COMMUNITY OUTREACH



K-9 Buck Visits School

A Springfield Fish and Wildlife Trooper, K-9 Buck, and an Oregon State Police Detective visited the Umpqua Valley Christian School. The Trooper talked with approximately 140 kindergarten through fifth grade students about the Oregon State Police Fish and Wildlife Division and the Fish and Wildlife K-9 Program. The Trooper conducted a demonstration with K-9 Buck, answered questions, and let the students interact with K-9 Buck.

Grants Pass High School Career Day

OSP representatives from Fish and Wildlife, Patrol, Criminal, Forensics and Dispatch participated in the Grants Pass High School Career Day. Several hundred students were in attendance and were given OSP swag. The students were able to interact and talk with OSP representatives about careers at OSP.

Lakeview Trooper Makes Impromptu Visit

A Lakeview Fish and Wildlife Trooper conducted an unscheduled security check of a local elementary and high school. He gave an impromptu talk to elementary children in the lunch room and was able to field many questions they had. Staff have requested unscheduled security checks from local law enforcement and are appreciative of the assistance.

Youth Pheasant Hunt - Miller Island

A Klamath Falls Fish and Wildlife Trooper assisted ODFW and Unlimited Pheasants Klamath Falls on the youth only waterfowl and pheasant hunt at the Miller Island Klamath Wildlife Area. One hundred pheasants were released in the wildlife area and 20 youths attended. Most of the kids were successful and had a great time.

GENERAL LAW & RESCUES



Buck Deer Rescued from Fence

A Klamath Falls Fish and Wildlife Trooper received a complaint of a buck deer that was tangled up in electric fence webbing and stuck to a fence post on the outskirts of Klamath Falls. The buck was in distress and had about ten feet of slack in the webbing, which was causing him to buck and run in circles. The Trooper requested assistance from an ODFW biologist who sedated the buck allowing them to remove the fence webbing from the bucks antlers. The buck appeared healthy and uninjured as it walked away.



DUII Driver Found During WED Operation

Albany Fish and Wildlife Troopers conducted a Wildlife Enforcement Decoy (WED) in east Linn County on private property. A subject drove near the WED, backed up and parked at a nearby residence. A short time later the subject started sneaking along the road and looking at the WED through his scope multiple times. He was stopped and interviewed. The subject showed signs of impairment and consented to standard field sobriety tests (SFSTs). The subject was arrested for **Driving Under the Influence of Intoxicants (DUII)** and transported to Stayton Police Department. He provided a breath sample and had a 0.13% blood alcohol content (BAC). He was cited and released for **Hunting from a Roadway** and **DUII**, and his rifle was seized.

Six Subjects Cited During Night Flight

The SW Region Fish and Wildlife Pilot overflew Douglas County on a night flight operation that went into the early morning hours of the following day. He was supported on the ground by a Roseburg Fish and Wildlife Sergeant and Troopers. Three vehicles were spotted casting light and were contacted by the Troopers on the ground. Six individuals were cited for various crimes/violations, including a **Felon in Possession of a Firearm**, and two rifles were seized.

Elderly Hunter Rescued from Water

A Klamath Falls Fish and Wildlife Trooper was patrolling Miller Island Wildlife Area when he overheard medical being dispatched to a hunter in the water. The hunter was located on a private duck club, in the middle of the refuge. The hunter's friends were able to get him out of the water and into an SUV. The elderly hunter was suffering from extreme hypothermia and was in the water for 30 plus minutes before he was missed. The Trooper escorted the SUV to meet an ambulance on a paved road and helped medics treat and load the hunter. Family was notified of the incident and responded to the hospital to meet the ambulance.

Subject Arrested for DUII and Reckless Driving

A Fish and Wildlife Trooper stopped a vehicle in Baker City for careless driving. Multiple signs of impairment were observed, and the driver consented to SFSTs. The driver performed poorly and was subsequently arrested for **DUII**. The driver was transported to the Baker County Jail and provided a breath sample of .16%. The driver was cited and released for **DUII** and **Reckless Driving**.

