


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Projects in Benton County by Type, 1999-2023










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Projects in Clatsop County by Type, 1999–2023






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Projects in Columbia County by Type, 1999-2023






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Projects in Crook County by Type, 1999-2023










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Projects in Gilliam County by Type, 1999–2023










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Projects in Wallowa County by Type, 1999-2023
