

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Early Childhood Education

The Early Childhood Education (ECE)
Program is a bilingual program that
teaches early literacy skills and builds
kindergarten readiness among Latinx
immigrant children from prenatal to
preschool-aged in Washington County.

Activities include:

- 11 Early Childhood Education classrooms:
 - 5 Preschool Promise classrooms
 - 4 Early Head Start/OPK P-3 classrooms
 - 2 Teen Parent Childcare classroom
 - Parenting Together Time
 - Family Engagement events



History

The ECE Program officially began in 2003 as a response to the immediate needs and benefit of our first program, Adult Education. We were founded with the launch of the Adult Education program in 2002 which offered childcare for many of our participants. The biggest barrier for many of our participants to pursue and/or finish their education was the access and affordability to childcare. The majority of our participants were English Language Learners and immigrants, providing a safe and nurturing environment for their families, particularly their bilingual children was essential.

In 2003, with the support from Early Headstart funds, Adelante Mujeres opened its first early childhood and preschool classrooms. Not only is Adelante Mujeres implementing culturally-appropriate literacy and kindergarten readiness programming, but it is also addressing the lack of culturally-appropriate teachers of color in Oregon by hiring past participants as educators (e.g., Preschool Teachers, Assistant Instructors).

IMPACT #1

100% Of preschool students successfully transitioned and graduated by meeting or exceeding the developmental areas needed for kindergarten readiness.





IMPACT #2

95% Of participants reported improvement in their own parenting skills, knowledge and behavior after completing the Parenting series.

IMPACT #3

10 parents/caregivers participated in Early Childhood Education advocacy at the state level (e.g., personal testimony and/or serving in an Early Learning Committee).











PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Chicas Youth Development Program

The Chicas Youth Development
Program (Chicas) is an innovative
after-school program for Latine
girls and women in grades 3-12
and college that works throughout
Washington County, OR.

Chicas incorporates academic support, leadership development, family partnerships, positive changes in cultural and gender identity, health education, and overall well-being.







History

The Chicas Program began in 2008 in response to Latine, immigrant mothers who expressed the need for a safe space to support the social, emotional, and academic development of their daughters in order to reduce teen pregnancy, high school drop-out, substance use, and domestic violence.

Chicas began in 3 schools, serving 55 students in Forest Grove, and we now serve over 700 Latine youth in grades 3-12 at 29 schools (30 sites) and 10 universities throughout Oregon.



98% of graduated 12th graders, Chicas participants, were enrolled in post-secondary education.


IMPACT #3