GENERAL LAW & RESCUES



Troopers Respond to Medical Call for Juvenile

Klamath Falls Fish and Wildlife Troopers responded to a juvenile hunter having a medical emergency in the Gearhart Wilderness area. The hunter's family was able to transport him to Bly where the juvenile was life flighted to Klamath Falls. The previous day the Troopers had contacted the same hunter who had just harvested his first buck, a nice 4x4 (see above). His mom and dad had also harvested nice deer the same day. The young hunter is expected to make a full recovery from the incident. The Troopers also went back to their camp after the juvenile was released to medical personnel. The camp was secured until the family could return. While a very scary situation, the outcome couldn't have been better.

Subject Caught Trespassing Via Trail Cam

A Bend Fish and Wildlife Sergeant was contacted by a landowner and provided a trail camera picture of a subject breaking a lock on a gate with a hammer to leave private property. The Sergeant recognized the subject and responded to his residence to interview him. The subject admitted it was the last day of archery season and he was trying to take a shortcut to get back to camp to hunt with his dad. He said he broke a lock to open a gate and enter the property to travel across it. He then broke the lock to exit the property when the photo was taken of him. He was cited/released for **Criminal Trespass II**.

Subject Eludes Trooper, Later Turns Himself In

A Fossil Fish and Wildlife Trooper was traveling north on a forest service road near Tamarack Lookout in the Heppner Unit when he contacted a subject walking with a rifle in hand. The Trooper identified himself and asked the subject if he'd had any luck and asked to see his deer tag. The subject said he had no tag and was very nervous. The rifle, a 30-06, was unloaded and made safe during the contact. The subject gave a name and date of birth (DOB) which returned to a felon on felony probation. The subject was advised he was under arrest and was told to turn around and to put his hands behind his back. The subject stated "nope" and fled on foot into the woods. The subject ran to his camp nearby and drove off in a pickup parked there. After investigation, the true name and DOB of the subject was obtained. He returned as a convicted felon on felony probation and was just released from a 72-month prison sentence. A couple hours later, the suspect's father contacted the Trooper and said his son wanted to turn himself in. Upon the arrival of back up, contact was made with the subject at his camp, and he was taken into custody. The subject was transported and lodged at the Grant County Jail without further incident on the following charges: **Felon in Possession of a Firearm, Escape II, Giving False Information to a Police Officer, DWS Misdemeanor, and No Big Game Tag.**



Bobcat Rescued from Electric Fence

A Springfield Fish and Wildlife Trooper was sent to a report of a bobcat that was stuck in an electric fence. The Trooper observed the bobcat was alive and healthy but its legs were severely tangled. Another Trooper and a Lane County Sheriff's Office Deputy arrived to assist. The Troopers and Deputy were able to free the bobcat and release it back in the forest unharmed.

WILDLIFE & ENVIRONMENT



Summer Lake Wildlife Refuge

Summer Lake Wildlife Refuge Patrol

Klamath Falls and Lakeview Fish and Wildlife Troopers worked the duck season opener at the Summer Lake Wildlife Refuge. Over two days over 200 contacts were made. Multiple warnings were given for **Fail to Display Parking Permit, Failing to Immediately Retrieve, Camping in No Camping Areas, No Hunting License in Possession, Trespassing, and No Parking Permit**. Citations were issued for **Using Toxic Lead Shot to Hunt, Operating Off Road, and No Parking Permit**. The lead ammunition was seized.

Guide and Client Cited for Hunting Violations

Hermiston Fish and Wildlife Troopers contacted a guide and two clients removing a deer from a hay field along Hwy 74 in the Heppner Unit. The client (who didn't have his tag on his person) had a tag for the Columbia Basin Unit. The client was cited for **Hunting Outside Unit Boundary** and the guide was cited for **Counseling in a Wildlife Violation**. The deer was seized and donated to charity.

