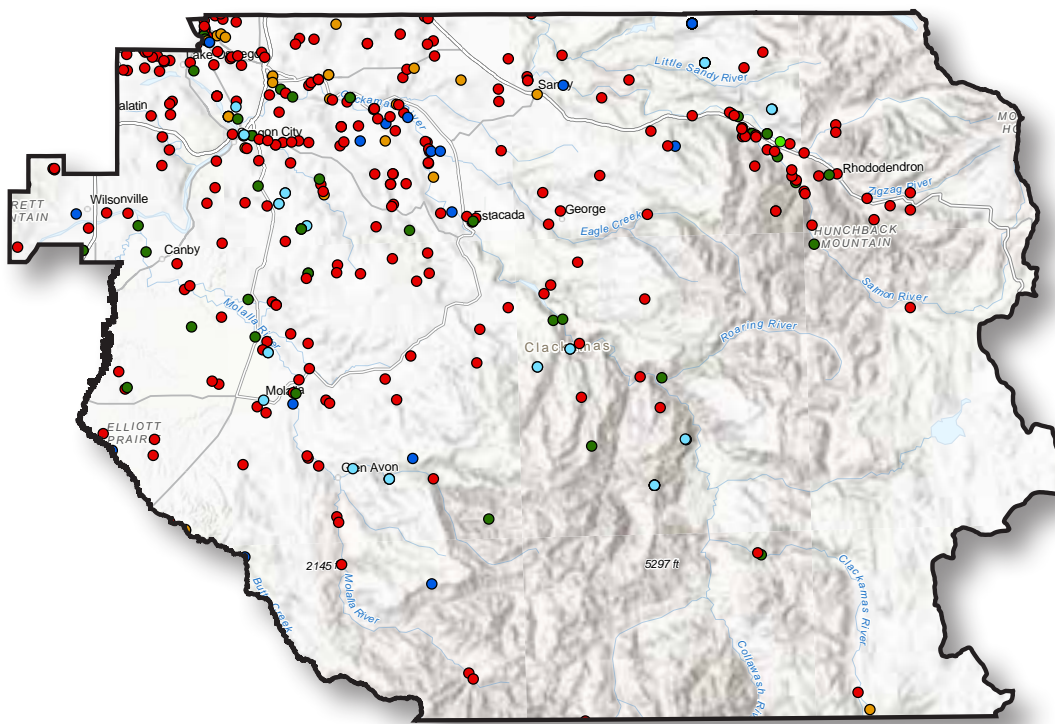

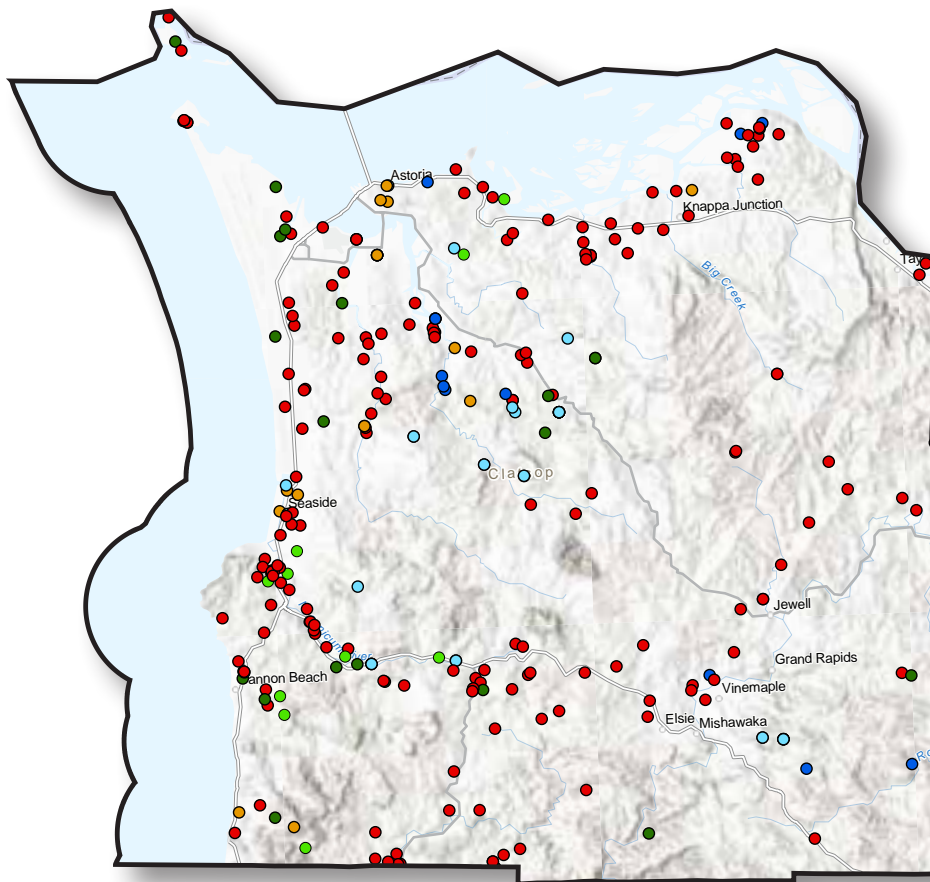

Projects in Crook County by Type, 1999–2023



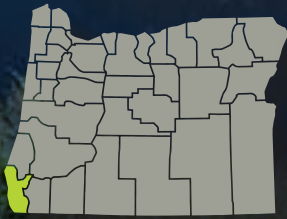

Projects in Deschutes County by Type, 1999–2023



