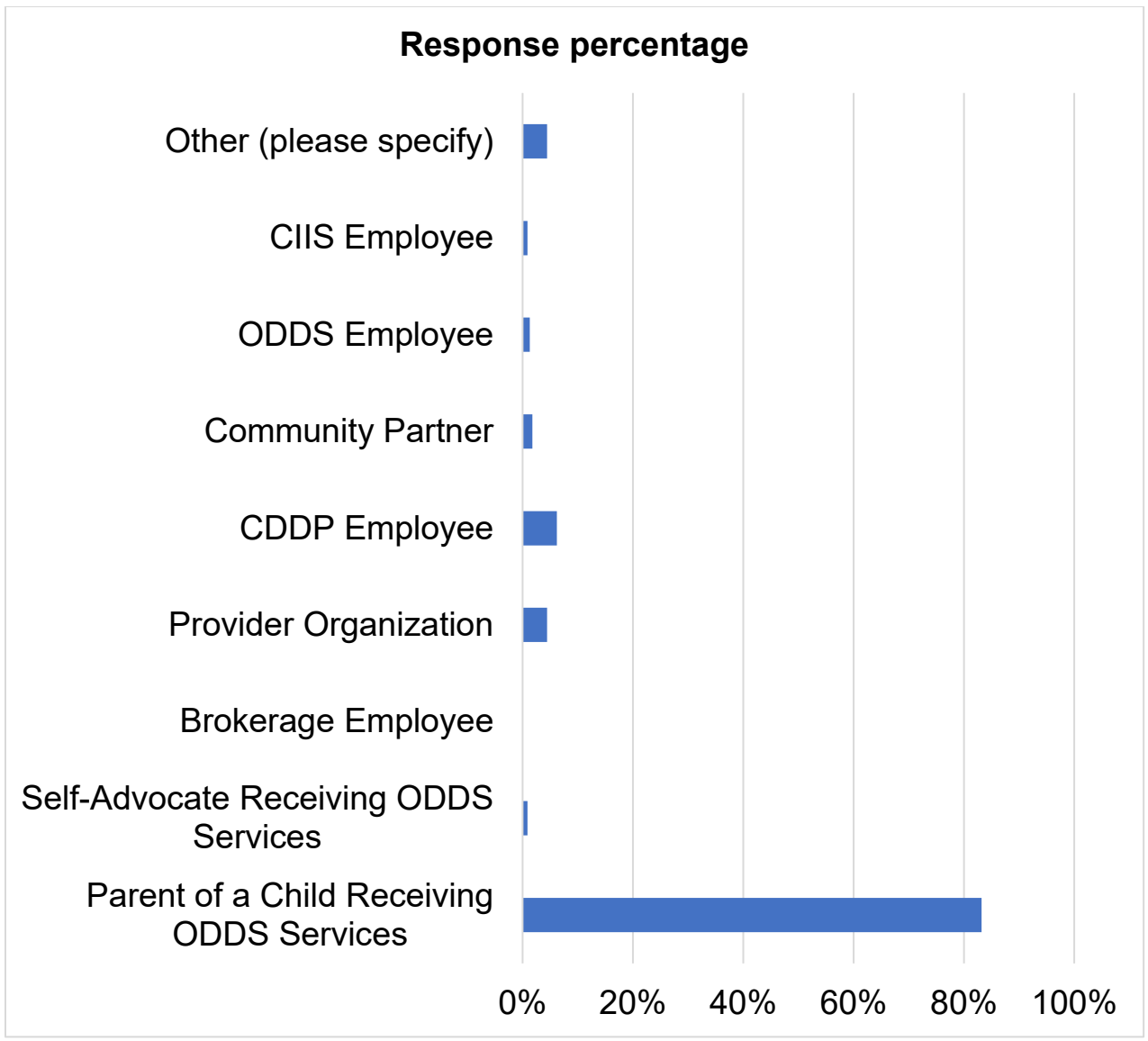




**Paid Parent Attendant Care Waiver Feedback Survey results

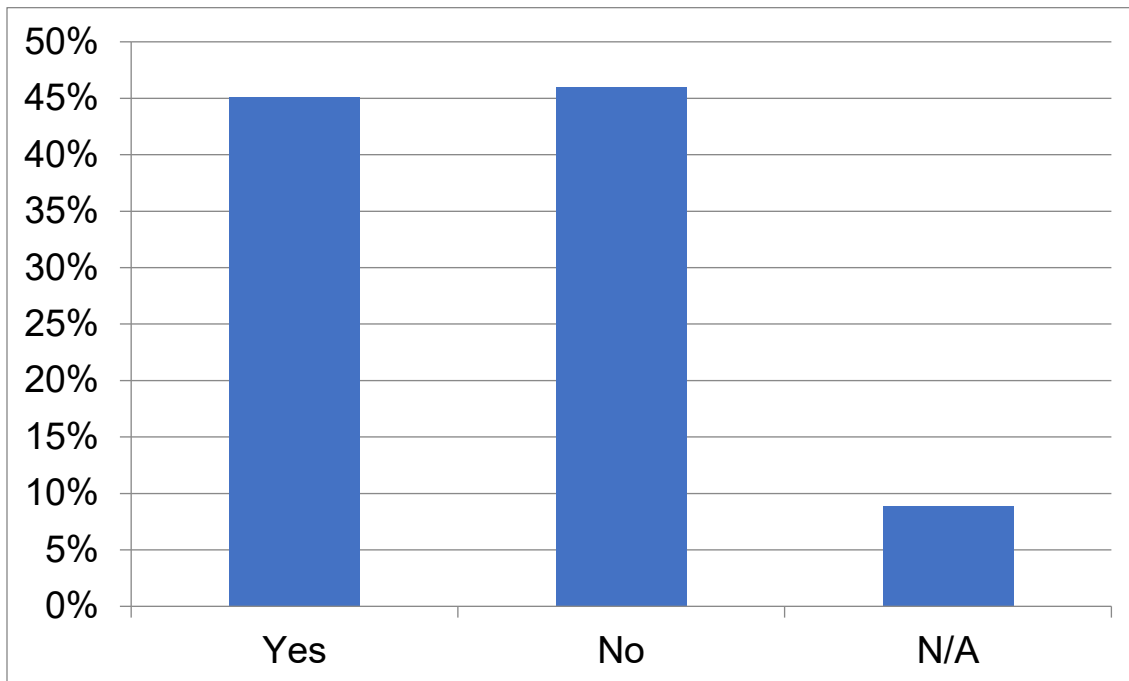
Question 1: Which best describes your role in taking this survey?

