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RHNA Program Overview

- HB 5006 directed DLCD and OHCS to study and make recommendations incorporating a regional housing needs analysis into the Oregon Land Use Planning program
 - Goal: Prepare legislative recommendations that achieve more <u>affordable</u>, <u>fair, and equitable housing outcomes</u>
- Affects Housing & Land Use implementation (Statewide Planning Goal 10) and potentially other areas of state housing policy

Engagement Principles:

- Reach and consider broad range of perspectives
- Center racial equity and affordable, fair, and equitable housing outcomes
- Transparent communication
- Inclusive and audience-appropriate messaging
- Build on and improve engagement throughout implementation

Overview of Feedback

- Including the Working Groups, regional forums, specialized focus groups, 1-on-1 interviews, surveys, and tribal consultations, DLCD has held over 50 meetings and engaged hundreds of people in housing policy conversations related to the RHNA program
- Three major themes:
 - Accountability in taking action to address housing needs
 - Partnership at the local, regional, and state levels
 - **Investment** is necessary to make meaningful progress towards meeting the state's housing production goals

Overview of RHNA ARB Proposal

- DLCD POP 204 \$3,574,433
 - \$2.5 million in technical assistance to local governments
 - To continue support of local housing planning and production efforts
 - \$1,074,433 to support rulemaking and standing up RHNA program
 - Includes advisory committee facilitation, research and analysis, reimbursements for community-based organization participation, and agency staff capacity
 - Ongoing investment in the RHNA program will be necessary to support implementation

Resource Allocation

- Stakeholders routinely commented on the lack of financial resources available to adequately address the housing needs of their communities.
- Technical assistance, capacity building and support, investment in infrastructure, and regulatory relief are primary tenants of the RHNA program recommendations.
- Investment to involve and collaborate with communities of color, people of state and federal protected classes, and other marginalized communities is necessary to implement the RHNA in both the short- and long-term

Data Analysis

- Current system does poor job of measuring progress and evaluating outcomes.
- RHNA program would establish "equitable housing report card" which considers:
 - Total unit production
 - Affordable unit production
 - Fair and equitable housing outcomes

Accountability to Community Partners

- Project Team members have collected notes, suggestions, feedback, and requests for follow up during each of the engagement activities
- Comments and suggestions from these meetings directly inform the agency's final legislative recommendations or are included in the project's "Conditions for Success"
- Draft recommendations are to be published in August 2022 after which time, DLCD will host a series of listening sessions with stakeholders to ensure they feel as though their suggestions have been included and/or addressed

Evaluation

- What worked well:
 - Coordination with organizations that center communities of color, federal/state protected classes and other marginalized communities in their work
 - Virtual meetings
 - Focus group discussions
 - Clear and transparent intention towards state and local partnership
- The engagement process has been critical to the formation of the recommendations and have resulted in a legislative concept that better addresses the program goal of achieving more affordable, fair, and equitable housing outcomes.
