creek. The kill site was located outside the boundary for the Beavercreek controlled antlerless elk hunt. Three suspects were identified and Troopers met them at a residence out of Yamhill. The subjects were cooperative and stated that they did not realize the location they killed the elk was outside the unit boundaries of their tags and was private property. All three subjects were cited criminally for **Take/Possession of Antlerless Elk** and one subject was cited for **Offensive Littering**. The three cow elk were seized and donated to The Meatin Place, and the three rifles used were seized as evidence.

Turkey Poaching - Grants Pass

A Grants Pass Patrol Trooper responded to a game call where a witness told him two men had killed a turkey. The witness provided good and accurate information and the Trooper was able to find the suspects. He also found the poached turkey hidden in a bag that was covered by a sleeping bag. A suspect admitted to killing the turkey. He was cited and released. The turkey and gun were seized as evidence.



ADMINISTRATION & ENFORCEMENT OF WILDLIFE LAWS

Tip Leads to Illegal Sale of Big Game Parts

A Fish & Wildlife Trooper received information from the TIP line about a subject who was advertising deadheads and shed antlers for sale online. The subject had specified prices listed for each big game part and was advising interested individuals to private message him to complete a sale. The subject was known by Lincoln County Deputies to be living in a remote homebuilt wooden cabin on another's enclosed lands in the Yachats area. The Trooper contacted the out of state landowner and obtained permission to access their property. Two Troopers hiked into a remote area of the property and discovered a well-built wooden structure. The subject was contacted and admitted to being in possession of buck deer deadheads and attempting to sell numerous deer and elk antlers/skulls to unlicensed buyers. The subject was cited for **Sale/Barter Big Game Parts**. Multiple deer/elk sheds and sawed off deer antlers were seized as evidence.

Lending Big Game Tag - Hermiston

A Fish & Wildlife Trooper received information from ODFW that a subject, while reporting on his elk tag, stated that his neighbor had killed the elk for him. Further investigation revealed that the shooter did not have a hunting license or elk tag and was convicted of a felony in 2013. The tag holder was cited and released for **Lending Big Game Tag**. The shooter was cited and released for **Felon in Possession of a Firearm** and **Take Antlerless Elk-No Valid Tag**. The firearm used to take the calf elk and 16 packages of elk meat were seized as evidence.

Self-Reported Unlawful Take

A Fish & Wildlife Trooper was dispatched to a report of a subject who had shot and harvested two turkeys in Polk County. The subject self-reported that he accidentally shot an additional tom turkey. The turkey was seized and donated to Turtle Ridge Wildlife Center in Salem. The subject was warned for **Unlawful Take/Possession of Game Bird**.

Elkhorn Wildlife Area Patrol

Fish & Wildlife Troopers conducted a patrol on the Elkhorn Wildlife Area in Union County. The patrol was conducted the day before the wildlife area opened to the public. During the patrol three individuals were contacted unlawfully entering the wildlife area to collect shed elk antlers before anyone else could. All three individuals were cited for **Unlawfully Entering Wildlife Area** and the elk antlers they had collected were seized as evidence.

RESCUES



Bald Eagle Rescue - Josephine County

On Thursday, April 4, 2019 some concerned citizens reported seeing a Bald Eagle that appeared to be injured in the Sunny Valley area in Josephine County. Three Troopers responded and were able to capture the injured eagle and transport it to Wildlife Images.

Wildlife Images posted the following update and photos (below) on their Facebook page:

"We are treating an American bald eagle for a wound and high levels of lead. This patient was brought in from Sunny Valley by Oregon State Police. We are treating the deep wound on the bird's foot with honey which is a natural antibiotic. The patient is also receiving pain meds, anti-fungal medication and oral antibiotics.

We are especially grateful to the folks who let OSP Troopers know that this bird needed help. If you think a wild animal is injured, sick, or abandoned - you can always call our team to find out the best way to help!"