Hunting While Trespassing - Brownsville

Albany Troopers responded to the Brownsville area and worked a case in which two male subjects trespassed on private land. The investigation revealed one of the male subjects killed a three-point buck while trespassing and his wife tagged it the next morning. Multiple criminal citations were issued to the three subjects involved including **Take Buck Deer, Hunting in Violation of Criminal Trespass, and Lend/Borrow Big Game Tag**. Three rifles and the buck deer were seized. The deer meat was donated to a local soup kitchen.

Spotlighter Caught with Help from OSP Pilot

The SW Region Fish and Wildlife Pilot conducted a night flight in Douglas County. He was supported on the ground by Fish and Wildlife Troopers from the Roseburg area. The pilot guided a Trooper on the ground to an active spot lighter near Yellow Butte in North Douglas County. Upon contact, the subject eventually admitted to casting on a game mammal and hunting with the aid of an artificial light. His rifle and LED flashlight were seized and he was issued criminal citations for **Casting on a Game Mammal While Armed and Hunting Prohibited Hours**.

Trask Unit WED Operation

McMinnville Fish and Wildlife Troopers conducted an evening black-tailed deer Wildlife Enforcement Decoy (WED) operation in the Trask Unit. Legal shooting hours ended at 6:36 PM that day. At approximately 7:01 PM two vehicles slowly passed the WED. The lead vehicle turned around and the driver shot one WED in the back of the neck with a .300 WM, destroying the robotic motor parts. The shooter was cited and released for **Unlawful Take of Buck Deer** and the rifle was seized. At 10:00 PM the same night, the NW Region Fish and Wildlife Pilot was flying in the area and saw an outbound vehicle coming toward the decoy set. The vehicle stopped in the WED set and the driver fired one shot with a break open 20 gauge shotgun striking the WED in the stomach with a slug. The male driver had his wife and young children with him. The driver was cited and released for **Unlawful Take of Buck Deer** and the shotgun was seized.

Two Deer Left to Waste - Wickiup Reservoir

A La Pine Fish and Wildlife Trooper responded to the area of Wickiup Reservoir for a report of a dead doe that had been shot through both front legs. The reporting parties provided a vehicle description and plate. Two Troopers approached the residence as the vehicle returned home. The female passenger was interviewed and confessed that she and her fiancé had both shot does, thinking they were shooting at the same doe. She stated they were buck hunting but had not seen any and they wanted to put some meat in their freezer. The male subject was then interviewed and also confessed to shooting and leaving the deer. Both subjects' rifles were seized, and they were both issued criminal citations for **Unlawful Take of Doe Deer** and charges of waste were referred to the District Attorney. The next day a Trooper returned and searched the area, eventually locating a second doe that was shot and left to waste.

ADMINISTRATION & ENFORCEMENT OF WILDLIFE LAWS



Deer Shot in City Limits - Sutherlin

A Fish and Wildlife Trooper responded to a game complaint regarding a deer being shot while at a bird feeder, in a back yard, within the city limits of Sutherlin. Upon arrival, the Trooper contacted the subject of the complaint at his house. During the interview, the subject confessed to shooting the buck at his feeder in his back yard and knew he was within the city limits. The deer and rifle were seized, and the subject was cited for **Hunting Prohibited Area: City Limits**.

Pre-Light WED Operation

Central Point and Grants Pass Fish and Wildlife Troopers conducted a pre-light WED. Five vehicles in total observed the decoy in a three-hour period. A set of vehicles stopped in the roadway and positioned their vehicles side by side. A shot was heard and both vehicles left the scene. An OSP vehicle managed to stop one of the vehicles and it was determined the other vehicle was the shooter. OSP attempted to locate the shooting suspect but was unsuccessful. A spent 30-06 rifle cartridge was located in the roadway of the incident. On a later date one of the Troopers received a phone call from the shooting suspect, and a full confession was given. The suspect observed the decoy and could not resist the temptation to shoot it. He confessed to shooting at the decoy using his 30-06 and then driving away. The next day the suspect was charged with **Hunting Prohibited Method** and **Hunting with Aid of Lighting**, and his rifle was seized.

