

Joseph O'Leary Director Oregon Youth Authority

Joe O'Leary became the director of OYA in February 2018, after being appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Oregon Senate. He joined the agency as its deputy director in 2013. His professional experience ranges from working as a public defender to advising two governors on public safety and legal issues.



OYA works to keep communities safe by holding youth accountable and providing them with guidance, education, and a support network. As director, Joe is responsible for overseeing the operations of the agency, which serves about 900 youth ages 12-24 at any given time — about 400 in close custody across the state, and another 500 on probation or parole.

During his tenure, Joe has deepened OYA's commitment to developmental and therapeutic approaches for youth in the agency's care; launched an agency initiative focusing on diversity, equity, and inclusion; presided over the construction of new, developmentally appropriate housing and a high school inside two secure facilities; oversaw the closure of two secure facilities and fostered the agency's successful effort to reduce its use of secure isolation for youth in custody.

Prior to his state government service, Joe was a trial attorney in Portland. His legal career included work as a public defender and several years in private practice. He also served as counsel to the Judiciary Committee of the Oregon Legislature and then public safety advisor and legal counsel to Gov. Ted Kulongoski. Before law school, Joe worked in a Latino farmworker community in Central Washington as part of Jesuit Volunteer Corps Northwest.

Joe received his undergraduate degree from the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. and his juris doctorate from Lewis & Clark Law School in Portland. He has been a member of the Oregon State Bar since 1997 and is admitted to practice in state and federal courts. He also serves as an adjunct professor of law at Lewis & Clark Law School, is a Senior Fellow of the American Leadership Forum of Oregon, is a member of the advisory board for the Council of State Governments Justice Center, a board member of Council of Juvenile Justice Administrators, and a member of the Georgetown University's Juvenile Justice Leadership Network.