RESCUES

Injured Seal - Pacific City

Fish & Wildlife Troopers received a call regarding two individuals who had taken an injured seal from a beach near Pacific City. The individuals stated they were driving south to the Newport Aquarium with the seal in the back of their Jeep Cherokee. Newport Fish & Wildlife Troopers contacted the individuals in Lincoln City and determined the seal to be a juvenile Elephant Seal with what appeared to have small abrasions on its face. After the Troopers contacted the Marine Mammal Stranding Network it was determined the seal could be released back into the ocean. The Troopers recovered the Elephant Seal and released it in a secluded area. The individuals were informed the appropriate action for the incident and given warnings for **Unlawful Take/Possession of Protected Animal**.

University of Oregon Rowing Skiffs Recovered

Springfield area Fish & Wildlife Troopers assisted the Lane County Sheriff's Office Marine Patrol and the Lowell and Dexter Rural Fire Departments with three overturned University of Oregon rowing skiffs at Dexter Reservoir. The university rowers were operating the boats on Dexter Reservoir when they encountered rough water conditions and overturned sending the occupants of the boats into the water. All of the rowers were able to safely get out of the water and there were no injuries. The Oakridge patrol boat was used to provide assistance in towing the boats that had overturned back to the University of Oregon crew dock.



Sunken Boat Recovered from Umpqua River

Roseburg area Fish & Wildlife Troopers conducted an Umpqua River Boat patrol from the town of Umpqua on the Main River to Stewart Park in Roseburg on the South Umpqua. During the patrol, fishing was observed to be slow. Approximately 10 anglers were contacted and a half-dozen boat checks conducted. The Troopers located a boat that sank about two weeks prior near the Umpqua Boat Ramp. The vessel was submerged in about seven feet of water upside down on the bottom of the river. The Troopers marked the location of the sunken vessel and coordinated with the Douglas County Sheriff's Office to recover the drift boat.



Injured Great Horned Owl Rescued

A Fish & Wildlife Trooper responded to a report of an injured Great Horned Owl in the Coquille area. The owl had a badly broken wing, and had likely been hit by a car the night before. The owl was captured with the help of the landowner and was released to Umpqua Wildlife Rehabilitation in Roseburg.

Elk Rescued from Mud Pit - Dean Creek

A Fish & Wildlife Trooper was contacted by a local Oregon Hunters Association member who reported an elk stuck in a mud pit within the Dean Creek elk viewing area. Several OHA members were in the area conducting the annual shed hunt. The bull was located in a slough and was submerged up to his neck. The bull was successfully moved to dry land and appeared to be in fair health.



MARINE FISHERIES TEAM

Commercial and Recreational Ocean Patrol

Fish & Wildlife Troopers conducted an ocean patrol out of Newport for both commercial and recreational fishery enforcement. A large contingent of commercial squid boats were contacted. Several boats were observed making sets and monitored to ensure they were sorting any potential bycatch at sea. The bycatch was minimal and what was encountered was immediately removed and released. The Troopers also contacted several recreational boats fishing for groundfish. Upon contacting one boat, Troopers noticed there was an abundance of black rockfish finning at the surface as they approached. The anglers consented to a search of their fish hold and 25 black and blue rockfish were found. The daily bag limit is five (5) fish. The 10 extra fish were found still alive and were released back into the ocean. All three anglers were cited for **Exceeding Daily Limit of Marine Fish**.

Ocean Bottom Fish Boat Checks - Garibaldi

An Astoria area Fish & Wildlife Trooper contacted a commercial groundfish boat that was landing lingcod and rockfish, and did not have any fish tickets or record onboard to show where he was at within his cumulative trip limits. The captain was warned for **Fail to Maintain Cumulative Catch Records for 90 Days**. The Trooper contacted a recreational vessel that had kept several Canary Rockfish and a Yelloweye Rockfish. The boat owner was cited for **Unlawful Taking Yelloweye Rockfish Closed Season**, and the Yelloweye was seized. Another recreational vessel was contacted with two Yelloweye Rockfish, and the owner of that boat was also cited for **Unlawful Taking Yelloweye Rockfish Closed Season**, and the two Yelloweye were seized as well.



