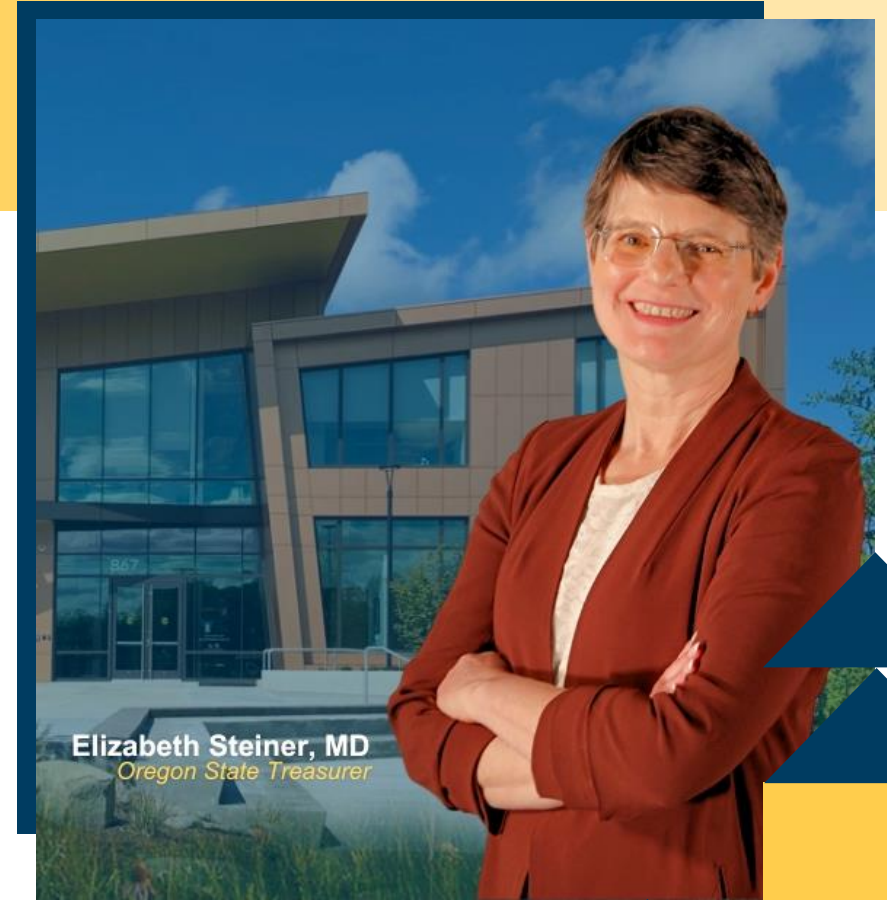

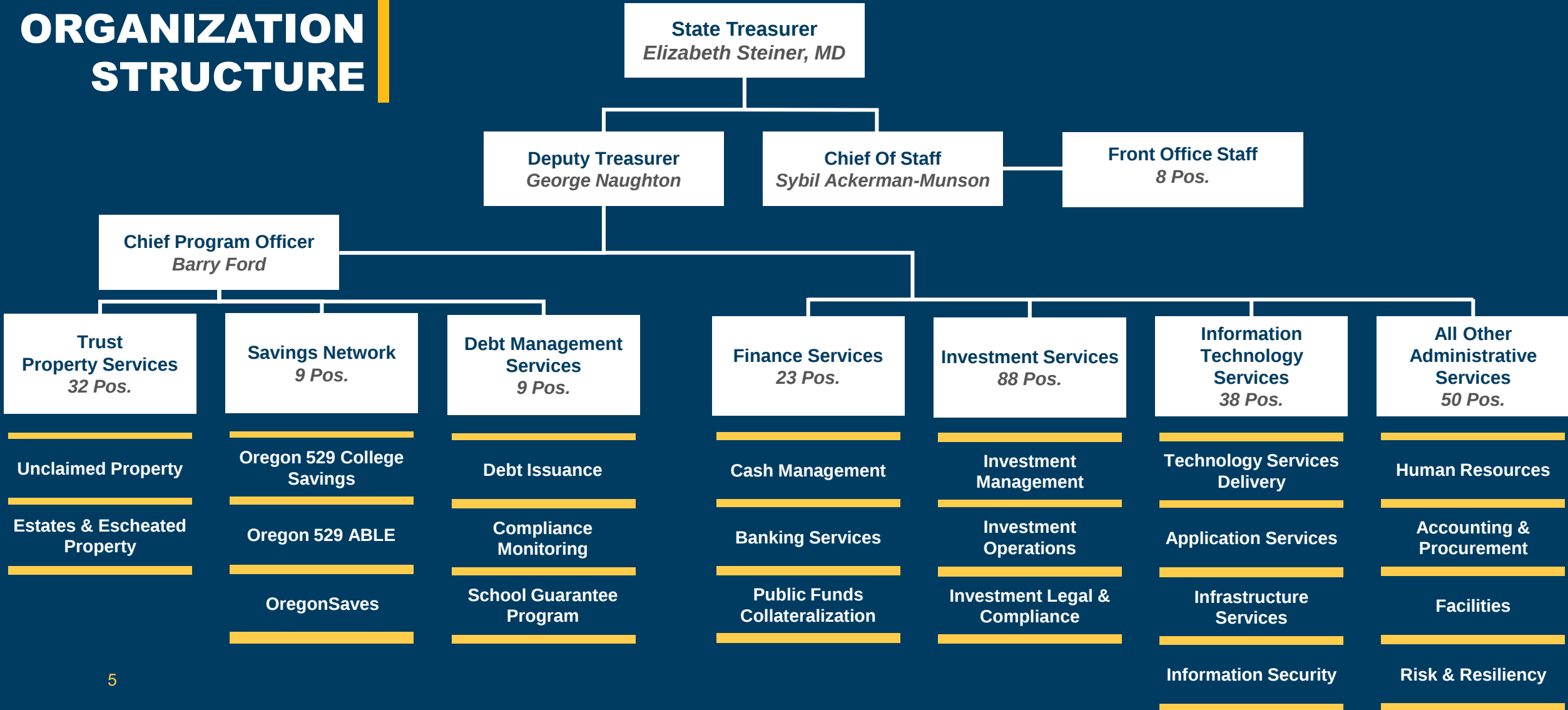

- **\$141 Billion Assets Under Management** *(as of 12/31/2024)*
 - Oregon Public Employees Retirement Fund (*OPERF*): \$100 Billion
 - Oregon Short Term Fund: \$36 Billion

