HALLQUIST) PUBLIC REPRIMAND 6 7 8 9 On May 2, 2023, the Teacher Standards and Practices Commission (Commission) 10 received a School District Misconduct Report from the Human Resources (HR) 11 Department of the Hillsboro (HSD). The report alleged possible professional 12 misconduct on the part of licensed educator, Jacquelyn V. Hallquist (Hallquist). 13 After review of the matters alleged, Hallquist and the Commission agree that 14 their respective interests, together with the public interest, are best served by a 15 stipulation to certain facts and the imposition of a Public Reprimand. 16 This Order sets forth the facts upon which the parties have agreed and the 17 sanction to be imposed. Hallquist stipulates that there are sufficient facts contained in 18 the Commission's files and records to support the findings of fact and conclusions of law 19 set forth below. In entering into this stipulation, Hallquist waives the right to a hearing 20 to contest the findings of fact, conclusions of law and order set forth below. 21 By signing below, Hallquist acknowledges, understands, stipulates, and agrees to the following: (i) she has been fully advised of his rights to notice and a hearing to 22 23 contest the findings of fact, conclusions of law, and order set forth below, and fully and finally waives all such rights and any rights to appeal or otherwise challenge this 24 25 Stipulation of Facts and Final Order of Public Reprimand (Stipulation and Final Order); 26 (ii) this Stipulation and Final Order is a public document and disclosed to the public 27 upon request by the Commission; (iii) this Stipulation and Final Order is contingent 28 upon and subject to approval and adoption by the Commission. If the Commission does 29 not approve and adopt this Stipulation and Final Order, then neither Hallquist nor the 30 Commission are bound by the terms herein; (iv) she has fully read this Stipulation and 31 Final Order, and understands it completely; (v) she voluntarily, without any force or 32 duress, enters into this Stipulation and Final Order and consents to issuance and entry of 33 the Stipulated Final Order below; (vi) she states that no promise or representation has 34 been made to induce him to sign this Stipulation and Final Order; and (vii) she has

consulted with an attorney regarding this Stipulation and Final Order and has been fully

advised with regard to her rights thereto or waives any and all rights to consult with an

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attorney prior to entering into this Stipulation and Final Order and issuance and entry of the Stipulated Final Order below.

STIPULATION OF FACTS

The Commission has licensed Hallquist since June 7, 1990. Hallquist holds a
Professional Teaching License, with endorsements in Elementary – Multiple
Subjects (PK-12), Special Education Generalist (PK-12), and Reading
Intervention (PK-12); valid from November 8, 2022 to May 15, 2028. During all
relevant times, Hallquist was employed by the Hillsboro School District (HSD).

2. On May 2, 2023, TSPC received a School District Misconduct Report from the Director of Human Resources for the HSD, Brian Haats. The report alleged that Hallquist engaged in unprofessional conduct. Specifically, the report alleged that on April 19, 2023 at Imlay Elementary School (IEM), Hallquist engaged in inappropriate physical contact with a nine (9) year old student (EA) by pulling the EA's wrists and "dragging" her across the floor by her legs.

 3. According to HSD documents and the TSPC investigation, the following events related to the above allegations were substantiated:

• On April 19, 2023, an incident occurred between Hallquist and a dysregulated SPED student identified as student EA.

• Student EA is a student in Hallquist's special education class and has a history of acting out, including running out of the school building, falling on the floor, throwing herself against the wall, and screaming in the hallway. Her Behavioral Support Plan (BSP) included running to a safe room in the school as a replacement behavior for dysregulated or escalated behavior.

 Per HSD records, Hallquist and two para educators were addressing EA's poor dysregulated behavior.

 The incident in question was captured by on recorded video on IEM's CCTV security cameras.

 EA had made several attempts to escape from the building and threw herself on the floor in the main hallway of the school. At the beginning of the incident, one of the paraeducators accompanied EA in
the hallway and EA threw herself on the hallway floor. Hallquist and the other
para-educator then came into the hallway while EA was still on the floor and
moving her legs in a kicking motion. At this point, the hallway was empty
except for EA, Hallquist, and the two para-educators.

- During the first several minutes of the incident, Hallquist and the paraeducators surrounded EA while she was on the floor, followed her when she ran away from them, and then surrounded her again when she stopped running. She remained on the hallway floor for approximately one minute, while Hallquist and the paraeducators stood over her, not touching her.
 During this time, several adults were present in the hallway.
- After this, EA stood up and the three educators began walking her down the
 hallway toward a conference room; one of the "safe rooms" in her BSP. After a
 few seconds, EA began to run. One of the paraeducators held her hand
 around EA's left wrist, and Hallquist walked close to EA, but did not have her
 hand on EA's wrist or arm.
- The video shows para-educators attempting to gain control of EA by grabbing her wrists while Hallquist can be seen blocking doorways and exit paths.
- Shortly after EA once more laid down on the floor, Hallquist is seen on recorded video placing her hands on EA's calves and sliding EA a few feet across the floor to move her into the conference room adjacent to the hallway. Hallquist and a para-educator then lifted EA into a sitting position in the conference room. The para-educators stayed with EA and closed the door, while Hallquist remained in the hallway.
- Recorded video also captures Hallquist and the para-educators pushing EA into a conference room, where she was forced to remain.
- No injuries to EA were reported or documented during this incident.
- District investigative documents surrounding this incident note that the
 actions of Hallquist and the para-educators violated Safety Care protocols and
 were not district approved physical control holds.
- On April 20, 2023, Hallquist and the para-educators were placed on administrative leave pending the outcome of a district investigation into this matter.

1 On April 28, 2023, Hallquist was interviewed by district staff regarding this 2 incident, and reported that had Hallquist and the para-educators not 3 intervened, EA would have escaped from the building and into a roadway 4 which would have placed her in danger. 5 Additionally, Hallquist reported to HSD staff that EA had a history of selfharm, and during this incident Hallquist feared for her safety. 6 7 Hallquist also reported that EA had resisted her and the para-educator's 8 attempts to intervene, and "kind of guided" EA towards the conference room 9 where she could deescalate and be safe. 10 During the interview, HSD staff allowed Hallquist to watch the recorded video of the incident. 11 12 After viewing the video, Hallquist told HSD staff that in hindsight she would 13 have given EA more time in the hallway to deescalate before moving her to 14 the conference room. 15 On June 12, 2023, as a result of this incident, the HSD terminated Hallquist's 16 employment with the district. In April of 2024, the Fair Dismissal Appeals Board (FDAB) reviewed 17 18 Hallquist's termination, and ruled in her favor, recommending that Hallquist 19 be reinstated to her position. The HSD appealed the FDAB decision, but 20 withdrew the appeal after the parties reached a settlement, leaving the FDAB 21 decision intact. 22 23 24 IT IS SO STIPULATED: Sep 17, 2025 25 (Sep 17, 2025 18:24:00 PDT) Jacquelyn V. 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1	0020(2)(d) (Skill in the supervision of students), OAR 584-020-0025(2)(e) (Using
2	district lawful and reasonable rules and regulations), and 584-020-0040(4)(d)
3	(Unreasonable physical force against students, fellow employees, or visitors to the
4	school, except as permitted under ORS 339.250).
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6	ORDER
7	The Commission adopts and incorporates herein the above findings of fact and
8	conclusions of law, and based thereon, imposes a Public Reprimand.