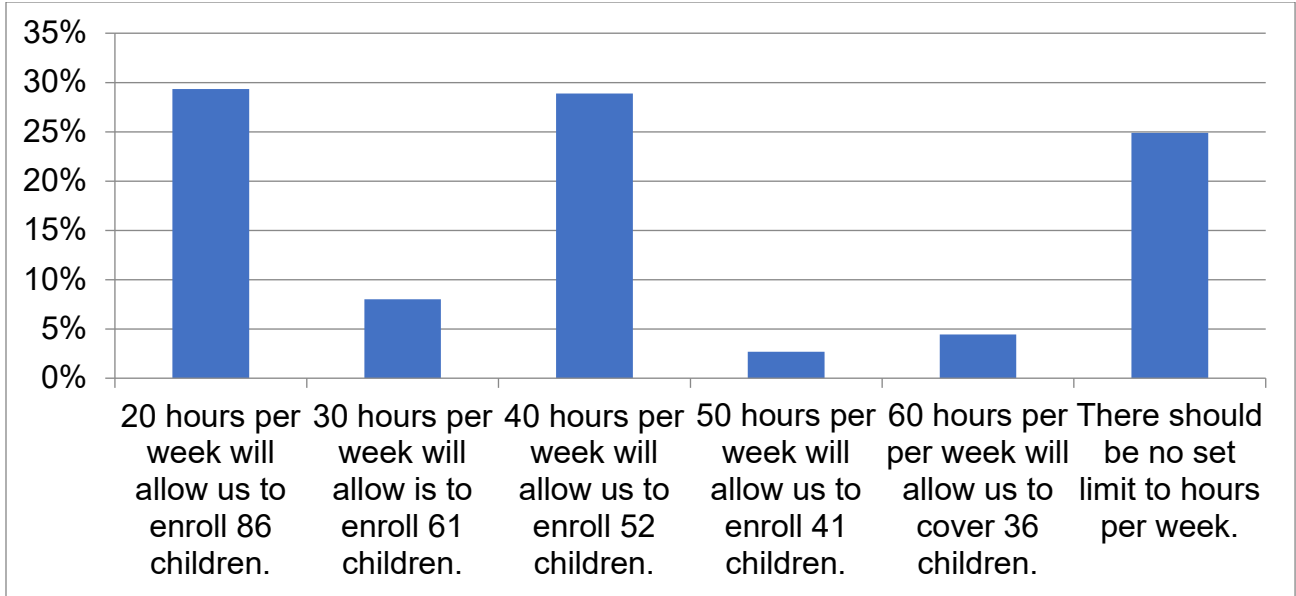
Question 2: I was paid to provide attendant care to my own minor child during the Public Health Emergency (PHE)/Covid.

