

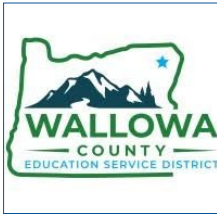

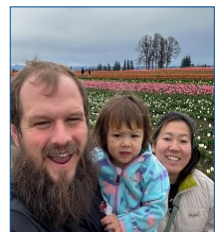
Apprentice Tatiana Grigoryeva— Woodburn School District
