## Summary of 2010-11 Cohort Graduation Rates Four-year Cohort (2007-08 to 2010-11) Revised<sup>1</sup>

The four-year cohort graduation rate follows students from the fall of their 9th grade year to the end of their fourth year in high school in order to determine the percent of students graduating with a regular diploma within four years. Oregon began using the four-year cohort graduation rate for accountability reporting in 2008-09. Previous to 2008-09, the NCES graduation rate was used, which was based on the number of graduates with a regular diploma in a given year regardless how long the student had been in school.

This year's four-year cohort is made up of the students who first entered high school in 2007-08. The original set of students who enter 9th grade for the first time in 2007-08 is adjusted for students who transferred into the Oregon public school system, transferred out to public or home school, left the state or country, or deceased.

The cohort graduation rate is calculated by taking the number of students in the adjusted cohort who graduated with a regular diploma within four years and dividing that by the total number of students in the cohort. ## Summary of 2010-11 Cohort Graduation Rates Five-year Cohort (2006-07 to 2010-11) Revised<sup>1</sup>

The five-year cohort graduation rates reported January 2012 reflect students receiving a regular diploma within five years of entering high school. This cohort was reported last year as the 2009-10 four-year cohort and then tracked for an additional year in order to determine the *five-year* graduation rate reported this year. Oregon began using the five-year cohort graduation rate in 2008-09 for accountability reporting. Previous to 2008-09, the NCES graduation rate was used, which was based on the number of graduates with a regular diploma in a given year regardless how long the student had been in school.

This year's five-year cohort is made up of the students who first entered high school in 2006-07. The original set of students who enter 9th grade for the first time in 2006-07 is adjusted for students who transfer into the Oregon public school system, transfer out to public or home school, leave the state or country, or are deceased. The cohort graduation rate is calculated by taking the number of students in the adjusted cohort who graduated with a regular diploma within five years and dividing that by the total number of students in the cohort.