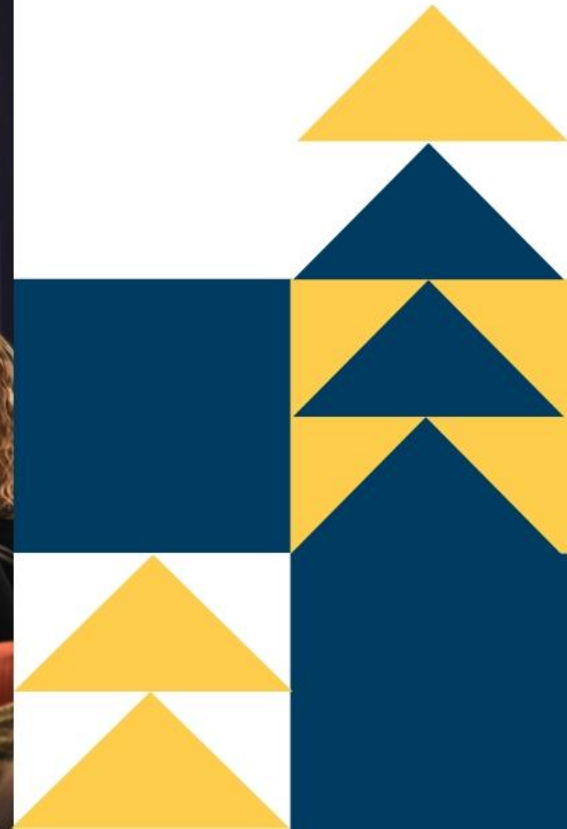

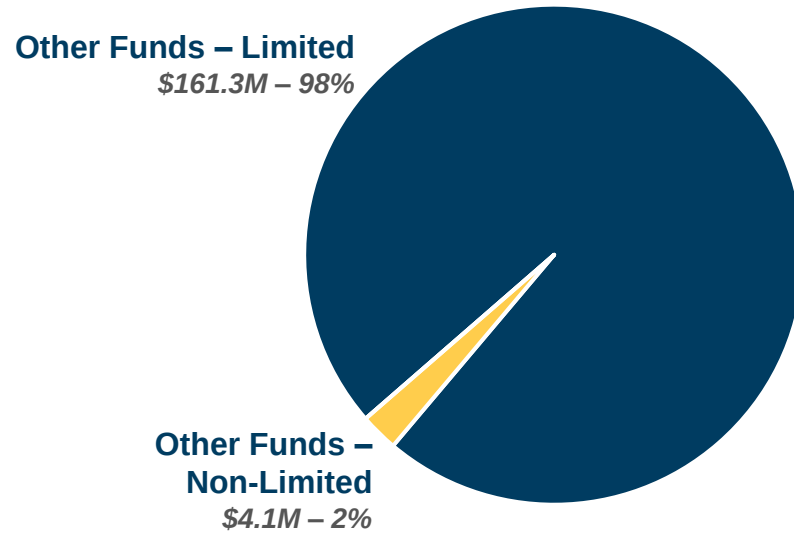

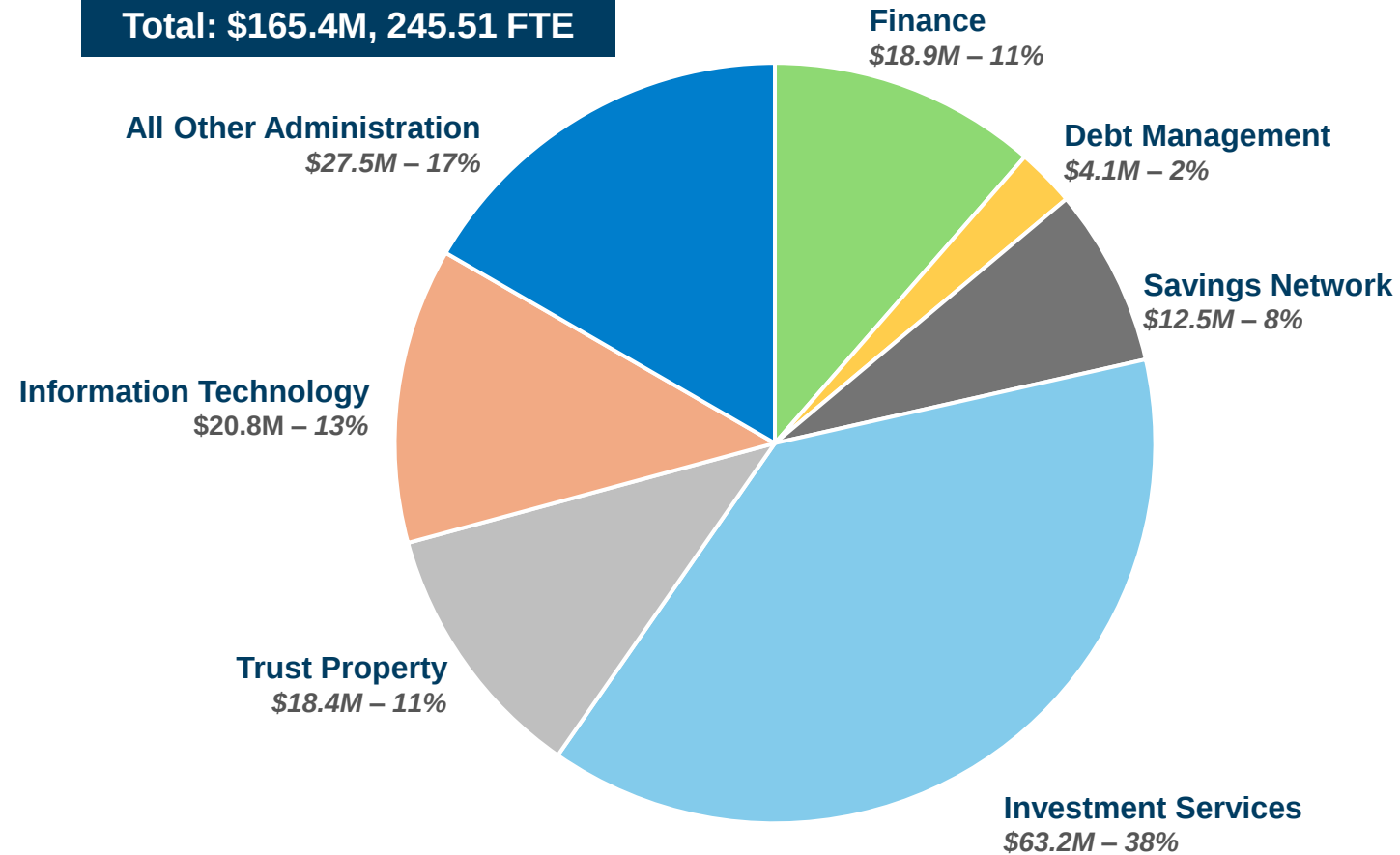
BY FUND TYPE