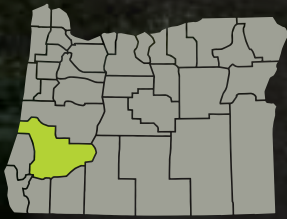

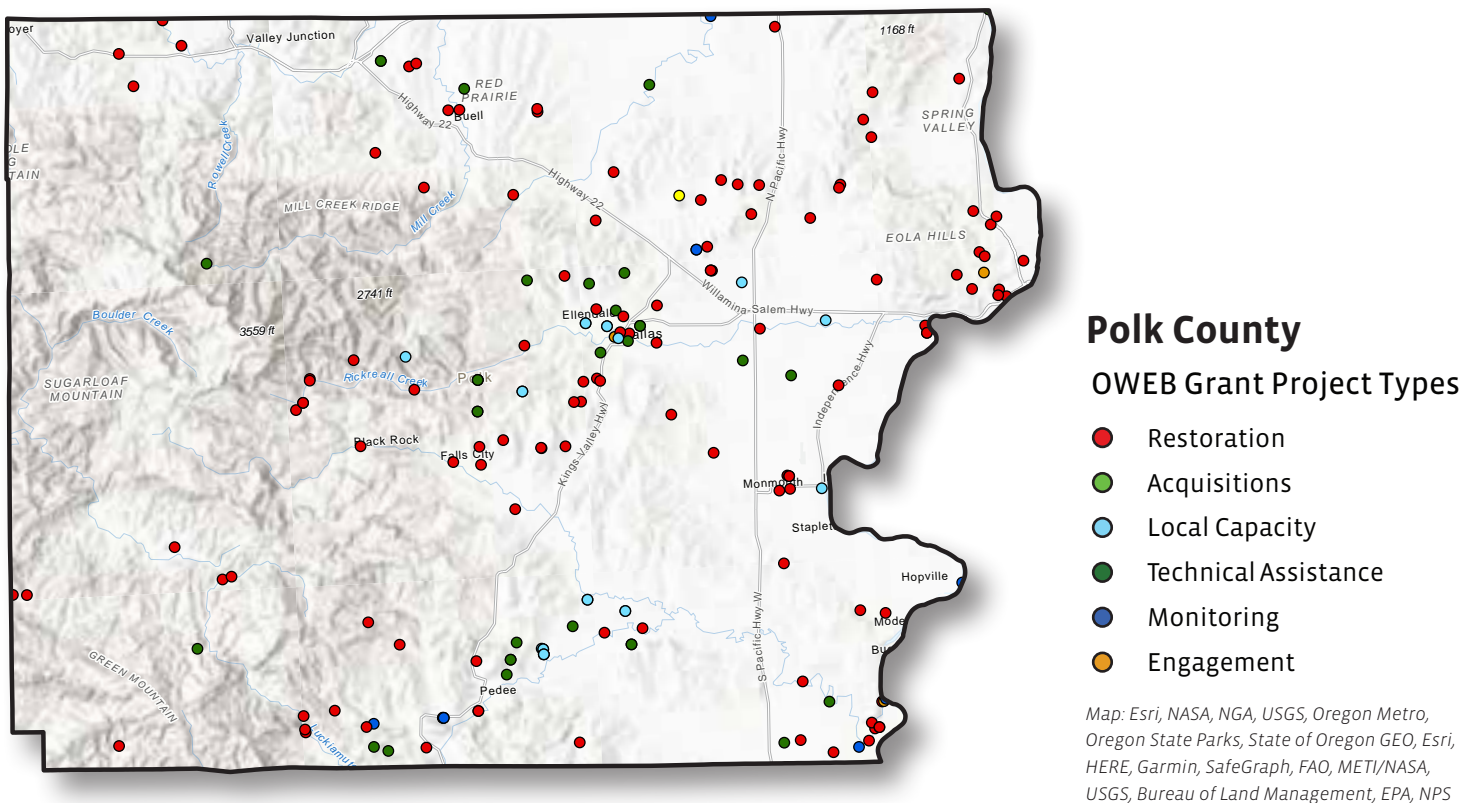
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Projects in Polk County by Type, 1999–2023

