# Introduction

Oregon's juvenile justice community is committed to providing effective and efficient services to promote public safety, ensuring justice for victims, and preventing youth from repeating criminal behavior. Understanding the recidivism rate for youth referred to the juvenile justice system is a way to measure juvenile crime and the impact of intervention efforts around the state.

## **Definition of recidivism for this report:**

*As a measure of public safety, recidivism is defined as a new criminal referral.*

*A criminal referral is a law enforcement report to a juvenile department alleging one or more felony or misdemeanor acts (offenses).*

## Contents of this report

This report contains statewide and county-specific measures of recidivism for 2022 based on the measurement of criminal activity as a gauge of community safety. The report selects youth who had a criminal referral in 2022 and tracks them for the following 36 months. To track all youth who had a referral in 2022 for a full 36-month period, the report requires 2025 referral data to be complete.

All data for this report comes from Oregon's Juvenile Justice Information System (JJIS). There are no outside data sources used and the report includes only criminal referrals from the State of Oregon.

## Findings and Limitations

### **Summary Findings**

- Total statewide youth in the 2022 cohort are 5,185.
- The overall 36-month statewide recidivism rate is 36.9%.
  - The 36-month statewide chronic recidivism rate (three or more subsequent referrals) is 11.8%.

### **Limitations of a 36-Month Tracking Period**

In Oregon, criminal offenses after the age of 18 are processed by the adult system, not by local county juvenile departments. As a result, youth who are aged 15, 16, or 17 at the beginning of the tracking period will not have a full 36 months of juvenile referral data available to evaluate.

For example:

- Youth who are 15 can be tracked for at least 24 months, but will reach the age of 18 prior to a full 36 months of tracking in JJIS.
- Youth who are 16 can be tracked for at least 12 months, but will reach the age of 18 prior to a full 36 months of tracking in JJIS.
- Youth who are 17 will reach the age of 18 during the first year of the tracking period, so will have less than 12 months of tracking in JJIS.

Because of the shortened tracking periods for 15-, 16-, and 17-year-olds described above, the rates reflected in this report underestimate recidivism.

## Notes about the information

**Counts:** Data is grouped by the county where the referral originated. The report counts the total number of youth who had a criminal referral originating in that county in the reporting year. The report sorts the results into two primary groups:

- **No Subsequent Referrals:** Youth who had no subsequent referrals during the following 36 months.
- **Subsequent Referrals:** Youth who had one or more subsequent referrals during the following 36 months. This group is further divided into two groups:
  - Youth with one or two subsequent referrals.
  - Youth with three or more subsequent referrals.

**Percentages:** Percentages are rounded to the nearest whole number and therefore may not add up to 100%.

**Demographics:** The JJIS Steering Committee recognizes that reporting race, ethnicity, sex, and gender in JJIS may not accurately represent everyone, due in part to a need to comply with federal reporting requirements. We respect all individuals, but also acknowledge and regret we may not be able to capture how individuals self-identify in these areas.

- **Race and Ethnicity:** The JJIS Steering Committee defined Race/Ethnicity reporting categories based on available data. Race is recorded by the juvenile department based on police reports and youths' self-reporting. These reports categorize youth by the race that is recorded in JJIS unless the recorded ethnicity is Hispanic. When the recorded ethnicity is Hispanic, the youth is categorized as Hispanic, regardless of race.
- **Sex:** The options for reporting sex are Male, Female, Non-Binary, and Unknown. There are current state and national discussions about new ways to document sex that are respectful and inclusive of all. The JJIS Steering Committee will continue to engage in those discussions and make updates in this area as available.

Readers are cautioned against making comparisons between counties. Many factors can influence recidivism rates including the size of the county (small populations can lead to significant variations in results), local laws and practices, and local law enforcement resources.
