Supporting LGBTQ+ Youth in OYA Custody

Oregon Youth Authority (OYA) is committed to creating a safe, supportive, and inclusive environment for all youth, including those who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, questioning, intersex, gender fluid, or gender diverse (LGBTQ+). OYA ensures that all youth receive equal access to services, programs, and opportunities regardless of their sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression.

How OYA Supports LGBTQ+ Youth

LGBTQ+ youth in OYA custody have access to:

- Health and wellness information tailored to their needs.
- Gender-affirming clothing and hygiene products.
- Cultural events and youth development activities.
- The right to file grievances if they experience discrimination or mistreatment.
- The OYA Reporting Line (800-315-5440) to report concerns about their rights or safety.

If any of these resources are restricted, it must be part of a documented clinical treatment plan developed by a qualified mental health professional, psychologist or medical doctor.

Creating a Safe and Inclusive Environment

Staff Training

- OYA staff, volunteers, and contractors receive training on LGBTQ+ issues to ensure they understand how to support and protect LGBTQ+ youth.
- Training includes recognizing discrimination, respecting identity, responding to harassment, and ways adults are expected to support positive adolescent development.

Respecting Identity

- Youth are given the opportunity to share their identity during the intake process.
- Staff will use a youth's correct name and pronouns unless legal records require otherwise.
- Staff must ask youth who identify as transgender if they prefer staff who identify as male or female to conduct their physical searches.

Housing and Placement

- Placement decisions are made case by case to ensure youth safety and wellbeing.
- The Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity, and Expression Committee (SOGIEC)
 helps determine safe housing and placement options. The committee may
 recommend a location consistent with the youth's stated gender identity if
 appropriate. They will consider the youth's input to determine whether a genderaffirming placement is reasonable and possible.
- Youth cannot be placed in isolation simply because of their sexual orientation or gender identity.
- If a youth feels safer sleeping in a private room, staff will provide one if available. If a private room is not an option, staff will work with the youth to develop an alternative safety plan.

Clothing, Grooming, and Personal Items

Youth may request clothing, grooming items, and hygiene products that align with their gender identity.

- Requests are reviewed on a case-by-case basis to ensure youth needs are met.
- Staff cannot deny these requests based on sexual orientation or gender identity—they must have a specific, documented, credible reason for denial.

Bathrooms, Showers, and Privacy

- Youth cannot be forced to use separate facilities just because of their gender identity.
- If a youth reports a safety concern, staff will work with them to create a safety plan.
- Staff must give transgender, gender fluid, gender diverse, and intersex youth the
 option to shower and change clothes in a private space separate from other
 youth.

Medical and Mental Health Support

- Youth in facilities have access to gender-affirming health care and mental health services.
- Youth with Oregon Health Plan benefits can receive gender-affirming treatment if eligible.

 Qualified mental health professionals (QMHP) offer counseling and support for LGTBQ+ youth and youth exploring their identity.

How Families Can Support Their Youth

- Families can request information about OYA's LGBTQ+ policies and services.
- If a youth faces discrimination or mistreatment, families can help them file a grievance or call the OYA Reporting Line (800-315-5440).
- Families can connect with their youth's case manager for placement and support questions.

Commitment to Safety and Inclusion