Yelloweye Rockfish are on a long term rebuilding schedule and are prohibited from retention.

Razor Clam Patrol - Clatsop Beach

A Fish & Wildlife Trooper contacted recreational and commercial razor clam harvesters on Clatsop Beach during several days of a low tide series. The Trooper conducted a shellfish sanitation patrol, and found no violations with the commercial clam harvesters. The Trooper issued three citations to recreational harvesters for **Exceed the Daily Limit of Razor Clams**, one citation for **Fail to Retain Clams as Required**, and two for **No Non Resident License**. Another subject was observed digging 30 razor clams while his wife followed him around with a bag and picked them up. The husband was cited for **Exceed the Daily Limit of Razor Clams** and 15 clams were seized. The Trooper got down to the beach early in the tide on another morning and watched two subjects dig their limits then drive off of the beach. 45 minutes later, the Trooper saw the same vehicle, and the same two subjects, come back and dig another set of limits. The Trooper contacted the subjects, and they eventually admitted to taking the first limit of clams back to their house. Both subjects were cited and released for **Exceed the Daily Limit of Razor Clams** and 34 clams were seized. One of the subjects had been cited in the past by another Trooper for exceeding the daily limit of rockfish after the Trooper had found the extra fish via a consent search of his boat.

Failure to Sell to a Wholesale Fish Dealer

A Fish & Wildlife Trooper contacted a subject by phone involved in a case with several co-suspects in which razor clams were being transported into Washington without being reported on an Oregon fish ticket. The subject agreed to meet in Oregon for an interview. At the conclusion of the interview, the subject was taken into custody on a 9-year-old warrant out of Columbia County and lodged at the Clatsop County Jail. The subject was cited for two counts of **Failure to Sell to a Wholesale Fish Dealer** and one count of **Failure to Submit Razor Clam Logbooks to ODFW**.

Late Fish Tickets Affect Bay Clam Quota

A Fish & Wildlife Trooper received information from ODFW that a wholesale bait dealer in Garibaldi was consistently late in submitting fish tickets to ODFW. The bait dealer had submitted approximately 50 fish tickets from 60 landings of bay clams that were anywhere from 10 to 61 days after the landings, with the majority of the landings being submitted about a month late. The bay clam fishery in Tillamook Bay is quota based, and consequently, the fish tickets that were submitted late put the allowable harvest over the limit. The dealer was cited and released for **Fail to Submit Fish Receiving Ticket**.

SHELLFISH & ANGLING

Crab Checks - Yaquina Bay

A Fish & Wildlife Trooper was conducting crab checks on Yaquina Bay on the South Beach Fishing Pier. He contacted three male subjects walking off of the pier with a bucket full of Red Rock and Dungeness crab. The three subjects all admitted to crabbing and stated they did not have shellfish licenses. A check of their catch revealed that they had caught 17 Red Rock crab. All three subjects were cited for **No Resident Shellfish License**. The crab were all returned unharmed to Yaquina Bay.

Crabbing Violations - Port of Newport

Fish & Wildlife Troopers observed two subjects crabbing off of a commercial dock in the Port of Newport. The subjects were contacted a short time later after returning to their vehicle with multiple containers. It was found that only one subject possessed a current shellfish license. A consent search of their buckets and vehicle yielded 40 red rock crab, seven undersized Dungeness crab and three female Dungeness crab. A subject was cited for **Take/Possession of Female Dungeness Crab** and **Take/Possession of Undersized Dungeness Crab** and warned for **Exceeding Bag Limit Red Rock Crab**. The subject returned the remaining red rock crab and Dungeness crab into the bay.