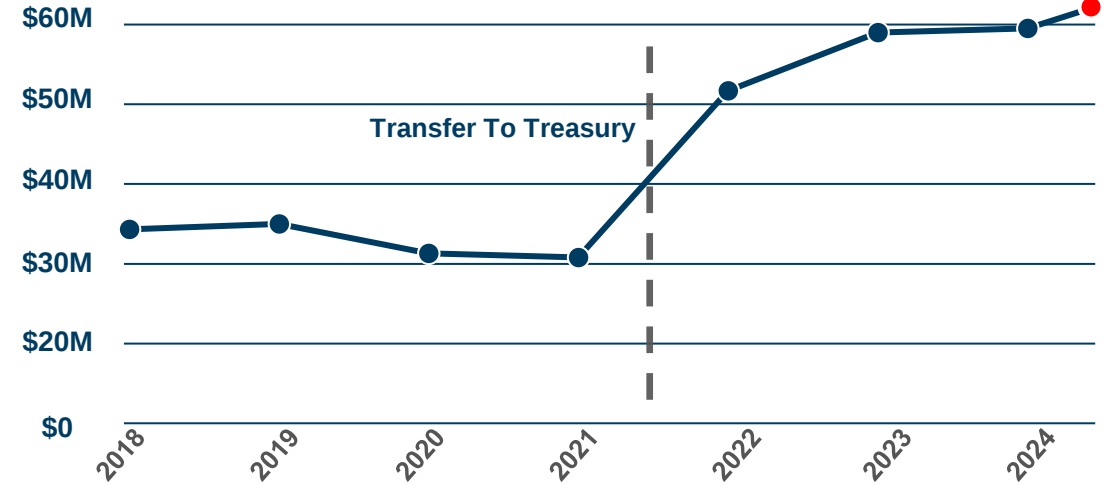

Claims Paid Out To Owners





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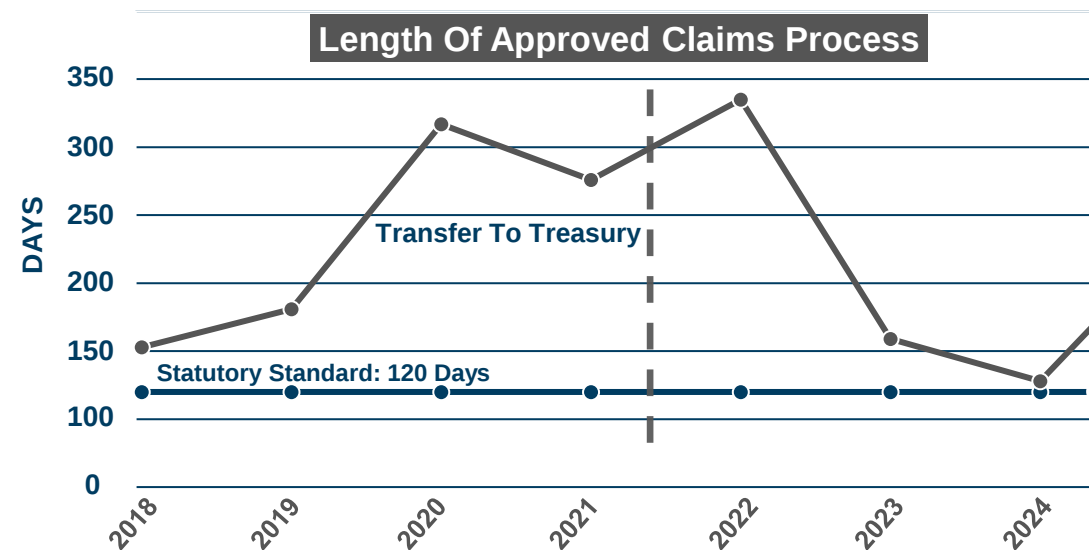