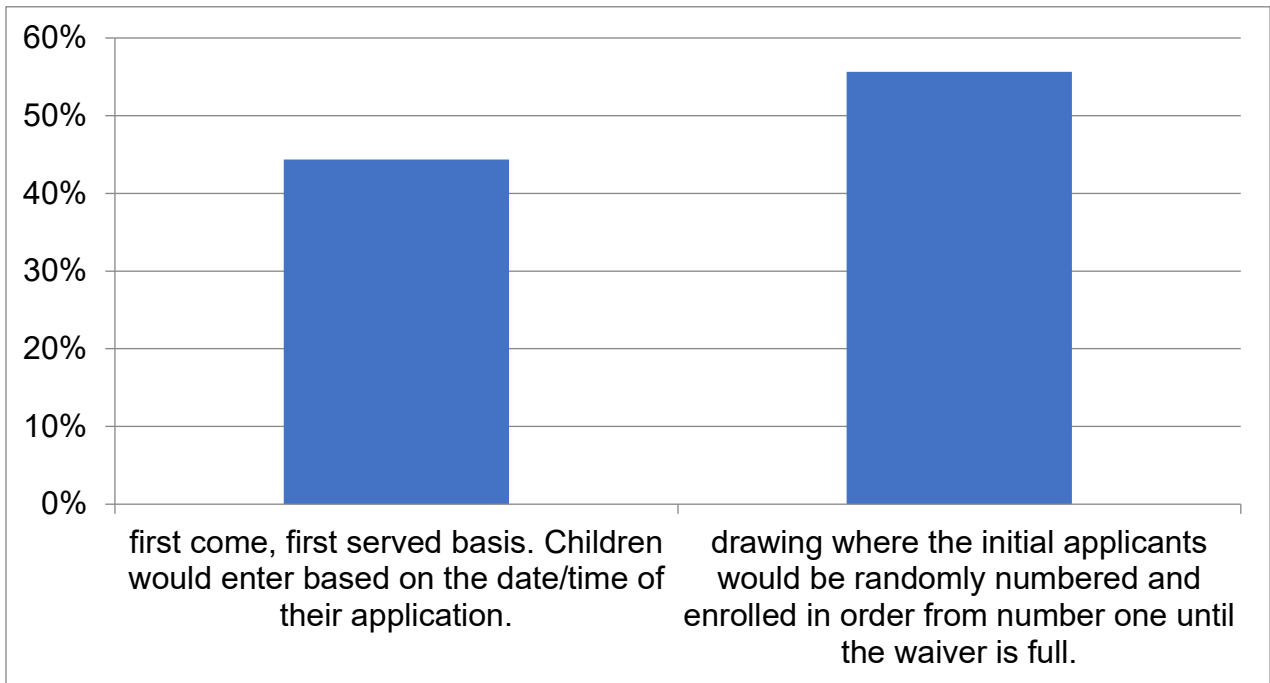

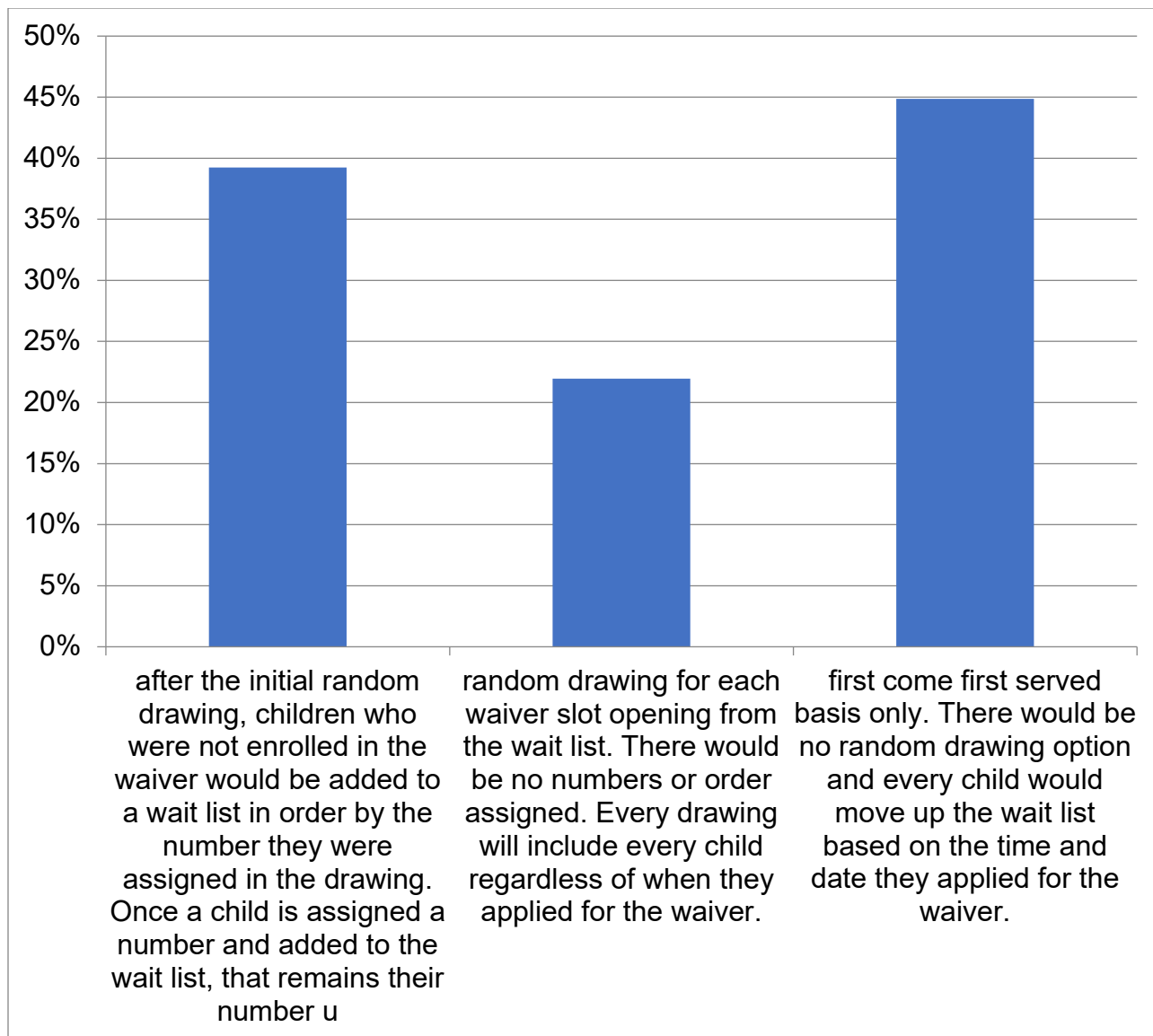
Question 4: For initial entrance into the paid parent attendant care waiver, children should be enrolled on a

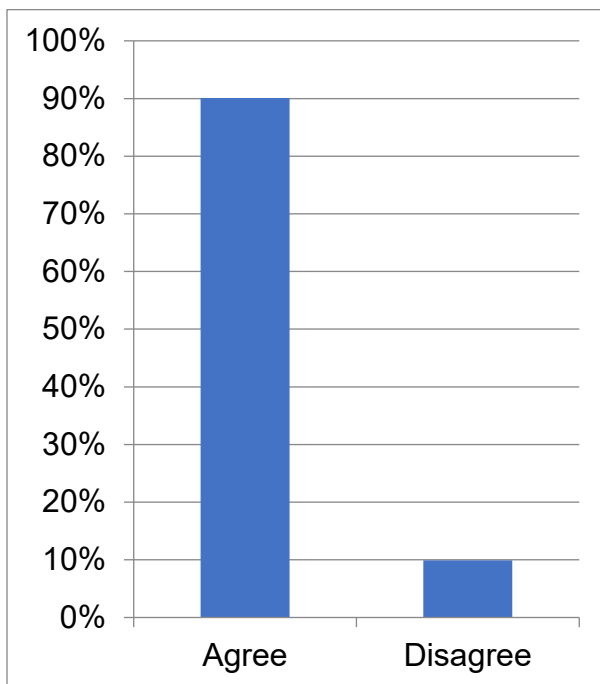

| <p>after the initial random drawing, children who were not