Subject Unlawfully Takes Deer with Crossbow

A Roseburg Fish and Wildlife Trooper contacted a male subject who had been reported by a witness to have killed a buck deer with a crossbow. The subject did not have a hunting license or tag and admitted to killing the deer with the crossbow. Both the deer and the crossbow were seized and the subject was criminally cited for **Hunting Prohibited Method** and **Take/Possession Buck Deer**.

Buck Deer WED - Tioga Unit

Coos Bay Fish and Wildlife Troopers conducted a deer WED before legal hunting hours in the Tioga Wildlife Management Unit (WMU). Approximately 1.5 hours before legal hunting hours began, one vehicle drove by the WED, turned around and stopped next to it, in the roadway. The passenger then shot one of decoys from the passenger seat of the vehicle. The passenger was cited for **Unlawful Take Buck Deer, Hunting Prohibited Hours, and Hunting Prohibited Area: Public Road**, and was warned for **Hunting with the Aid of Artificial Light**. The driver was cited for **Aiding/Counseling in a Wildlife Offense**. Approximately one hour before legal hunting hours, a vehicle stopped in the roadway with its headlights illuminating the decoys. The driver and passenger got out and coordinated who was going to shoot which buck, and the driver counted down so they would both shoot simultaneously. The driver and passenger then shot the decoys from the roadway. Both subjects were cited for **Unlawful Take Buck Deer, Hunting Prohibited Area: Public Road, and Casting a Light from a Vehicle while in Possession of a Firearm**. The rifles used during the incidents were seized as evidence.

Subject Throws Rocks at Decoy

St. Helens Fish and Wildlife Troopers conducted a WED operation after legal shooting hours. Five vehicles drove by and two observed the WED. One subject stopped, backed up, pulled forward, flashed his headlights, got out of his vehicle, clapped his hands, and eventually threw rocks and hit the WED before he was contacted. He did not understand why the buck didn't run. The subject was cooperative. He was warned for **Unlawful Stopping/Standing Upon a Roadway** and **Attempt to Harass Wildlife**.

Multiple Citations Issued on WED Operation

Troopers from the Springfield Patrol Office conducted a WED operation west of Veneta. During the operation two vehicles stopped with persons shooting the decoy. This resulted in the following citations: **Unlawful Take: No Big Game Tag, Unlawful Take: Prohibited Hours, Aiding in a Wildlife Violation, Felon in Possession of Restricted Weapons**, and **Hunting from a Public Roadway**. Two rifles were seized and placed into evidence.

ADMINISTRATION & ENFORCEMENT OF WILDLIFE LAWS



Unlawful Take of Bull Elk Closed Season

Roseburg Fish and Wildlife Troopers all responded to a complaint in the Tioga Hunt Unit that multiple subjects had killed and were packing out a bull elk during closed season. Upon locating two vehicles parked in the area, the Troopers waited nearby for about 45 minutes until voices were heard coming up through the brush back to the vehicles. Three males were contacted at the vehicles and each had attempted to hide whatever they were packing, initially claiming to have “found” a dead elk. Following interviews, it was learned that one of the men killed a large bull elk in the clearcut unit. The other two males aided in a wildlife crime by cleaning and packing out some of the bull. They had only packed-out half of the meat and head, the shooter admitted they had no intention of returning for the other half of the meat. The shooter was cited and released for **Unlawful Take/Possession Bull Elk Closed Season** and both accomplices were cited for **Aiding in a Wildlife Crime**. The antlers, meat, and rifle were seized as evidence. Additional charges were forwarded to the Douglas County District Attorney’s Office for consideration.

Spotlighter Caught on WED Operation

Mid-Valley Fish and Wildlife Troopers were conducting a WED in the Santiam Canyon when a Trooper observed a vehicle traveling on a road through a clearcut on a neighboring ridge. He observed a spotlight scanning the clearcut as it was driving. The subjects were contacted a short time later and a subject admitted to spotlighting from the tailgate of the pickup. The subject was criminally cited in lieu of custody for **No Valid Tag in Possession, Hunting with the Aid of Artificial Light** and **Hunting Prohibited Hours**. A rifle and spotlight were seized.

