# Treatment location (150-word limit)

1001 Strawberry is a 16.2 acre site with a private home built in 2018. Elevations range from 2,320 to 2,620 feet on steep west, north, and east slopes. Vegetation consists of a dense stand of Pacific Madrone, Black Oak, White Oak, Manzanita, and poison oak. It is zoned WR, there is no indication of timber harvest or prior forest management activity. The parcel is adjacent to the City of Ashland boarder, specifically Westwood Park and a wildlife dense forested area for animal migration; mainly deer, bears, and turkeys. Perhaps additional animal visitors in the night that I remain politely unaware of their existence. Approximately 2 acres have been improved for the private residence and garden area. The remaining 14 acres contain many fallen trees, low scrubs, and poison oak. The steepness of the terrane makes it difficult for the home owner to trim and clear.

# Description of Treatment Activities (350-word limit)

Goals of this project:

- To reduce and mitigate wildfire threats to community and landowners
- To protect water quality and supply in the Ashland Municipal Watershed, and
- To improve and protect quality wildlife habitat for threatened at-risk species in the area.

To achieve these goals the property requires thinning, pruning, and prescribed fire and woody biomass removal to reduce forest floor fuels. The selected contractor will need to haul out appropriate materials or provide for a safe burn pile method of fuel management. Simply stated, the activities will be to trim low-lying limbs, gather and remove biomass fuels (old branches, tree limbs, dead wood) as to protect the heathy trees and diminish the risk of fire expanding beyond the forest floor.

**Description of the anticipated benefit** (250-word limit) : As this property boarders the City of Ashland communities of Westwood and Strawberry developments it represents a very sound fuel break between Wrights Creek forested areas and private residences. This property should be seen as a means to expand the fuel break properties surrounding Ashland city limits. This 16 acre site directly touch 5 houses (inclusive of mine) and connects to Westwood Park a City of Ashland Park within a housing community of over 50 homes.

### Timeline

- February 2022 April 2022: Identify contractor and award the work.
- April September 2022: Work is performed
- Work is completed in preparation for the 2022/2023 burn season.

# Budget (150-word limit)

Based on the publicly available Strawberry Hald Park Property project between Ashland Parks and Rec and Lomakatsi Restoration \$1,156 per acre was the budgeted cost in 2019. With inflation, steepness of land and limited contractor resources I believe a budget amount of \$1,400 per acre would be reasonable. Funds would only be used to cover costs, so \$1,400 times 14 acres is \$19,600. Minus in-kind leverage of \$5,100 (25%). Total Ask of \$14,500.

I do not foresee any additional agencies to be involved as this is private land.

Total Project Grant Cost: \$14,500