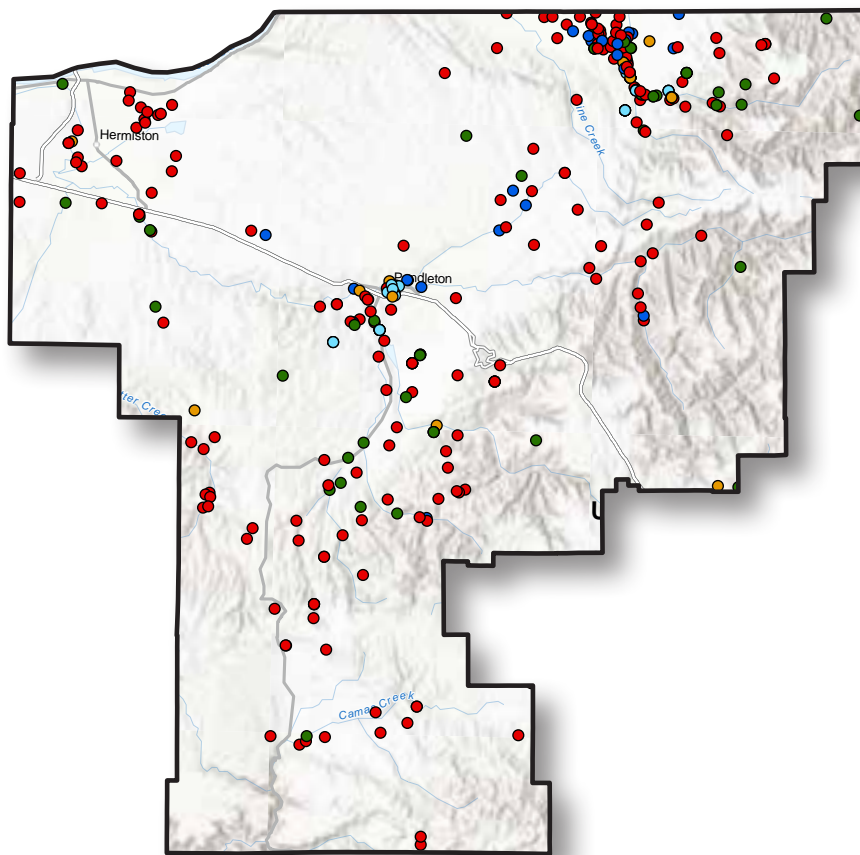

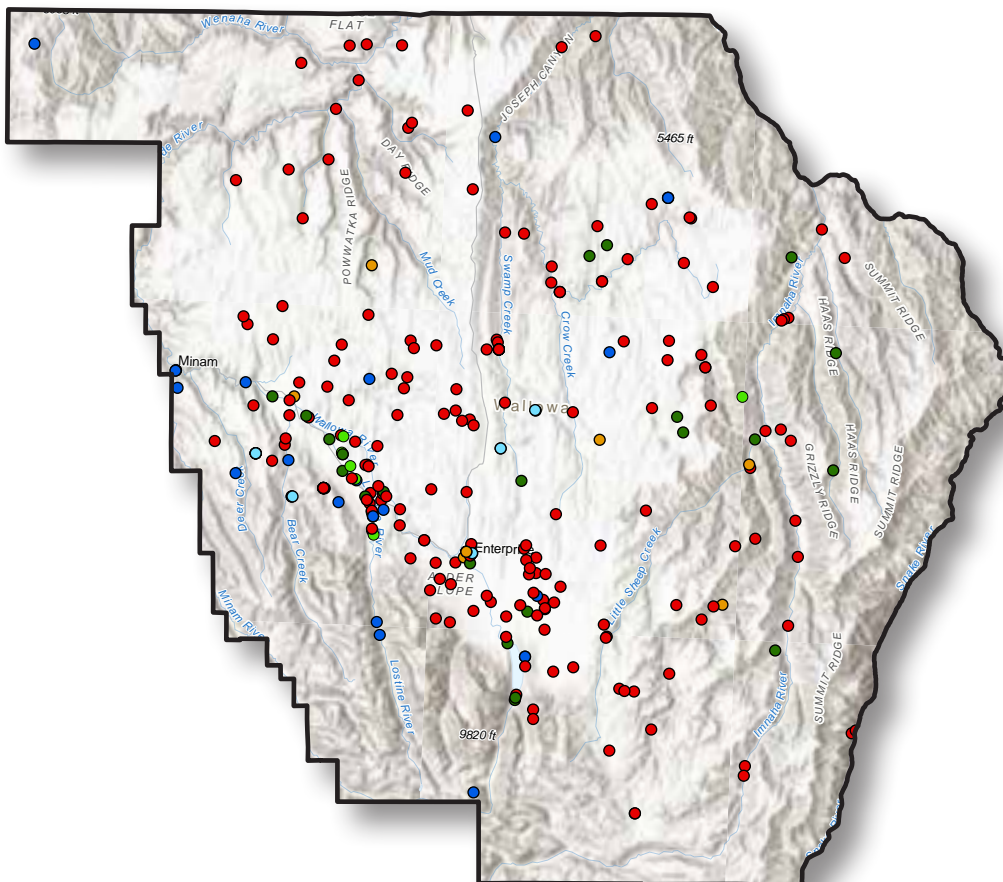