Nighttime TMA WED Operation

Astoria Fish and Wildlife Troopers were conducting a nighttime WED in a Travel Management Area (TMA). A couple hours later a vehicle stopped at the decoy. The subject did not shoot the decoy, but was stopped for trespassing. The subject was a local resident who had been observed on trail cameras on numerous occasions trespassing on this property at all hours of the night, including at 3:00 AM a couple days earlier. The subject was in possession of four rifles and a handgun, including a loaded .300 mag next to his seat. The subject was cited and released criminally for **Violation of the Travel Management Agreement** and **Criminal Trespass While in Possession of a Firearm**. Five firearms were seized as evidence.



Unlawful Taking of Cedar Boughs on BLM Land

An Oakridge Fish and Wildlife Trooper was working the East Lane Travel Management Area (TMA) in the Lost Creek area when he encountered five subjects commercially harvesting cedar boughs on Bureau of Land Management (BLM) land. The Trooper identified the crew boss and asked to see their permit and learned they did not possess a permit for the activity. Fifteen bundles (approx. 800 pounds) of cedar boughs were seized and the subject leading the work party was issued a citation for **Unpermitted Taking of Special Forest Products (Lane County Code)**. The cedar boughs were released to a BLM Officer at the BLM office in Springfield. The Officer went back to the area later in the week and found another 30 bundles (approx. 2000 pounds) of illegally harvested cedar boughs on other BLM roads nearby.

MARINE FISHERIES TEAM



Seal Pup Returned to Beach

A Newport Fish and Wildlife Sergeant responded to a report that an unidentified female subject had been seen with a baby seal pup. It was reported she had it wrapped in a jacket but had set it down in a parking lot near the beach in a gated community of Salishan near Lincoln City. The seal pup was found still wrapped in the jacket at the end of a beach trail. The seal pup was taken back down to the beach in hopes it would be reunited with its mother. The subject who reported to have taken the seal pup was unable to be located.

Subject Angling in Closed Area

A Fish and Wildlife Trooper contacted a subject angling on the Coos River at the Green Acres area (open to youth and disabled anglers only). The subject was unclear on the regulations, did not possess a disabled angler permit, and was using prohibited gear for the area. The subject was cited for **Angling Closed Area** and warned for the gear restrictions.

Subject Misidentifies Coho Salmon

A Fish and Wildlife Trooper followed up with a subject who was in possession of two wild Coho from the Coos River that ODFW had seized. The subject had misidentified the fish as a Chinook due to their size and (inaccurately) being told that Coho were not in the river anymore. The subject was cited for **Take/Possession of Wild Coho** and the fish were donated to the local Gospel Mission.

Bait Shop Owners Cited for Logbook Violations

A Newport Fish and Wildlife Trooper contacted a local bait and tackle shop who harvested and sold sand shrimp. During the Trooper's inspection it was discovered one of the owners, who was responsible for record keeping, had been late on all ODFW commercial requirements. After reviewing their documents, it was discovered the bait and tackle shop was late turning in all logbooks for harvesting sand shrimp as well as fish tickets and monthly reporting to ODFW. Both harvesters were cited for their late and missing logbooks and warned for the other documentation.

Quillback Rockfish Unlawfully Taken/Sold

A Coos Bay Fish and Wildlife Trooper followed up with a fish dealer who purchased a quillback rockfish from a fisherman. Quillback rockfish are prohibited from retention in both recreational and commercial fisheries. It was also determined the fish buyer who drove to get the fish had a suspended license. When the Trooper arrived in Charleston, the fish buyer drove up in the company truck. The dealer was cited for **Unlawful Possession of Commercially Caught Fish** and the buyer for the company was cited for **Driving while Suspended**.