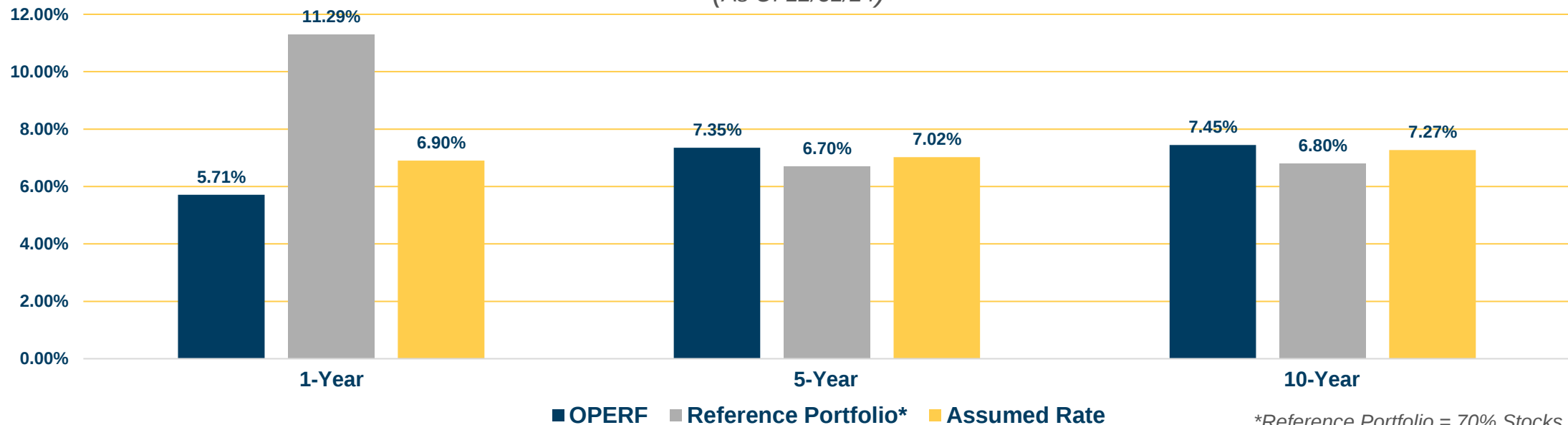

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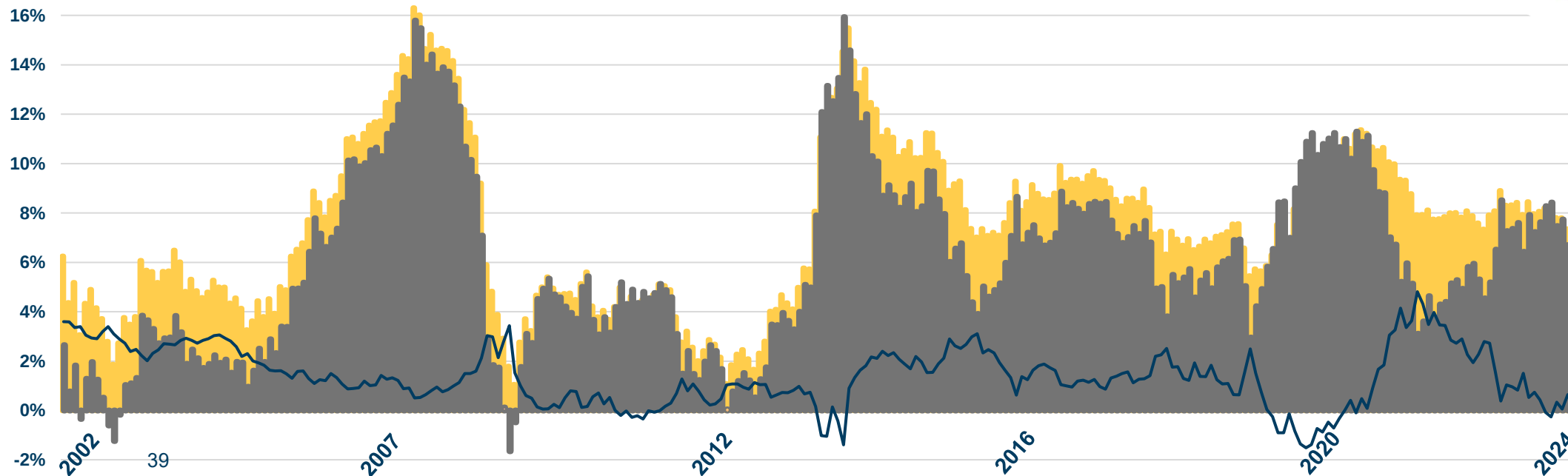

