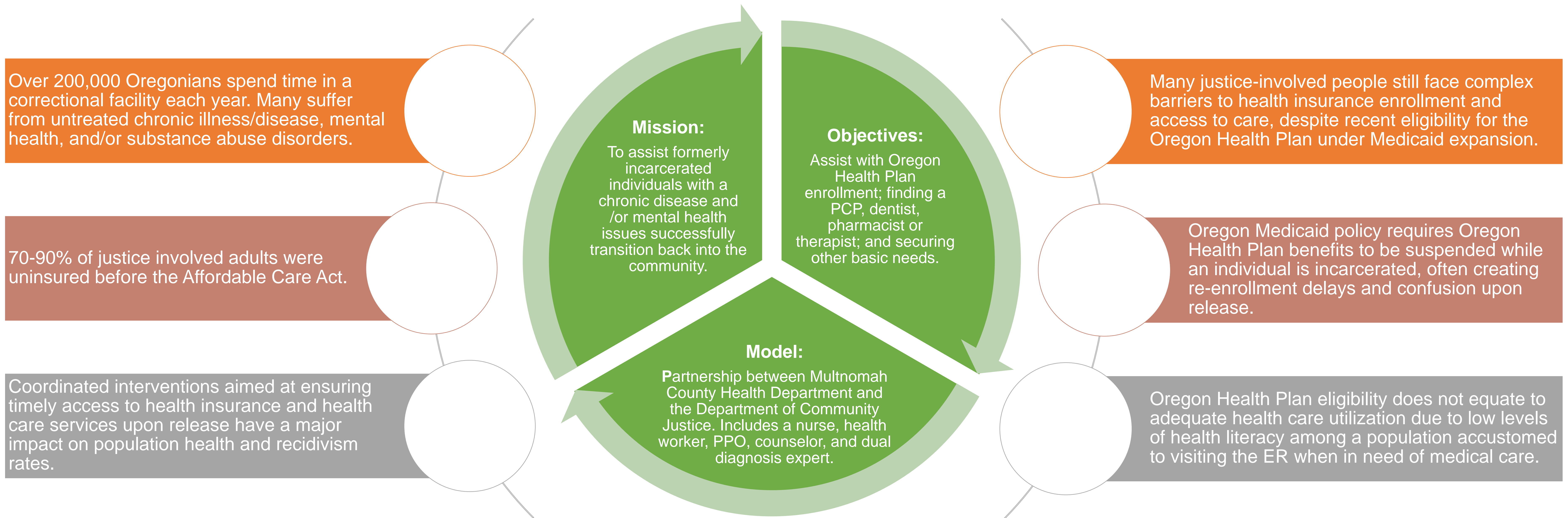


Coordinated Intervention: Health Assessment and Treatment (HAT) Team



Outcomes since August 2014:

- 200+ individuals enrolled in the Oregon Health Plan
- 500 individual drug and alcohol evaluations
- 44 individual referrals to Primary Care, including initial and secondary appointments
- Clients in the intervention are more likely to show up for their medical appointments, pick-up prescriptions, and use their medications correctly
- Reduction in jail bed usage

Recommendations & Lessons Learned:

- Coordinated efforts between correctional facilities and CCOs provide effective transition supports.
- The justice system, CCOs, policy makers and funders need to address gaps in access to health insurance and health care for individuals upon release.
- There are numerous opportunities for health related interventions across the justice continuum, such as police and parole interventions and diversion courts.
- CCOs should consider Innovative models – e.g., Community Health Workers – which provide effective outreach and health system navigation support services.
- Collect, analyze, and disseminate critical data, including incarceration history, health care utilization and metrics.
- Cultural competency training for CCO staff, specific to the needs of justice-involved individuals.

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