Tip Leads to Razor Clam Violation

An Astoria Fish & Wildlife Trooper received a tip about a group of subjects digging razor clams near the Del Ray entrance to Clatsop County Beach. Upon inspection of shellfish licenses and clams, two subjects admitted to digging in a separate location earlier that morning and were found to be in possession of 60 razor clams (twice the legal limit of razor clams). Both subjects were criminally cited for **Exceeding Daily Bag Limit of Clams** and 30 razor clams were seized as evidence.



Fishing Derby Boat Patrol - Detroit Lake

A Fish & Wildlife Trooper conducted a joint boat patrol with the Marion County Sheriff's Office on Detroit Lake during the Annual Power of Oregon Kokanee Fishing Derby. Multiple boats and anglers were contacted during the tournament. Two subjects were observed bank fishing and upon contact with the male subjects a bucket was discovered containing five trout which had their heads cut off and some of their fins removed. Subsequent investigation revealed that neither subject had a fishing license and a sixth trout was discovered in a bag near the water. Both subjects were cited for **No Resident Angling License** and for **Unlawful Take/Possession of Trout**. The six fish were seized and donated to the Union Gospel Mission.

Washington Resident Cited for Multiple Offenses

A Fish & Wildlife Trooper out of The Dalles completed an investigation of a Washington subject who was issued a Game Fish Tournament Permit by ODFW to hold a sturgeon fishing derby with prize money. The permit specified that the event was to take place in the Columbia River Bonneville Pool only. The event was unlawfully held in both the Bonneville Pool as well as The Dalles Pool of the Columbia River. The permittee was required to submit a Game Fish Tournament Report Form with harvest numbers to ODFW within the required time frame which he failed to do. The subject was cited for **Violation of Game Fish Tournament Permit**.

SHELLFISH & ANGLING

Unlawful Possession of Sturgeon - Heppner

Fish & Wildlife Troopers responded to an RV Park in Heppner on a sturgeon complaint. The suspect, who is well known to OSP Fish & Wildlife Troopers, had caught and kept a sturgeon in the Columbia River at the mouth of the Umatilla River (closed season) and transported it to Heppner where he tied it up to a tree in swollen Willow Creek. The suspect's sons were showing it off the next day by lifting it out of the water by the rope through the fish's gills. A local citizen saw this, took some pictures and called a Trooper. The subject was observed a short time later with fillets from the fish. He was cited criminally for **Unlawful Possession of Sturgeon** and the meat was seized.

Sandy River Drift Boat Patrol

Fish & Wildlife Troopers conducted a drift boat patrol on the Sandy River. The Troopers contacted a subject in Dabney State Park that did not have a license, tag, or Columbia River basin endorsement. The Troopers also learned that the subject had a misdemeanor warrant for his arrest out of Multnomah County for Theft II. The subject was issued a violation citation for **No Resident Angling License** and **No Combined Angling Harvest Tag**. He was placed under arrest and transported to the Multnomah County Jail on his warrant.

Depoe Bay Angling Violations

Fish & Wildlife Troopers contacted two anglers in the Depoe Bay Marina returning from fishing. Upon inspection of catch, gear, and license, it was determined the first angler failed to have a valid 2019 angling license and the second angler failed to have his license in his possession. The first angler had one lingcod and two rockfish in possession, the three fish were seized and the angler was cited for **Unlawful Take/Possession of Marine Fish** and **No Angling License**.

Oakridge Area Angler Checks

Recently, an Oakridge Fish & Wildlife Trooper patrolled the Middle Fork of the Willamette River and Hills Creek Reservoir near Oakridge, as well as the Dexter Reservoir and Fall Creek below Fall Creek Dam near Lowell. During the patrol 28 anglers were checked and one guide/boat check was completed.

Possession of Wild Cutthroat Trout - Rogue River

A trooper out of Central Point contacted a female who was observed fishing at Takelma Boat Launch on the Rogue River. When the female saw the Trooper, she put the rod down and a male stated she was just holding the fishing rod for him. The female was found to not have an angling license or combined angling tag. The male stated he was actually fishing. The Trooper observed a plastic bag stuck in the rocks and when asked, the male stated he had kept two trout. It was found the male had retained two wild cutthroat trout, which is a prohibited species. Wild rainbow trout and cutthroat trout must be released on the Rogue River. The male was cited for **Unlawful Possession of Non-Adipose Fin Clipped Trout**. The trout were seized as evidence.