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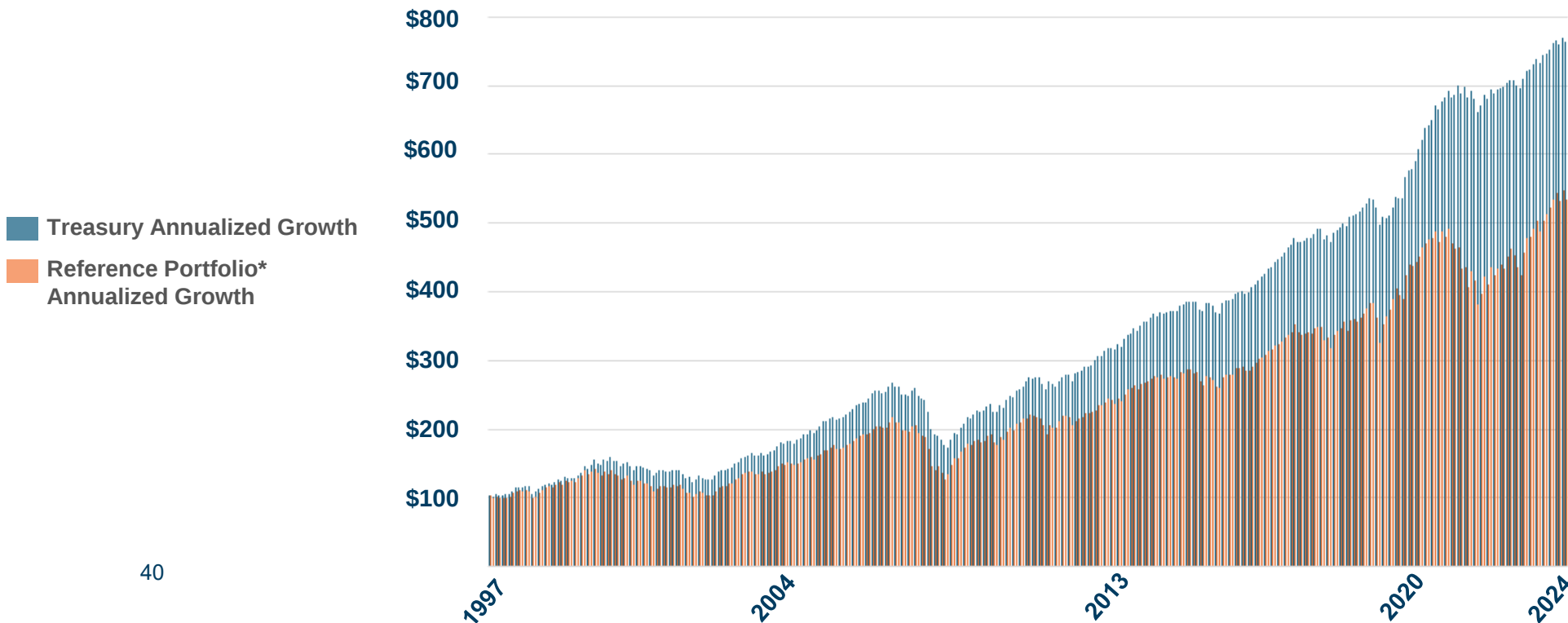

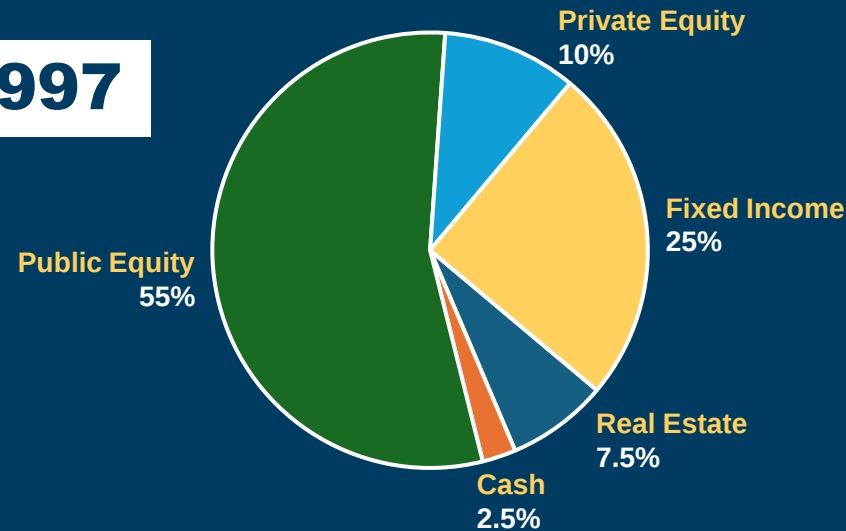
Growth Of \$100 Since 1997 If Invested By Treasury Or In A Reference Portfolio*