enrolled in the waiver would be added to a wait list in order by the number they were assigned in the drawing. Once a child is assigned a number and added to the wait list, that remains their number until they are enrolled. Children who apply later will be assigned the number at the end of the wait list and that number will not change until they are enrolled in the waiver.</p> | 39.25% | 85 |
| <p>random drawing for each waiver slot opening from the wait list. There would be no numbers or order assigned. Every drawing will include every child regardless of when they applied for the waiver.</p> | 21.96% | 47 |
| <p>first come first served basis only. There would be no random drawing option and every child would move up the wait list based on the time and date they applied for the waiver.</p> | 44.86% | 96 |

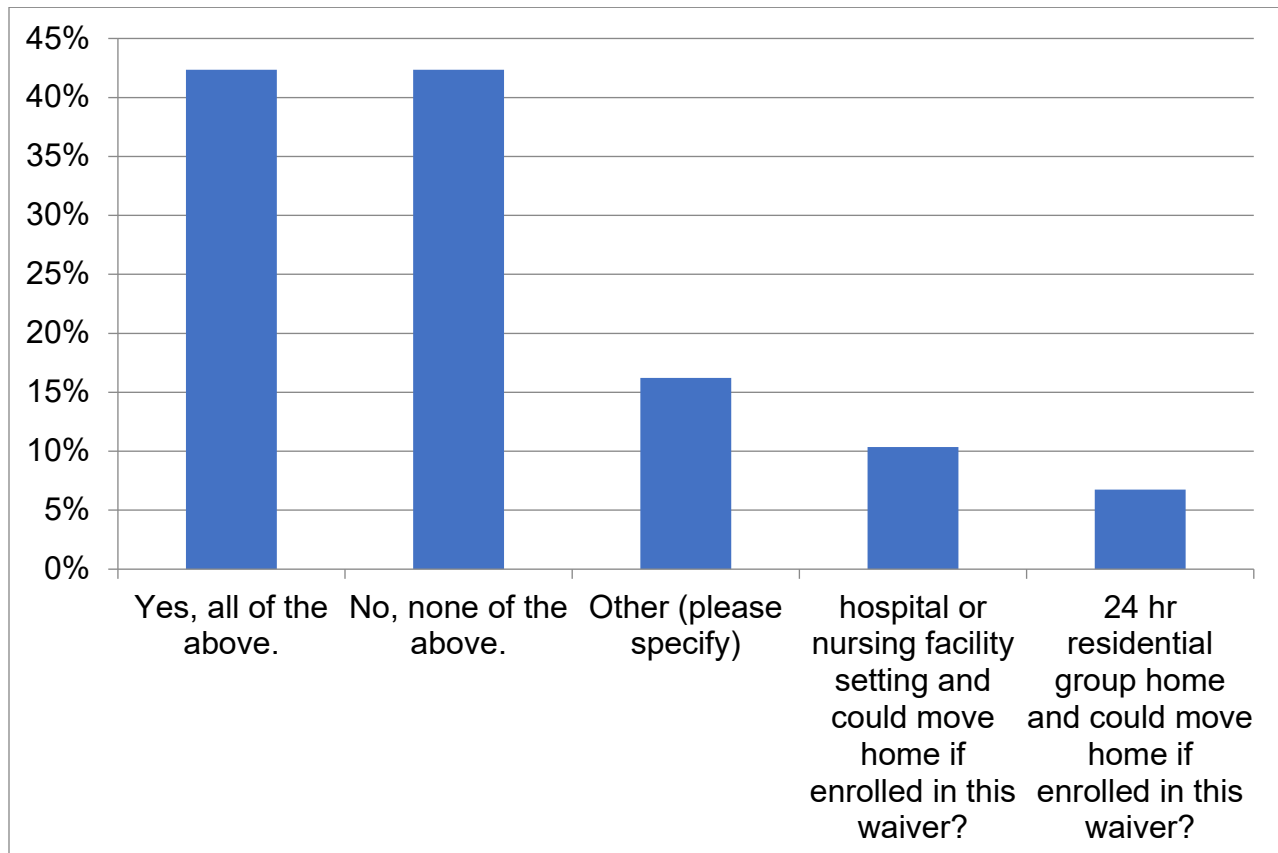

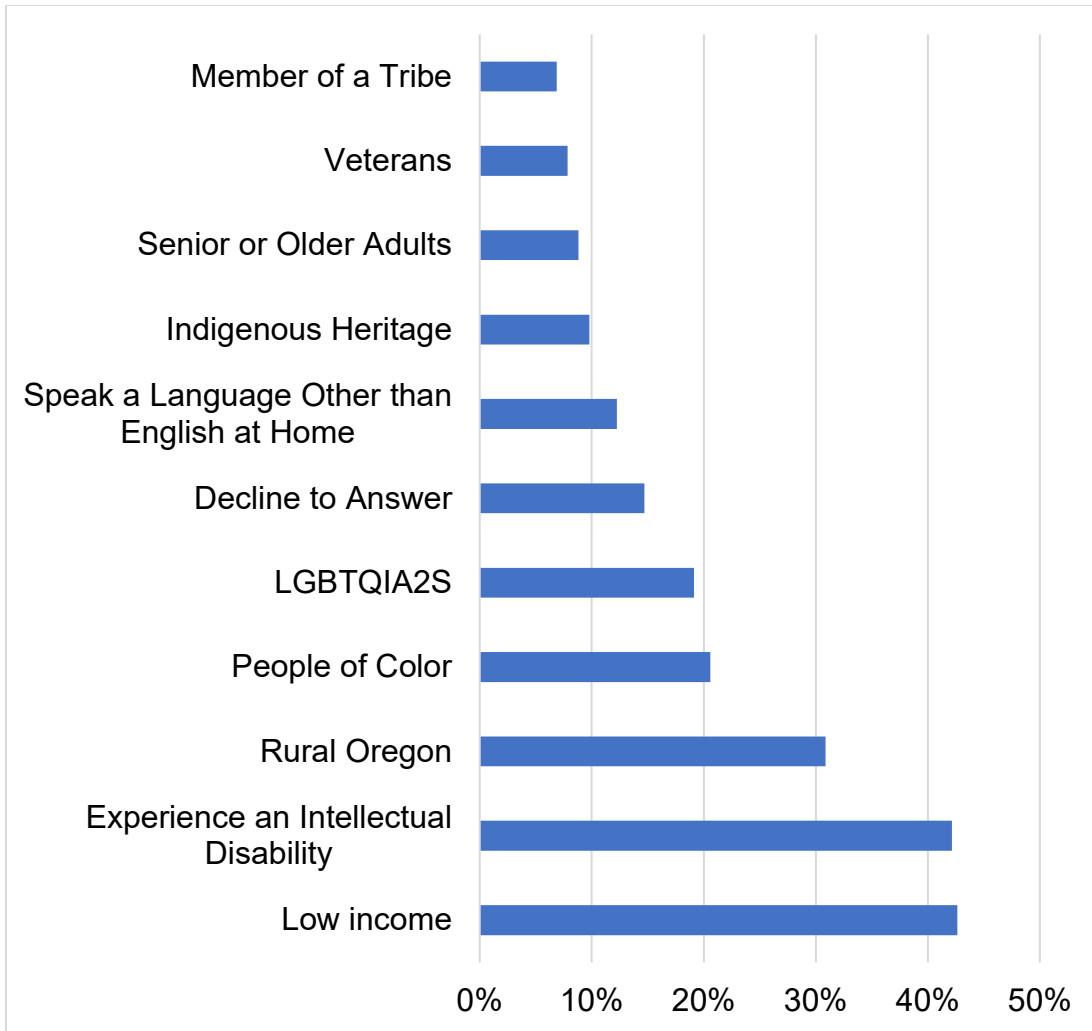