Umpqua River Boat Patrol

Fish & Wildlife Troopers recently conducted a lower Umpqua River boat patrol resulting in 20 boat checks and 36 angler checks. One boater was provided a whistle. A boat less than 39 feet 4 inches must carry a sound producing device such as a whistle or air-horn.

Angler Checks - Crane Prairie Reservoir

A Fish & Wildlife Trooper worked the trout opener on Crane Prairie Reservoir. Several citations and warning were issued to various anglers. Overall, angling appeared to be pretty good.

CASE DISPOSITION

Camp Adair Subject Convicted of Multiple F&W Crimes in Benton County Case

After a lengthy investigation by Albany Fish & Wildlife Troopers and the service of a search warrant, a Camp Adair subject was arrested for multiple fish and wildlife crimes. The subject pleaded guilty in a Benton County Court and was sentenced to:

Unlawful Possession of Buck Deer

- 3 year hunting license suspension
- 36 months bench probation
- No participation in hunting, trapping or shed hunting activities
- 15 days work crew
- \$5,000 restitution
- Forfeit all seized rifles/bows
- Forfeit all seized “dead heads” and all other animal parts (seized in either county case, including on dismissed counts), except as indicated below:
- Big horn sheep will be returned to ex-wife
- Any other animal parts will be returned to their lawful owners if verifiable by OSP
- \$100 fine

Unlawful Take of Bull Elk

- Five year hunting license suspension (consecutive)
- 36 months bench probation
- 15 days work crew
- \$15,000 restitution (\$5,000 of that to the OHA WED Fund)
- Forfeit all seized rifles/bows
- \$100 fine

Unlawful Possession of Short Barreled Shotgun—as a misdemeanor

- Executed Sentence
- Forfeit the firearm
- 10 days jail
- \$100 fine

Guilty Plea in Douglas County Case

In the fall of 2018, a Roseburg area Fish & Wildlife Trooper responded to a report of a subject that had possibly shot a deer from a public roadway in the Melrose Wildlife Management Unit. The subject was contacted at the scene. During the investigation it was determined the subject had shot from the highway right-of-way, across one lane of travel at a deer that was standing in a ditch. The deer was wounded and ran onto private property. The subject was cited and released for **Hunting from a Public Roadway**. The Trooper was able to follow a scarce blood trail and recover the 2x2 buck deer. The deer was processed and donated to the local Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW). The hide from the deer was preserved for future use on a Wildlife Enforcement Decoy (WED). In April, 2019 the subject pleaded guilty in Douglas County Circuit Court.


The subject received:

- \$440 fine
- 3 year license suspension
- Forfeiture of his gun
- \$1000 restitution to ODFW and \$500 to the TIP fund

Subject Convicted in Douglas County WED Case

Fish & Wildlife Troopers from the Roseburg office conducted a day time buck deer Wildlife Enforcement Decoy (WED) operation in the Dixon Wildlife Management Unit in the fall of 2018. A vehicle approached the location and came to a stop in the roadway. The driver exited the vehicle and shot across the hood of his pickup while standing in the roadway. Upon contact it was found that the subject did not possess a valid deer tag or a hunting license. The subject was cited and released on scene for **Take/Possession of Buck Deer and No Resident Hunting License**. In April 2019, the subject pleaded guilty in Douglas County Circuit Court. The subject was ordered to pay a \$440 fine, \$500 restitution to the WED program and forfeiture of his rifle.

The subject failed to appear in court for an appearance on this case. The subject pleaded guilty in Douglas County Circuit Court to **Misdemeanor Failure to Appear** and was ordered to 10 days work crew and a \$100 fine.