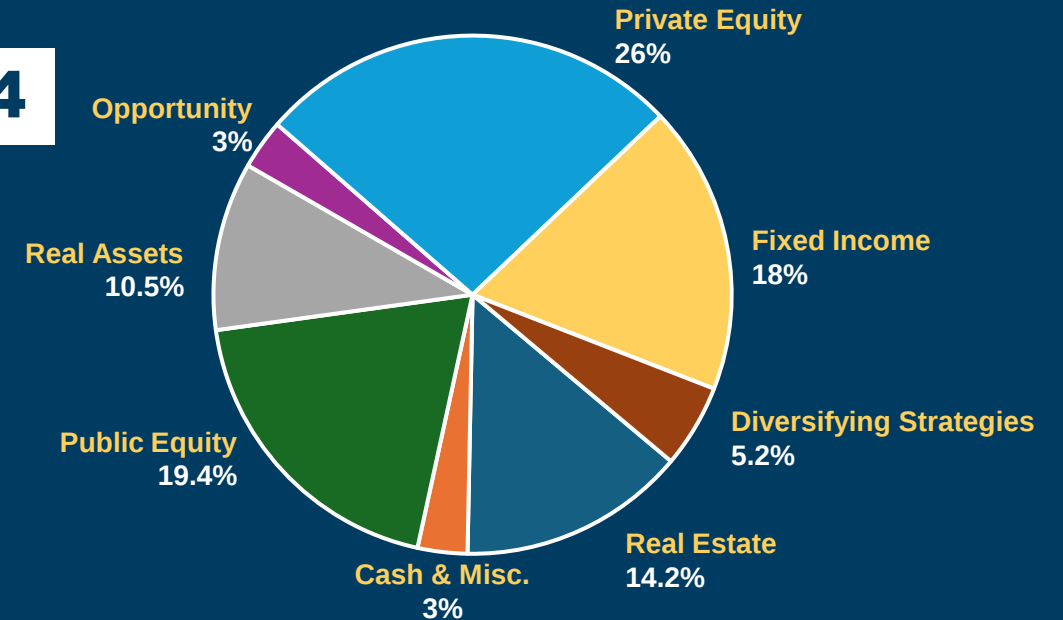

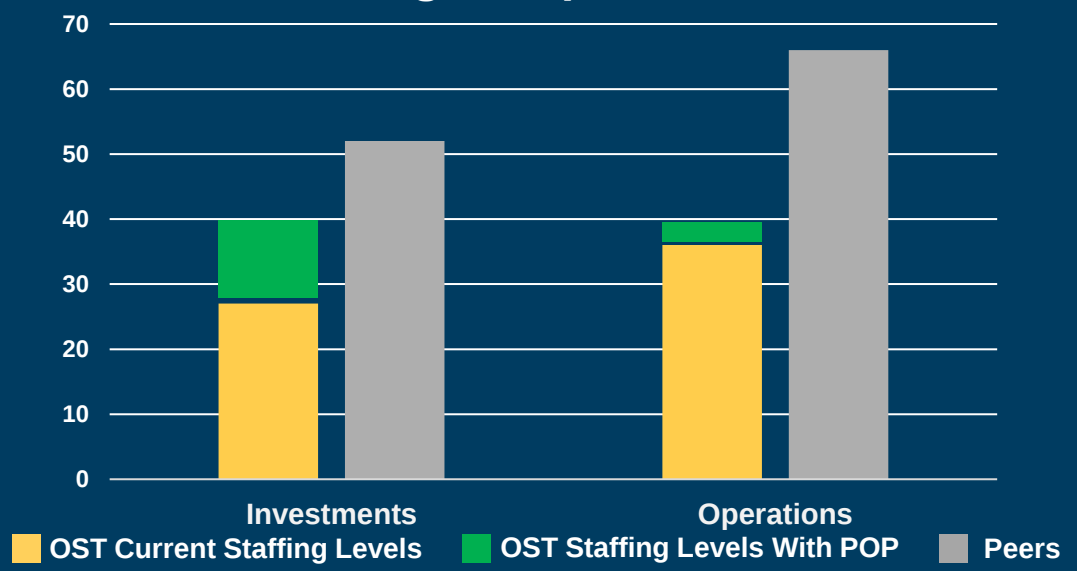

