

Oregon Disaster Housing Recovery Plan

State Recovery Function (SRF) 5 Disaster Housing

Summary of Requirements

November 12, 2020



Activation Responsibilities for OHCS

- A. Ensure smooth transition from ESF 6 and 15
- B. Define short-, medium-, and long-term housing goals*
- C. Coordinate assignments for supporting agencies
- D. Provide status reports and briefings to GDC, OEM command structure
- E. Deploy capabilities (i.e. resources and expertise) where needed
- F. Support other agencies as needed
- G. Prepare a Disaster Housing Recovery Action Plan*

OREGON HOUSING and COMMUNITY SERVICES

Disaster Housing Recovery Plan Basics

- Based on the 2018 Oregon Disaster Recovery Plan
- Spells out existing data on housing impacts
- Articulates priorities for disaster housing recovery
- Includes recommendations for SRF 5 support
- Informed by Disaster Housing Task Force, comprising specific state agencies and community partners
- Inclusive of short-, medium-, and long-term activities
- Should form basis of CDBG-DR Action Plan, if funds appropriated



OREGON HOUSING and COMMUNITY SERVICES

Plan Basics, continued

- Assumes local and tribal governments are the primary decision-makers driving community recovery
- Recognizes obstacles to permanent housing for survivors, communities
 - Limitations of personal and public financial resources
 - Insurance payouts and insurability of rebuilt properties
 - Land use, permitting, building codes
 - Labor and material costs and availability
 - Uncertainties around clean-up and debris management
 - Capacity of some local and tribal governments

Activities

Short-Term, Interim Housing

- Assessment of needs beyond FEMA registrants
- Understanding the gap between "sheltering" and permanent homes
- Deploying State resources effectively

Long-Term Housing

- Prioritizing existing OHCS resources (LIFT, LIHTC)
- Support for communities' visions and priorities
- Marshaling other public and private resources



Resources

- Emergency Board Investments
 - \$10 M Wildfire Damage Housing Relief Program
 - \$30 M Project Turnkey for Wildfire Impacted Communities
 - \$10 M Shelter Resources to Community Action Agencies (funding formula will include wildfire impact)





Project Turnkey: The Concept

Providing noncongregate shelter during COVID-19 pandemic.



Leveraging funds for more permanent solutions to Oregon's housing & homeless crisis.

Legislative Action

Oregon's Emergency Board allocated \$30 million to OCF. An Advisory Committee of local, state, community stakeholders will:

- Quickly, efficiently, equitably distribute funds to eligible entities for the acquisition of properties.
- Guide criteria, priorities, accountability, due diligence, acquisition, & technical assistance while centering equity and community needs.



And More Legislative Action

This week, Oregon's Emergency Board allocated a second fund of \$35 million to OCF for grants for the balance of state.



Wildfire Request for Applications: Coming Soon

\$30 million in grant funding will support the acquisition of 9-12

facilities, totaling approximately 500 units of shelter. Up to \$5 million of

this funding can support operation of facilities.

- Eligible Regions: Fire-affected counties, including Clackamas, Douglas, Jackson, Klamath, Linn, Lane, Lincoln, and Marion, and fire-affected tribal communities.
 Seeking equitable geographic distribution.
- Eligible entities: cities, counties, housing authorities, tribal communities, nonprofit organizations, or a collaborative of those entities.

Who will be served?

Priority populations to be served, mirroring the Statewide strategic housing plan include unsheltered and high-needs populations including:

- Veterans
- People with disabilities
- Families
- Communities of Color

- LGBTQ+ community
- People with serious mental illness
- People experiencing chronic homelessness
- People vulnerable to COVID or diagnosed with COVID
- People displaced by fires

Application Process



Phase 2

 Property identification

• Due diligence

Phase 3

 Grant awards for acquisition, any necessary retrofitting & operation costs (if applicable)

Phase 1: Selection Criteria

- Operator/owner expertise and readiness
- Demonstrated community leadership support (such as commitments of operational dollars, land use compatibility statements)
- Defined partnerships with culturally-specific organizations for supportive services
- Coordination with local Continuum of Care/Community Action Agency, Housing Authority, Public Health teams
- Demonstrated utilization of equity practices
- Provision of housing navigators and pathways out of shelter to address barriers
- Strong operational plan including local contributions for acquisition or operation (if applicable)

Timeline


- RFA released within the week
- Applications reviewed and properties identified by end of November
- Facilities acquired and operational: within 30-75 days

Disability Emergency Management Advisory Council (DEMAC)

- History of the Disability Emergency Management Advisory Council (DEMAC)
 - **Collaboration:** OHA, DHS, OEM, Disability Organizations and Advocates
- Purpose of the Council
 - \square Advise
 - Access and Functional Needs in all aspects before, during and after disasters
 - EFS-6 and EFS-8
 - Statewide networking: with the disability community to ensure support for county emergency managers

504 Compliance: Disaster Assistance and Recovery Programs

- FEMA's delivery of assistance to survivors needs to consistently address the disasterrelated needs of survivors with disabilities such as appropriate accommodations/modifications.
- FEMA's temporary housing programs needs to consistently provide people with disabilities appropriate accommodations/modifications.
- FEMA must consistently integrate the needs and perspectives of people with disabilities in community-related recovery programs.



Accessible Housing

- Accessible Housing Refers to the construction or modification of housing to enable independent living for persons with disabilities.
- Home Modification Refers to alterations made to a home in order to make it more accessible for people with various physical and/or sensory disabilities, including older adults
 - Physical structure
 - Less extensive changes





Accessible Direct Housing Options:

- Manufactured Housing Units (MHU) built in compliance with the Uniform Federal Accessibility Standard (UFAS)
- **MHU** modified to include disability access
- Recreational Vehicle (RV) modified to include disability access
- Multi Family Lease Repair (MLR) Rehab/modify units to be compliant with the Federal Accessibility Standards





Disability Access: Structural Considerations

- Space to accommodate ramps & parking for accessible vehicles
- Ramps vs. Platform steps
- Landing areas with adequate space
- Entry ways
- Reinforcement of floors






Disability Access Considerations

Bathrooms/ Showers

- Tub, roll-in shower, walk-in (transfer) shower
- Tub seat
- Hand-held shower nozzle
- Grab bars
- Raised toilet seat





Disability Access: Modifications/Features

- Flooring: smooth/slip resistant
- Pipe protection & sharp edges
- Countertop height
- Single-lever faucet controls
- Lever-type door handles





Disability Access: Site Considerations

- Accessible Transportation
- Path of Travel
 - Parking
 - Sidewalks/curb cuts
- Common Areas
 - □ Laundry
 - □ Storage
 - Play areas






Other Considerations Across Housing Types





- Hearing disabilities
 - Visual alarms/notification devices
- Vision disabilities
 - Tonal door open alarms
 - Braille kit for washer and dryer or other appliances
 - Tactile warning surfaces
- Other considerations
 - Lighting
 - Live in Personal Care Attendants
 - Equipment storage

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
