FREYSINGER) SUSPENSION AND PROBATION 6 7 8 On February 8, 2022 the Teacher Standards and Practices Commission 9 (Commission) received a cross-report from the Oregon Department of Human Services 10 (DHS) alleging possible professional misconduct on the part of licensed educator, 11 Michael G. Freysinger (Freysinger). In addition to the DHS report, the Commission also 12 received an Educator Misconduct report from the Hood River County School District 13 (HRCSD) reporting/alleging the same misconduct. Specifically, the two reports alleged 14 that Freysinger made inappropriate sexual comments to students in class. 15 After review of the matters alleged, Freysinger and the Commission agree that 16 their respective interests, together with the public interest, are best served by a 17 stipulation to certain facts and the imposition of a thirty (30) day suspension of 18 Freysinger's Oregon educator's license and 2 years probation. 19 This Order sets forth the facts upon which the parties have agreed and the 20 sanction to be imposed. Freysinger stipulates that there are sufficient facts contained in 21 the Commission's files and records to support the findings of fact and conclusions of law 22 set forth below. In entering into this stipulation, Freysinger waives the right to a hearing 23 to contest the findings of fact, conclusions of law and order set forth below. 24 By signing below, Freysinger acknowledges, understands, stipulates, and agrees 25 to the following: (i) he has been fully advised of his rights to notice and a hearing to 26 contest the findings of fact, conclusions of law, and order set forth below, and fully and 27 finally waives all such rights and any rights to appeal or otherwise challenge this 28 Stipulation of Facts and Final Order of Suspension and Probation (Stipulation and Final 29 Order); (ii) this Stipulation and Final Order is a public document and disclosed to the 30 public upon request by the Commission; (iii) this Stipulation and Final Order is 31 contingent upon and subject to approval and adoption by the Commission. If the 32 Commission does not approve and adopt this Stipulation and Final Order, then neither 33 Freysinger nor the Commission are bound by the terms herein; (iv) he has fully read this 34 Stipulation and Final Order, and understands it completely; (v) he voluntarily, without

any force or duress, enters into this Stipulation and Final Order and consents to issuance

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8		STIPULATION OF FACTS
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10	1.	The Commission has licensed Freysinger since July 12, 2006. Freysinger currently
11		holds a Professional Teaching License with endorsements in Biology (PK-12),
12		Chemistry (PK-12), Health Sciences CTE (PK-12) and Integrated Science (PK-12).
13		The license was issued on June 22, 2021 and expires on June 21, 2026. During all
14		relevant times, Freysinger was employed by the Hood River County School District
15		(HRCSD).
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17	2.	On February 8, 2022, TSPC received a cross-report from the Oregon Department of
18		Human Services (DHS) alleging misconduct by Michael G. Freysinger, a licensed
19		HRCSD educator. In addition to the DHS report, TSPC also received an Educator
20		Misconduct Report from the HRCSD as well as a two misconduct reports from
21		parents of students in his class; all alleging the same behavior. Specifically, the
22		reports alleged that Freysinger made inappropriate sexual comments to students in
23		class which was a dual college credit Medical Terminology as part of a Health Science
24		Career Technical Education training program, as one of the pre-requisites for the
25		Medical Assistant Program with the local community College. It was reported that
26		Freysinger had talked in detail about his own sexual history, his current sexual
27		activity, and had solicited inappropriate feedback from students about their own
28		sexual experiences. The HRCSD became aware of the allegations on February 4,
29		2022, and immediately placed Freysinger on paid administrative leave. An
30		investigation into this matter was conducted by both the HRCSD and the Hood River
31		County Sheriff's Office (HRCSO).
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33	3.	The allegations were substantiated after completion of an investigation by HRCSD
34		and HRCSO. Thirteen direct student witnesses confirmed that Freysinger engaged in

sexually explicit, highly inappropriate personal and private conversations with students during class from January 1, 2022 to March 14, 2022.

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In addition, it was documented that Freysinger shared very personal and inappropriate information about himself to students. The information shared included information about his own sexual history, past abusive relationships, personal healthcare experiences, and specific details about his own body. The HRCSD found Freysinger to be in violation of GBNAA/JHFF district policy. Law enforcement completed their investigation and determined that no criminal charges would be filed.

