Clatsop	 Adopt a tobacco retail license for the county inclusive of all municipalities, including minimum price and location provisions. Pass policy to remove exemptions to the Indoor Clean Air Act and strengthen clean indoor air policies, including protecting the public from cannabis smoke and vapors.
Crook Funded partners: Deschutes County & Jefferson County	 Adopt tobacco retail licensing policy in each county through special focus on developing capacity for community mobilization and advocacy. Adopt additional tobacco retail policies, such as a restriction on flavored tobacco products. Adopt policies to remove exemptions to the Indoor Clean Air Act, including protecting the public from cannabis smoke and vapors, through special focus on developing capacity for community mobilization and advocacy.
Hood River	 Adopt a tobacco, aerosol, vape, and smoke free ordinance for all businesses in the city of Hood River, and/or Cascade Locks, and/or the unincorporated areas of Hood River County.
Klamath	 Expand tobacco retail licensing in the four incorporated cities in the county that do not already have a tobacco retail licensure ordinance. Amend the tobacco retail licensure ordinance to include a restriction on proximity of tobacco outlets near places where children frequent or require a minimum distance between tobacco retail outlets.

Linn Funded Partner: Linn Benton Health Equity Alliance	 Adopt a tobacco retail license for the county inclusive of all municipalities. Adopt additional tobacco retail policy: restriction on proximity of tobacco outlets near places were children frequent. Adopt additional tobacco retail policy: limiting the distance between retailors to break up density to advance health equity by countering tobacco industry's point of sale tactics disproportionately affecting underserved communities.
Multnomah Funded partner: Oregon Health Equity Alliance	 Adopt additional tobacco retail policy: restriction on flavored tobacco products. Adopt additional tobacco retail policy: restriction on proximity of tobacco outlets near places were children frequent.
Umatilla	 Adopt and implement a countywide tobacco retail licensing ordinance. Adopt additional tobacco retail policy: restriction on proximity of tobacco outlets near places were children frequent.
