# **Current Events**

- 8 Shelter Liaisons are currently operational in the affected counties.
- 3 Data Specialists are currently operational for Jackson, Marion, Lincoln and Lane Counties and working with the SSELs and MASTT Leads.
- The RFP has been released. A program brief for interested programs is scheduled for today at 1200 on a Teams call.
- RFA for CBO funding has been released to support in parallel with disaster case management for wildfire survivor wrap-around services. Three Information sessions were conducted to weeks ago to assist in this process. However, we have not seen any new applications for this program come forward since.
- We have received the Social Services Landscape assessment from HHS and FEMA 10 pertaining to the wildfires. We are currently going over that data to refine the recovery plan.
- We have given access to 19 case mangers throughout the state to initiate data input of past, current and future work with survivor families.
- 3 surge DCMs initiated training this week in Jackson County and are currently getting established.
- Interviews for the remaining 8 surge DCMs have been conducted and are currently in process of hiring.









# Multi-agency Shelter Transition

- Connecting people with programs and resources
- As of today, we have completed approximately
  - 226 initial MASTT interviews in Jackson County, with an unidentified number remaining
  - 209 initial MASTT interviews in Marion and Linn Counties, with approximately 80 remaining
  - 97 initial MASTT interviews in Lincoln with approximately 3 remaining
  - 86 initial interviews in Lane County, with approximately 28 remaining
  - 14 Total Interviews in Douglas County (Complete)

Please note, these numbers reflect interviews of households, not individuals.

#### Agencies and organizations engaged

Jackson: AllCare Health; Jackson County Mental Health; OSU Extension; ODHS; FEMA; Red Cross; Legal Services, ACCESS, Faith Community, Columbia Care, Options, Rogue Valley Council of Governments, Jackson Care Connect

**Marion:** ODHS SSEL & SSP; Red Cross; Marion County; Santiam Integration Team; Arches; HUD

Lane: ODHS, HUD, FEMA, Lane Co Health and Human Services, Senior and People with Disabilities and Workforce Lane. In addition, we've been having advocates attend from agencies such as ShelterCare and the hospital.

- Lack of accessible housing: 285

#### 3. Medical

- Community infrastructure will not support individual with access and functional needs, social needs, quality of life and ongoing medical care: 57
- Repairs to home require accessibility improvements: 10

#### 4. Emotional

- No family, friends, or support systems in area: 81
- Psychological distress, overwhelmed by the disaster event: 323
- Benefits from social interaction at the shelter: 27
- Other: 28

#### 5. Social

- Better quality of life in the shelter: 25
- Separated from caretaker: 10
- Home environment does not support Household member with functional needs: 24
- Other: 16

# MASTT Data – Concerns, Observations, Trends

#### **Jackson**

- Challenges of renting when you have pet(s) and/or smoke
- Definitely need to revisit bringing in Red Cross and FEMA to initial meeting
- Need bilingual bicultural CM to interview consumers
- affordable housing is a barrier in consumers moving out of shelter

#### **Marion**

- Lack of housing and emotional support
- Emotional distress, most don't want to accept help as they feel others are in worse situation
- Meal concerns
- Survivors were happy and thankful for the meeting

#### Lane

- Physical limitations; unable to do previous work
- Domestic violence
- Finding a place to rent with fixed income (TANF, Disability, Unemployment)
- Accommodations being made for those needing help accessing Zoom to hopefully reduce noshows
- No income while waiting for FEMA/SBA help & has urgent basic needs (not eligible for UC or TANF or Disability)

# **REALD Data**

REALD Data is coming in from MASTT counties. County MASTTs are following up with survivors to gather more information. This is provided to the survivors prior to the initial MASTT interview. All REALD Data information is voluntary and not required to participate in the interview process.