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4. TSPC interviewed Freysinger on May 9, 2022 in the company of his attorney, Martin Dolan. During the interview Freysinger admitted to sharing personal information with students but reported that none of these stories were relayed with any sort of sexual intent. Freysinger reported that he shared these stories and examples in the context of healthcare, directly related to the content of the class. The intent was to treat all 12 body systems with equal emphasis on whole-person care regarding male & female anatomy, and to share experiences he had being a caretaker married to a paralyzed spouse. Freysinger says he never shared anything about his personal sexual experiences. Freysinger admits to sharing about his surgical history whenever those exact subjects were covered in the textbook and admitted to discussing he and his sexual partner's experiences with IUDs when a student pulled him aside and asked him questions. Freysinger admitted to talking about past personal trauma he had endured from prior relationships as well as family drug use but stated that this was discussed in response to questions regarding the importance of mental health and seeking support from healthcare professionals. Freysinger also noted that this type of sharing seemed in line, at the time, with district norms and healthcare professional guest speakers. During this same year, HRCSD had a guest speaker come for staff training on diversity, equity, and inclusion in which they addressed the entire high school staff regarding their own personal experiences surrounding transgenderism, trauma, personal healthcare experiences including a full hysterectomy, and abuse they suffered in school. Additionally, many healthcare professionals shared their own personal healthcare experiences as both patients and providers. These professionals always answered tough questions from students, honoring their questions regardless to the gender or body system from a healthcare perspective. The school district always tries to model in trainings what they would

like to see in their classrooms, so when Freysinger shared personal examples, the 2 intent was to create comprehensible input and connections for students who might otherwise struggle in challenging classes. TSPC investigative staff asked if Freysinger had encouraged students to masturbate and he responded by saying absolutely not, but he did talk about how females have internal genitalia and men have external, so 6 familiarity with this anatomy is easier for men. This can be a healthcare challenge 7 for common procedures like catheterization for women. Freysinger did encourage all of his students to be familiar with both anatomies, as shown in the textbook. He 9 reported that he had a brief conversation with a few "select" female students about the importance of knowing their own anatomy since they were asking specific questions that Freysinger couldn't answer while they were studying a female genital 12 model in the lab. Freysinger acknowledge he shared a memory with the class about a 13 humorous episode of the TV show "Sex in the City" where all the female lead 14 character used mirrors to look at their own genitals. Freysinger was also asked if he 15 had cited HIPAA and if he told students that because of HIPAA they couldn't not 16 share the conversations they had in class with parents or staff. Freysinger stated that the HIPAA training, which was listed in every syllabus multiple times, and was meant 18 to help students be considerate about privacy around personal healthcare 19 experiences shared for any of the people in class, including fellow students, guest 20 speakers, teachers, on-site older adult residents during class field trips, college field trips, or any other groups that we might work with. This training was attempted in 22 all the healthcare CTE program classes, as well as HOSA club, since we were trying to 23 build trust in our community for healthcare internships and job shadows which did 24 not yet exist. HIPAA concerns were a primary barrier to access to healthcare 25 facilities for our students, especially our most underserved. In terms of the 26 classroom, Freysinger always encouraged students to talk about the class at home, 27 and frequently was told by students that this happened often. Freysinger says that 28 his intentions were always to honor the needs of the healthcare professionals who 29 had trained him, to try and open opportunities for students to gain access to facilities 30 where patient contact would eventually occur. Trainings like HIPAA, treating all 12 body systems equally, answering all student questions even when they were 32 sometimes challenging, were all rooted in good intention. We were offering these 33 advanced healthcare classes to students who did not meet the academic pre-34 requisites, and who were 2-3 years younger than students at the college. In

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1 retrospect, this may have not been a good idea. In the future, Freysinger says he will 2 not share personal stories related to his body or any healthcare experiences as a 3 patient or provider. Further, Freysinger removed his own Health CTE endorsement 4 from his teaching license since he says he would never want to teach these classes 5 again. Freysinger had taught chemistry for almost 20 years prior without any 6 incidents, and he feels that the content, age group, and first attempt at making a new 7 Health CTE program contributed heavily to his failure to effectively teach these 8 classes. 9 10 IT IS SO STIPULATED: 8/15/2023 Date 12/11/2023 11 12 Michael G. Freysinger 13 14 15 Cristina Edgar, Professional Practices Director **Teacher Standards and Practices Commission** 16 17 CONCLUSION OF LAW 18 The conduct described above constitutes gross neglect of duty in violation of ORS 342.175(1)(b); OAR 584-020-0040(4)(n) as it incorporates OAR 584-020-0010(1) 19 20 (Recognize the worth and dignity of all persons and respect for each individual), OAR 21 584-020-0010(5) (Use professional judgment), OAR 584-020-0025(2)(e) (Using district 22 lawful and reasonable rules and regulations); OAR 584-020-0040(4)(0) as it 23 incorporates OAR 584-020-0035(1)(b) (Refrain from exploiting professional 24 relationships with any student for personal gain, or in support of persons or issues), OAR 25 584-020-0035(1)(c)(A) (Not demonstrating or expressing professionally inappropriate 26 interest in a student's personal life), and OAR 584-020-0035(1)(c)(D) (Honoring 27 appropriate adult boundaries with students in conduct and conversations at all times). 28 29 The Commission's authority to impose discipline in this matter is based upon 30 ORS 342.175. 31 ORDER 32 The Commission adopts and incorporates herein the above findings of fact and 33 conclusions of law, and based thereon, imposes a suspension of Freysinger's Oregon 34 educator license for a period of thirty (30) days starting June 21, 2023. Additionally,

the commission imposes a term of Probation for not less than two (2) years.
