UPDATES FROM THE OREGON DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

1. MEET OUR NEW TITLE III ENGLISH / MULTILINGUAL LEARNER EDUCATION SPECIALIST: TIFFANY PALANIUK



Tiffany Palaniuk (she/her) is passionate about understanding the needs of historically underserved students and advocating for multilingual communities. She was attracted to the role of Title III English/Multilingual Learner Specialist because of her interest in expanding districts' capacity to address the needs of historically underserved students and families. She brings 14 years of both domestic and international experience in education. She has worked as an English Language Fellow in Central America, an Instructional Facilitator in South America, an English Language Development teacher in the Eugene area. Most recently, she coordinated professional development programs designed to strengthen educators' abilities to more fully understand and meet the needs of multilingual students and families in the College of Education at

Oregon State University. For several years, Tiffany lived in Ecuador, where she developed a love for the Andes mountains and the Amazon jungle region. In her personal time, she enjoys spending time with family and her dog, practicing yoga, reading, and traveling.

Tiffany obtained her undergraduate degree in Psychology from Oregon State University and her master's degree from Pacific University in Secondary Education.

2. MEP: COMPREHENSIVE NEEDS ASSESSMENT - UPDATE

The Needs Analysis Committee (NAC) is continuing their hard work! The Oregon Department of Education leaders and RTI International met in two sessions on September 21 with the committee. The first session had 17 participants which included members of OMESC, data specialists, pre-K specialists, and graduation specialists. The second session had 7 participants which included families, OSU, OHA, Region Coordinators, and ODE staff. The members reviewed a proposed data collection plan and provided feedback on gaps they observed and supplemental data sources that could make the plan more robust. Next, they reviewed the family and student focus group questions and shared feedback on edits to improve the questions. The next steps are to continue collecting data over the next few months, incorporating the feedback from the NAC. ODE will continue to convene student and family focus groups and surveys from a variety of regions of the state, including at the State Migrant Education Conference. The next NAC meeting will be in October where the NAC will review preliminary data from families, students, and staff.

3. NEW RESOURCE: ENGLISH LEARNERS AND STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES IN RURAL PUBLIC SCHOOLS

In fall 2019, ELs made up 4% of total public school district enrollment in rural areas compared with 7% of enrollment in towns, 10% of enrollment in suburban areas, and 15% of enrollment in cities. In the same year, students with disabilities made up 15% of total public school district enrollment in rural areas and towns and 14% of enrollment in suburban areas and cities. This resource provides information on EL and students with disabilities enrollment in public schools of various sizes in rural, urban, and suburban locales.