Undersized Crab Violations - Bandon

While checking recreational crabbers in Bandon, a Fish and Wildlife Trooper contacted one subject who was in possession of an undersized Dungeness crab. She was warned for the offense, instructed on the proper way to measure and the crab was released back into the river. The Trooper contacted another crabber who was in possession of four undersized Dungeness crab and three legal Dungeness crab. The subject stated he had purchased a three day license the day prior but when he pulled out his phone to show the Trooper his phone was dead. The Trooper was not able to locate a record of the subject in ODFW's online licensing system. The subject stated he had purchased the license as a guest and did not create an account. Because the Trooper could not verify that he had purchased a license either through ODFW or by the subject being in possession of his license the subject was instructed to discontinue crabbing until he could verify his license status. The subject was cited for **Possession of Undersized Crab** and warned for **No Non-Resident Shellfish License in Possession**.

SHELLFISH & ANGLING



Subject Caught Snagging - Eagle Creek

A Fish and Wildlife Trooper patrolled the Eagle Creek at Bonnie Lure State Park. A subject was contacted that had been observed actively trying to snag fish in a log jam. The subject had already tagged two Coho salmon which appeared to be foul hooked. The salmon were seized, and the subject was criminally cited for **Angling Prohibited Method: Snagging**.

Columbia River Saturation Patrol

Fish and Wildlife Troopers from The Dalles coordinated a saturation patrol on the Columbia River with two Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) Officers. The purpose of the saturation was to target the unlawful retention of non-adipose fin clipped Coho salmon along with after hours angling complaints, and boats operating without proper lighting. Troopers and Officers contacted 28 anglers, 14 boats, and conducted 14 fish checks. The evening patrol resulted in five angling violations and four marine board violations.

Wild Coho Unlawfully Taken

A Roseburg Fish and Wildlife Sergeant received information regarding a subject who had illegally taken a wild Coho salmon on the main Umpqua River at Cleveland Rapids. The subject was contacted and interviewed at his residence about 30 minutes later. The subject was cited for **Take/Possession of Non-Adipose Fin-Clipped Salmon** and warned for **Fail to Immediately Validate Harvest Card**. The wild Coho was seized and donated to the Roseburg Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW).

Subject Cited for Snagging and Harassing Fish

A Newport Fish and Wildlife Trooper received multiple complaints about a subject who was using a jig and was repeatedly snagging fish. On one occasion, he was pointed out to the Trooper by an angry angler. The Trooper contacted the subject and checked his license and tag, then noted which vehicle was his in the parking area. Over the next week, each time the Trooper spotted the vehicle, he would stop and observe the subject. When other anglers were present, he would mostly run a bobber rig, but when he was alone or with obvious friends, he only used his jig and would repeatedly foul hook fish. The Trooper observed him land a belly hooked salmon, step on it to stop it from flopping around, pull the hook out and then kick it back into the river. He also foul hooked four fish and lost two others. At the same time, the Trooper observed his friend fishing the exact same gear and using the same jig set up. He hooked into at least two fish but did not land any of them. When contacted, neither subject thought they were doing anything wrong, because they were using legal gear. One subject was cited for **Angling Prohibited Method: Snagging and Harassing Wildlife** (for kicking a fish back into the river). The other subject was cited for **Harassing Wildlife**.

Snaggers Targeted on Eagle Creek/Sandy River

Troopers from the North Valley Team targeted snaggers on Eagle Creek and the Sandy River near the Cedar Creek Hatchery. Angling pressure was light, but one man was contacted while returning to his vehicle. He had two Coho and had only one tagged. After inspecting the fish and an admission by the subject, he was cited and released for **Unlawful Take/Possession of Foul Hooked Coho** and warned for **Fail to Immediately Validate Harvest Card**. One Coho was seized.

Subject Caught Poaching with Spear

St. Helens Fish and Wildlife Troopers worked the Upper Nehalem River's spawning Chinook. A subject was contacted well after dark, in a secluded portion of river, with an 8-foot wooden spear at his bare feet. After initially claiming the spear wasn't his he admitted to his deeds. He was cited for **Angling Prohibited Method: Spear and Angling Closed Hours**, and warned for **No Angling License**.
