For the first time ever, Green Our Planet is providing grants to schools to fund 80% of Green Our Planet's Hydroponics Program and 71% of our outdoor GardenConnect STEM Program!

The Green Our Planet Hydroponics Grant will cover \$8,000 of the \$10,000 cost of the Hydroponics STEM Program, with schools covering the \$2,000 balance. The Green Our Planet GardenConnect Grant will cover \$2000 of the \$3500 cost of our GardenConnect Program. The priority deadline of June 24th has already passed, but we will keep the grant open on a rolling basis for your schools.

As you may know, Green Our Planet already runs the largest school garden and school hydroponics programs in the nation. Our STEM garden programs are powerful hands-on learning tools that help teachers engage their students in STEM, conservation, nutrition, entrepreneurship and more, all while providing their communities with a source of fresh healthy produce. 91% of teachers using our program highly recommend it to their colleagues. Our school garden and school hydroponics programs are the only STEMworks accredited school garden programs in the United States.

CNP Grant Updates

Education Grant Open Now!

We are pleased to announce that the Oregon Department of Education Child Nutrition Programs is finally able to release the Oregon Department of Education Farm to Child Nutrition Programs **Competitive Education Grant!**

- We have \$3 million dollars allocated for this education grant.
- There will again be two tracks: A mini grant with a simplified application for the range of \$2,000-\$10,000 for smaller or starter projects and a full grant for the range of \$10,001-\$100,000 with the standard, in-depth application.
- This is a COMPETITIVE grant. There's no guarantee that you will receive an award, even if you've received one in the past. This grant has historically been so competitive that many applications were scored very high and were outstanding applications, but still weren't awarded due to the amount or level of competition.
- Normally we get this grant out in the beginning of the biennium. That
 was not possible this time due to unforeseen circumstances. This
 means the potential awardee will have to spend the funds for the
 upcoming school year, from when they are awarded the grant to
 June 30, 2023. We cannot approve any extensions.
- Questions about the grant are due by August 5, 2022.
- Applications are due by 5PM, Friday, August 12, 2022.

Competitive Reimbursement Grant Open Now!

Round 3 of the Competitive Reimbursement Grant is now open. Applicants must have been awarded a Farm to CNP Non-Competitive Reimbursement Grant and have a \$0 balance of Non-Competitive funds.

The timeline for Round three of the Competitive Reimbursement Grant is as follows:

- Questions/Requests for Clarification are due September 1, 2022 by
 10AM
- Applications are due September 8, 2022 by 2PM.

There will be a total of six rounds of the Competitive Reimbursement Grant through the end of the biennium.

SY 2022-2023 FFVP Applications Now Open!

Applications for FFVP SY 2022-2023 can be found on the **FFVP webpage**. These funds will cover any FFVP costs your participating schools incur between October 1, 2022 and September 30, 2023.

If you currently have a school that participated in SY 2021-2022 and it is still over 50% free and reduced, no action is necessary for those particular schools as they will automatically be re-enrolled.

Some helpful points to remember if you are interested in applying for the FFVP grant:

- The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) administers the FFVP at the Federal level.
- The Oregon Department of Education (ODE) administers the FFVP at the State level.
- FFVP sub-grants are awarded to schools, not school districts.
- Only elementary schools (defined as K-8) are eligible.
- Awards are granted to those schools representing the highest percentage of students certified for free & reduced price benefits.
- Only schools participating in the NSLP are eligible.

We will be accepting applications for SY 2022-2023 until **September 1, 2022**.

Applications will be reviewed and turned around quickly after this date. An application does not guarantee an award, as we will prioritize schools with the highest need based on F&R%. If you would like a list of free and reduced percentages for schools in your district that are not currently enrolled in the FFVP please let me know.

From the Umpqua Valley Farm to School Newsletter: "UVF2S is so thrilled to announce that we are gearing up for our second year of the DC Produce Project, a summer produce box program that is generously funded by a grant from The Whipple Foundation Fund through Oregon Community Foundation.

We have expanded this year and are partnering with Feeding Umpqua to deliver produce to rural communities that may be considered food deserts. These communities include: Yoncalla, Elkton, Scottsburg and Drain.

Ninety produce boxes each week for 4 weeks will come from Lehne Farm and Valadez Organic Produce with special extras from other local farms. They'll be delivered and distributed through summer camp busing and at local stores and healthcare clinics. Bethany Durbin, a Douglas ESD nurse, helped create this project and will once again partner on it. We are excited to be doubling our reach this year!"

Civil Rights and Complaints Process

In accordance with Federal civil rights law and U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) civil rights regulations and policies, the USDA, its Agencies, offices, and employees, and institutions participating in or administering USDA programs are prohibited from discriminating based on race, color, national origin, sex, disability, age, or reprisal or retaliation for prior civil rights activity in any program or activity conducted or funded by USDA.

Persons with disabilities who require alternative means of communication for program information (e.g. Braille, large print, audiotape, American Sign Language, etc.), should contact the Agency (State or local) where they applied for benefits. Individuals who are deaf, hard of hearing or have speech disabilities may contact USDA through the Federal Relay Service at (800) 877-8339. Additionally, program information may be made available in languages other than English.
