ENSURING PRESERVATION OF KNOWLEDGE



Partnered with Washington State Library and Oregon Heritage Commission to create Northwest Digital Heritage (northwestdigitalheritage.org), a place for libraries, museums, and cultural heritage organizations to share their local history collections.



Gave grants to libraries to digitize 18 historic Oregon newspapers through a partnership with the University of Oregon Libraries' Oregon Digital Newspaper Program (oregonnews.uoregon.edu).
