To promote public safety and youth accountability, and to offer opportunities for rehabilitation to youth, through the development and sustainability of a statewide juvenile justice information system.

JJIS Data and Evaluation Subcommittee

The JJIS Data and Evaluation Subcommittee is a standing committee of the JJIS Steering Committee, contributing to local and statewide research initiatives, program and system evaluations, and policy recommendations regarding the use of data. The subcommittee supports the juvenile justice system by ensuring consistency, accuracy and appropriateness of the data, guiding the development of routine and annual reports and statistics, and interpreting relevant data analyses.

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Introduction

Oregon's juvenile justice system is dedicated to delivering effective and efficient services that promote public safety, ensure justice for victims, and reduce recidivism among youth.

The way referrals are processed and resolved within the juvenile justice system offers critical insights into how cases are handled. Understanding case resolutions is essential for evaluating the system's effectiveness and identifying areas for improvement.

Contents of this report

For all reports, dispositions are grouped into categories and are listed from least to most intense level of juvenile justice intervention. For example, a disposition of a youth being petitioned to court and placed on probation is more intense than a warning (See Appendix B.). This report contains four tables describing dispositions:

Disposition of Youth by Demographics

The number of unique youth who received a disposition by the juvenile justice system during the reporting year, categorized by youth demographics and disposition intensity.

Youth are reported in the most intense disposition category imposed for that youth during the year in the county that imposed the disposition. The youth is counted only once in the table, regardless of the number of dispositions a youth received during the year. If there was more than one disposition with the same intensity, the disposition with the most recent date was selected.

Disposition of Youth by Offense Category

The number of unique youth who received a disposition by the juvenile justice system during the reporting year, categorized by offense severity and disposition intensity.

Youth are reported according to the most severe offense on the most intense disposition category imposed for that youth during the year in the county that imposed the disposition. The youth is counted only once in the table, regardless of the number of dispositions a youth received during the year. If there was more than one disposition with the same intensity, the disposition with the most recent date was selected.

Dispositions by Youth Demographics

The total number of unique dispositions imposed by the juvenile justice system during the reporting year, categorized by youth demographics.

Every disposition imposed by the county during the year is counted and categorized by disposition intensity and the demographics of the youth who received the disposition. The table counts unique dispositions, not unique youth. If a youth received multiple dispositions in the reporting year, they are counted multiple times in the table (once for every disposition).

Dispositions by Offense Category

The total number of dispositions imposed by the juvenile justice system during the reporting year, categorized by the most severe offense on the disposition.

Every disposition imposed by the county during the year is counted and categorized by the disposition intensity and the most severe offense on the disposition. This table counts

unique dispositions, not unique youth. If a youth received multiple dispositions in the reporting year, they are counted multiple times in the table (once for every disposition).

Notes about the information

Changes for the 2024 Reporting Year: Starting with the 2024 reporting year, the Disposition of Referrals by Demographics and Disposition of Referrals by Offense Category tables have been replaced by the new Dispositions by Demographics and Dispositions by Offense Category tables. The new tables provide a more complete picture by counting every disposition imposed during the reporting period.

Rounding: Totals are rounded to the nearest whole number and therefore may not add up to 100%.

Offense Categories and Severity: The offenses on each disposition are categorized according to Oregon Revised Statute (ORS), Criminal Code of Oregon. Offense severity is determined by each offense's category, type, and class (See Appendix A.).

Disposition Categories and Intensity: The report includes dispositions of felony, misdemeanor, non-criminal violation, and dependency status allegations during the reporting year. Local ordinances are not included. Dispositions are categorized and ranked by intensity according to standards developed by the JJIS Data and Evaluation Committee (See Appendix B.).

Counts: Youth may have received a disposition in more than one county. On the Statewide report, the Disposition of Youth by Demographics and the Statewide Disposition of Youth by Offense Category tables count the youth only once in the county that imposed the most intense disposition. The Dispositions by Youth Demographics and Dispositions by Offense Category tables count all dispositions by all counties.

County: The county recorded is the county responsible for assigning the youth's disposition. If the county was recorded on the disposition, it was selected as the responsible county.

Demographics: The JJIS Steering Committee recognizes that reporting race, ethnicity, sex, and gender in JJIS may not accurately represent everyone, due in part to a need to comply with federal reporting requirements. We respect all individuals, but also acknowledge we cannot capture how individuals may self-identify in these areas.

- **Race and Ethnicity:** The JJIS Steering Committee defines Race/Ethnicity reporting categories based on available data. Race is recorded by the juvenile department based on police reports and youths' self-reporting. These reports categorize youth by the race that is recorded in JJIS unless the recorded ethnicity is Hispanic. When the recorded ethnicity is Hispanic, the youth is categorized as Hispanic, regardless of race.
- **Sex:** The options for reporting sex currently include Male, Female, or Unknown. There are current state and national discussions about new ways to document sex that are respectful and inclusive of all. The JJIS Steering Committee will continue to engage in those discussions and make updates in this area as available.