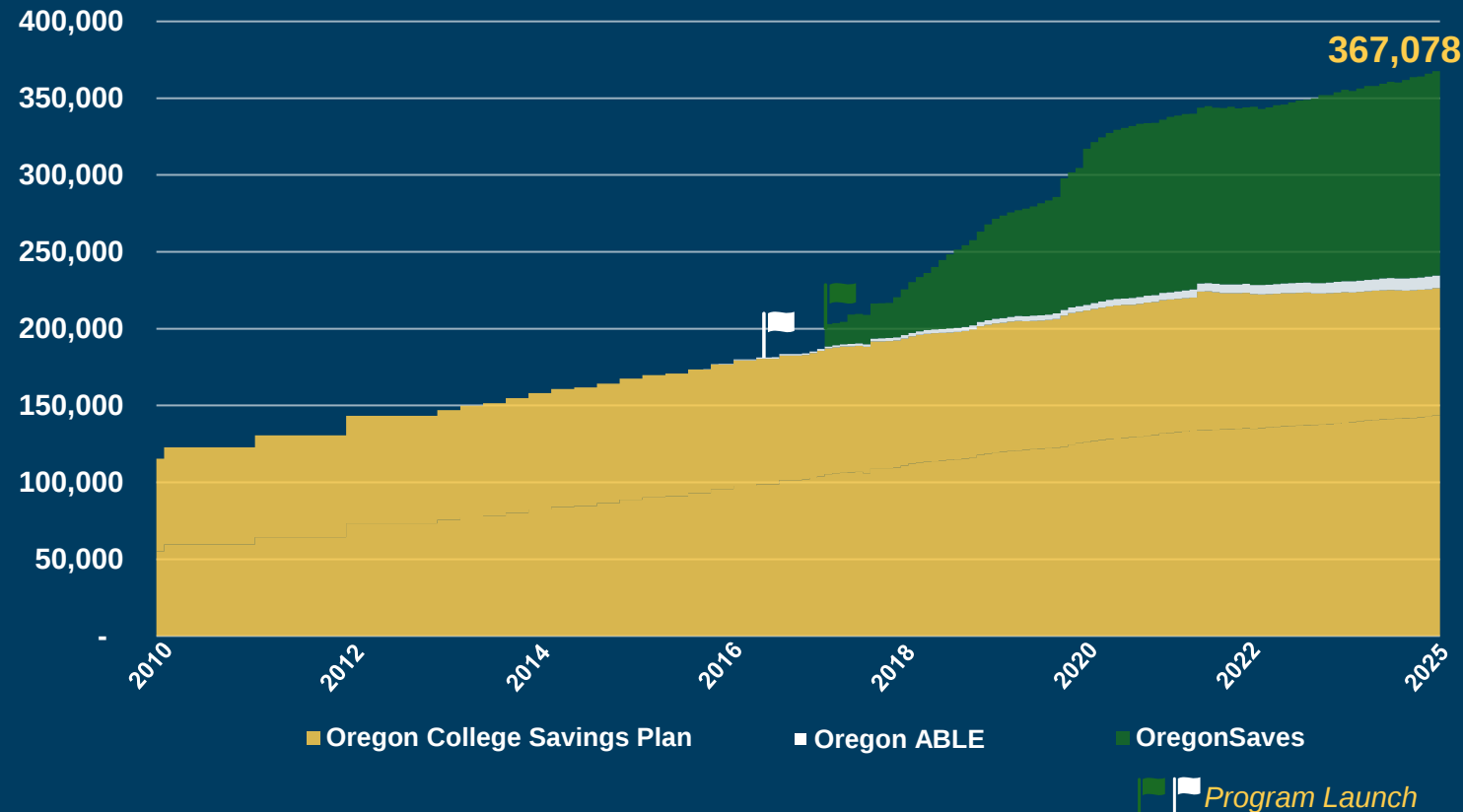

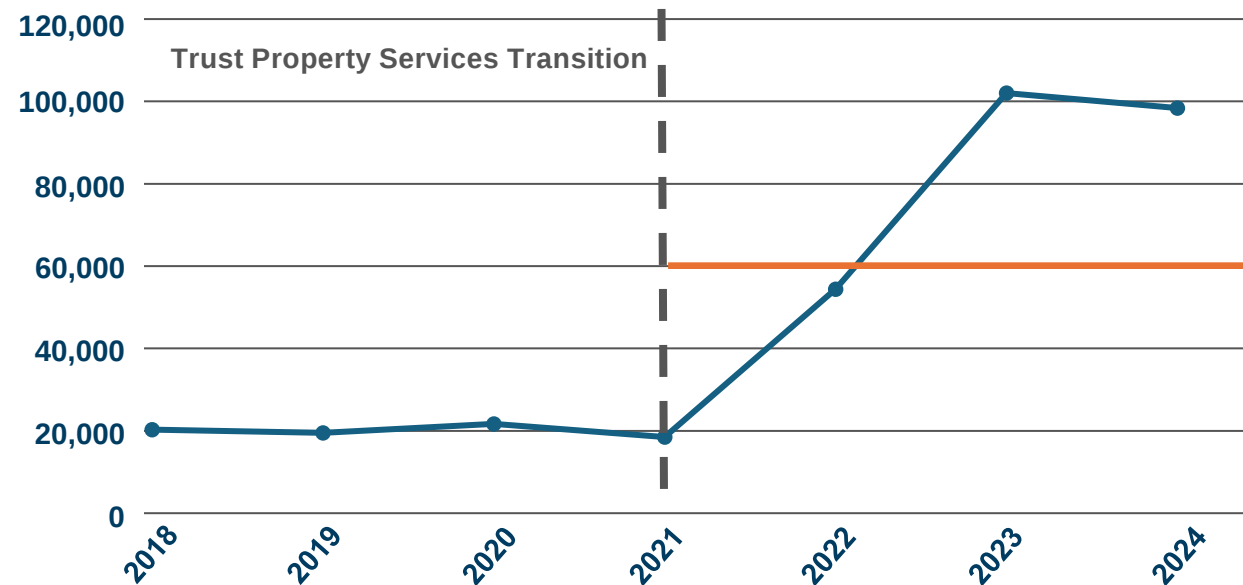
